BACKGROUND:

Each year when the Board of Supervisors reorganizes, the incoming Chair reviews and makes recommendations to the Board on committee assignments (Attachment II--Master List). The annual review of committee assignments is governed by a policy (Attachment I) adopted by the Board in March 2000.

Transmitted herewith are the recommendations of Chair Mary N. Piepho for 2012. These recommendations seek to provide policy oversight for all major County functional areas, balance the workload of the Supervisors, and consider some of the outstanding responsibilities and appointments of the Supervisors on regional and other bodies.

Chair Piepho proposes that the Board consider the following modifications to the roster of committee assignments:

1. ADD the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors appointments (two members) to the San Joaquin Valley Rail Committee to the Master List as Regional Type III appointments. The San Joaquin Valley Rail Committee (established by SB 1118, Statutes of 1997), is comprised of elected officials and members of the public representing 13 counties along the San Joaquin train route which include: Alameda, Contra Costa, Fresno, Kern, Kings, Los Angeles, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Stanislaus and Tulare. The San Joaquin Valley Rail Committee meets quarterly at locations throughout the San Joaquin corridor to address current and future operational and safety issues, passenger services, rail facilities, and rail equipment needs along the corridor.

2. ADD the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors appointments (two members) to the Eastern Contra Costa Transit Authority (Tri Delta Transit) Board of Directors to the Master List as Regional Type III appointments. The terms are for two years. Tri Delta Transit was established on August 3, 1976, by a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement, signed by the Cities of Antioch, Brentwood, Pittsburg and Contra Costa County. When Oakley incorporated as as city in 1999, it joined the JPA as well. Tri Delta Transit exists as an agency to own, operate and maintain a public transit system in an effort to meet public transportation needs in Eastern Contra Costa County. An eleven member Board of Directors supported by a professional staff governs Tri Delta Transit. The Board of Directors includes two representatives from each of the four incorporated cities served by Tri Delta Transit, two representatives from the county, and one at-large member appointed by the other members of the board. The board meets once a month at Tri Delta Transit's administrative office.

For administrative ease, the Master Resolution shall be amended and re-adopted from time to time as terms expire or if new appointments are made. The Master Resolution shall always reflect the complete roster of Board member appointments and shall be available to the public.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Unless the Board of Supervisors acts to adopt a Master List of appointments to committees, special county committees, and regional boards/committees/commissions, there is no official roster of Board member appointments to these bodies.

- 1. Board Committee appointments shall be categorized in accordance with the following descriptions and delineated as on the attached listing:
 - a) **Internal appointments** that are subject to the annual reorganization process and to which the incoming Chair of the Board of Supervisors makes nominations to be approved by the Board of Supervisors. Ad Hoc committees of the Board also fall under this category.
 - b) **Regional appointments** that are not subject to the annual reorganization process and to which the Chair of the Board of Supervisors makes nominations to fill vacancies, as they occur, in accordance with the agency's terms and by-laws, and which nominations shall be approved by the Board of Supervisors.
 - c) **Special Case/Restricted appointments**, for which the specific assignments are dictated or are in some way restricted by statute or county ordinance, or for which the term of the appointment makes it impractical for it to be considered along with the other annual assignments e.g., a term that runs from July to June. Restrictions might include, for example, that a committee member represent a certain district, be the Chair of the Board, or vest in the Chair of the Board the authority to appoint an alternate.

The Chair of the Board of Supervisors shall make nominations to these appointments to fill vacancies, as they occur, subject to any legislated restrictions, and which nominations shall be approved by the Board of Supervisors.

- 2. Notwithstanding Paragraph 1 of this policy and as allowed by law, the Board of Supervisors maintains its right to nominate, reconsider and change appointments at any time, irrespective of the term of an appointment.
- 3. All nominations approved by the Board of Supervisors shall be incorporated in three attachments to an annually adopted Master Resolution covering committee appointments from all three categories: Internal, Regional and Special Case/Restricted. For administrative ease, the Master Resolution shall be amended and re-adopted from time to time as terms expire or if new appointments are made. The Master Resolution shall always reflect the complete roster of Board member appointments and shall be available to the public.

Subject: Approve Cooperative Agreement for Transfer of SR4 Bypass to State and Relinquishment of Existing SR4

RECOMMENDATION(S):

APPROVE the Cooperative Agreement between the County, the State of California (State), the State Route 4 (SR4) Bypass Authority, and the Cities of Antioch, Brentwood, and Oakley for the transfer of the SR4 Bypass to the State and the relinquishment of existing SR4 to the respective local agencies; and AUTHORIZE the Board Chair to execute the Cooperative Agreement on behalf of the County substantially in the form attached to this Board Order.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Under the Cooperative Agreement, the SR4 Bypass Authority will pay \$1,872,000 to the County to address any pavement deficiencies on existing SR4. In addition, the County would assume full responsibility for operating and maintaining the portion of existing SR4 in the County's jurisdiction, including any hazardous materials located in the County portion.

BACKGROUND:

The State Route 4 (SR4) Bypass Authority, a joint powers agency composed of Contra Costa County and the Cities of Antioch, Brentwood, and Oakley, has worked in partnership with Caltrans since 1989 to implement the SR4 Bypass project. The purpose of the project is to provide a new route for SR4 that bypasses the communities of Antioch, Oakley, and Brentwood to alleviate traffic-related noise and congestion on local streets, pursuant to the adopted General Plans for Antioch, Brentwood, and Contra Costa County and the Caltrans-adopted Route Concept Report for SR4. The SR4 Bypass, which was constructed in stages between 2000 and 2010, presently consists of a 6-lane freeway from the SR4/SR160 Interchange to the Laurel Road Interchange, a 4-lane freeway from the Laurel Road Interchange to Lone Tree Way, and an expressway from Lone Tree Way to the Marsh Creek Road/Vasco Road intersection south of Brentwood. The SR4 Bypass then continues along Marsh Creek Road as a conventional highway back to existing SR4.

Now that the SR4 Bypass has been completed, it has been proposed that the SR4 Bypass be transferred to the State as new SR4 and that existing SR4 from SR160 to Marsh Creek Road be relinquished to Contra Costa County and the Cities of Oakley and Brentwood. The Cooperative Agreement between the State, the SR4 Bypass Authority, and the Local Agencies (i.e., the County and the Cities) covers the terms under which the SR4 Bypass will be transferred to the State and existing SR4 relinquished to the County, Oakley, and Brentwood (see Attachment A). The agreement identifies the responsibilities of each agency related to the transfer and relinquishment process.

Under the Cooperative Agreement, upon the adoption of the SR4 Bypass by the State, the SR4 Bypass will become new SR4 (i.e., the highway location will be moved) and the State will thereafter assume full responsibility and liability for ownership and operation of the SR4 Bypass, including any hazardous materials located in the Bypass right of way. Upon the relinquishment of existing SR4, the former highway will become a local road and the County, Oakley, and Brentwood will thereafter assume full responsibility and liability for ownership and operation of existing SR4 within their respective jurisdictions, including any hazardous materials located in the relinquished right of way. As required by Streets and Highways Code Section 73, the SR4 Bypass Authority will pay \$1,872,000 to the County to cover the County's estimated expense of placing the former highway in a state of good repair.

The Board approved an earlier version of the Cooperative Agreement on August 16, 2011. Since that time, extensive negotiations have taken place, resulting in numerous revisions to the agreement. Most of the revisions apply to the SR4 Bypass Authority and the State. However, some revisions would affect the County, including a specific requirement for the County to accept the relinquished right of way subject to hazardous materials mentioned in various State reports and to defend and indemnify the State against any claims or lawsuits relating to hazardous materials in the relinquished right of way. The earlier version approved by the Board required the County to accept potential hazardous materials sites within the relinquished right of way, but did not mention the State reports and did not specifically require the County to defend and indemnify the State against hazardous materials claims and lawsuits.

Caltrans procedures require a formal action by the County to authorize the Board Chair to execute the Cooperative Agreement on behalf of the County. This action is required for the California Transportation Commission (CTC) adoption of the SR4 Bypass as the new SR4. Staff recommends that the Board approve the Cooperative Agreement and authorize the Board Chair to execute the agreement on behalf of the County in substantially the form attached to this Board Order (see Attachment A).

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Failure to approve the Cooperative Agreement would delay transfer of the SR4 Bypass and the relinquishment of existing SR4 and may disrupt the process to complete the transfer of highway location.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, ENTERED INTO EFFECTIVE ON _____, 2012, is between the STATE OF CALIFORNIA, acting by and through its Department of Transportation, referred to herein as "STATE," the

STATE ROUTE 4 BYPASS AUTHORITY, a California joint powers agency formed and existing under California law, referred to herein as "AUTHORITY"; the

COUNTY OF CONTRA COSTA, a political subdivision of the State of California, referred to herein as "CC"; the

CITY OF ANTIOCH, a body politic and a municipal corporation of the State of California, referred to herein as "CA"; the

CITY OF BRENTWOOD, a body politic and a municipal corporation of the State of California, referred to herein as "CB"; the

CITY OF OAKLEY, a body politic and a municipal corporation of the State of California, referred to herein as "CO."

RECITALS

- 1. STATE, AUTHORITY, CC, CA, CB and CO, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code section 114 are authorized to enter into a Cooperative Agreement for improvements to the State Highway System (SHS) within the respective jurisdictions of the CC, CA, CB and CO.
- 2. STATE, CC, CB, and CO, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code sections 73 and 130, are authorized to enter into a Cooperative Agreement in order to relinquish a portion of State Route 4 (SR4) within the respective jurisdictions of the CC, CB and CO.
- 3. CC, CA, CB, and CO are collectively referred to herein as "LOCAL AGENCIES."
- 4. LOCAL AGENCIES have jointly formed and authorized AUTHORITY to design and construct a new route for highway purposes and to facilitate a potential future transit facility in the median from east of SR4/Hillcrest Avenue Interchange to the SR4/Marsh Creek Road intersection, referred to herein as "BYPASS," as shown in Attachment 4, attached to and made an express part of this Agreement.

- 5. STATE, LOCAL AGENCIES and AUTHORITY entered into Cooperative Agreements 4-1884-C dated June 24, 2004 and 4-1885-C dated May 24, 2005 defining the terms and conditions, under which the BYPASS is to be developed, designed, constructed, financed, and maintained.
- 6. STATE, LOCAL AGENCIES and AUTHORITY desire to relocate SR4 from its current corridor to the BYPASS. In order to accomplish this, STATE, LOCAL AGENCIES and AUTHORITY desire that the BYPASS is adopted as the new SR4 and simultaneously STATE relinquish the current SR4 to CO, CB, and CC respectively. The adoption and relinquishment are together referred to herein as "TRANSFER."
- 7. TRANSFER is subject to action by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and will occur only when the CTC approves the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location and adopts the Resolution of Relinquishment to be recorded in the County Recorder's Office pursuant to Streets and Highways Code sections 73 and 81 and the terms of this Agreement.
- 8. STATE desires to relinquish individually to CO, CB, and CC those portions of existing SR4 located within their respective jurisdictions from the existing SR160/Main Street Interchange to Marsh Creek Road depicted in Attachment 4, referred to herein as "RELINQUISHMENT."
- 9. CO, CB, and CC will accept and assume full maintenance, ownership, responsibility, control and liability in perpetuity over the portion of RELINQUISHMENT located within their respective jurisdictions at no cost to STATE.
- 10. The parties hereto intend to define herein the terms and conditions under which TRANSFER is to be accomplished.

SECTION I

AUTHORITY AGREES:

- 1. To prepare the Route Transfer Report and the exhibits for the appropriate freeway agreements and maintenance agreements to be finalized by STATE for execution by the affected LOCAL AGENCIES. To perform all project development for the TRANSFER as outlined in Scope of Work (Attachment 1) and Right of Way Activities (Attachment 2) both of which documents are attached to and made an express part of this Agreement, including preparation and submittal of an encroachment policy variance request to STATE for TRANSFER, all at no cost to STATE and in accordance with procedures acceptable to STATE and in compliance with all applicable State laws, regulations, policies and procedures. Subject to STATE independent quality assurance (IQA), AUTHORITY shall assure that the BYPASS is fully acceptable for incorporation into the State Highway System (SHS) should that TRANSFER be accepted by the CTC in the Resolutions of Transfer of Highway Location and Resolution of Relinquishment.
- 2. To maintain and keep BYPASS in a state of good repair until the CTC has approved the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location.
- 3. AUTHORITY is the CEQA lead agency responsible for the environmental clearance for the Balfour Road Interchange, including the Kinder Morgan Pump Station relocation site. AUTHORITY agrees not to sell the Kinder Morgan Pump Station relocation site and to facilitate the transfer of the site to Kinder Morgan as part of the future relocation as shown on Attachment 6 and made a part of this Agreement.

- 4. To prepare all necessary mapping exhibits for RELINQUISHMENT and records of survey, and right of way record maps for BYPASS in accordance with the following: a) Chapter 6 of the State of California Right of Way Manual- Right of Way Engineering; b) the State of California Drafting and Plans Manual; c) Chapter 10 of the State of California Surveys Manual; d) applicable State laws, policies, and other pertinent reference materials and examples as provided by STATE.
- 5. To have all necessary right of way maps and documents that will be used to transfer title of BYPASS from AUTHORITY to STATE and RELINQUISHMENT from STATE to CO, CB and CC prepared by or under the direction of a person licensed to practice land surveying in the State of California. Each map and document shall bear the appropriate professional seal, certificate number, expiration date of registration certification and signature of the licensed person in "Responsible Charge of Work."
- 6. To submit to STATE for review and acceptance all right of way record maps for BYPASS, with available appurtenant back-up and reference data, as shown on Attachments 2 and 3 attached to and made an express part of this Agreement, prior to execution of the CTC's Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location.
- To deliver to STATE, fee title to the right of way for BYPASS, free and clear of all liens, 7π encumbrances, assessments, easements and leases (recorded and/or unrecorded) and taxes, except for those covenants, conditions, restrictions and reservations of record, encroachments, easements, crossings, and access rights acceptable to STATE. Attachment 8, attached to and incorporated into this Agreement, depicts the parcels of property to be delivered in fee pursuant to this Article. AUTHORITY's delivery of fee title to STATE will not include the local roadways identified and addressed in this article and in Section II, Article 1 herein. Said fee title shall be delivered within sixty (60) working days after CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location and recordation of the CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment in the County Recorder's Office. Acceptance of said title by STATE for parcels acquired by AUTHORITY is subject to STATE's review and acceptance of Policy(ies) of Title Insurance which shall name the State of California as the insured and which shall be provided and paid for by AUTHORITY. Said Policy(ies) of Title Insurance will not encompass local roadways that are transferred to STATE under Streets and Highways Code section 83. The portion of local roadways (Lone Tree Way, Old Sand Creek Road, Sand Creek Road, San Jose Avenue, Balfour Road, Concord Avenue and Marsh Creek Road) within BYPASS will become part of State Highways right of way by operation of Streets and Highways Code section 83, confirmed by a quitclaim deed from AUTHORITY, CA, CB, and CC for the portion of the local roadways within their respective jurisdictions.
- 8. To certify that right of way parcels to be transferred to STATE were acquired in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 (as amended), and Titles 23 & 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). In the event STATE determines that its review of parcel files reveals material noncompliance by AUTHORITY in the acquisition process with respect to relocation assistance, AUTHORITY agrees to remedy said deficiencies to STATE's satisfaction prior to transferring those properties to STATE.
- 9. To assist STATE in negotiation of satisfactory freeway agreements and maintenance agreements for BYPASS corridor with LOCAL AGENCIES.
- 10. To transfer to STATE all records and files for BYPASS no later than CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, including, but not limited to, utility permit files, encroachment permits, plans (including all BYPASS as-builts), record drawings,

construction files, survey data and documents, right of way information (including complete acquisition and appraisal files for each parcel acquired for the substitute facility), contract records, and electronic files as then currently available.

- 11. All outstanding BYPASS mitigation obligations, including the construction of the Mokelumne overcrossing for the grade-separated Class I Bikepath, existing at the time of CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location will remain the responsibility of the AUTHORITY and will be completed by AUTHORITY at its cost to the satisfaction of those involved permitting agencies, and those mitigation obligations are not transferable to STATE.
- 12. To provide and install, at AUTHORITY's cost, all signs required by STATE to operate BYPASS as SR4.
- 13. With the exception of CA, within sixty (60) days of the recordation of Resolution of Relinquishment, to remove STATE owned and identified SR160 and SR4 route shields and directional signage no longer relevant to RELINQUISHMENT.
- 14. AUTHORITY will allocate and pay to CO, CB, and CC a total of \$4,011,000 as itemized and shown in Attachment 5, attached to and made an express part of this Agreement, as a cost to relinquish RELINQUISHMENT. The payments to CO, CB, and CC shall be made prorate by AUTHORITY according to a time schedule determined by AUTHORITY's Board.

SECTION II

LOCAL AGENCIES AGREE:

- 1. To cooperate with STATE in its assumption of jurisdiction over the portions of local roadways (Lone Tree Way, Sand Creek Road, San Jose Avenue, Balfour Road, Concord Avenue and Marsh Creek Road) more fully listed out in Attachment 8 within BYPASS which shall become part of the State Highways right of way by operation of Streets and Highways Code section 83, and to confirm this action by executing a quitclaim deed to STATE, for the portions of the local roadways within their respective jurisdictions.
- 2. Execution of this Agreement constitutes LOCAL AGENCY's waiver of STATE's obligation to provide ninety (90) days prior notice of STATE's "Intention to Relinquish" as set forth in Streets and Highways Code section 73.
- 3. To accept the allocation by AUTHORITY, as the only financial obligation for the relinquishment of RELINQUISHMENT.
- 4. Even if funds are not paid by AUTHORITY at the time of Resolution of Relinquishment, to accept RELINQUISHMENT immediately upon recordation of CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment in the County Recorder's Office and defer the receipt of payment for RELINQUISHMENT to a date when funding becomes available.
- 5. With the exception of CA, to accept ownership of and full responsibility for the portion of RELINQUISHMENT located within their respective jurisdictions, including all of STATE's, rights, title and interest in RELINQUISHMENT, and potential hazardous waste and/or hazardous material sites within the portion of RELINQUISHMENT located within their respective jurisdictions upon recordation of the CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment in the County Recorder's Office, and to thereafter operate, maintain, and be fully liable for the

portion of RELINQUISHMENT located within their respective jurisdictions at no additional cost to STATE.

- 6. With the exception of CA, to accept RELINQUISHED FACILITIES in their current environmental condition and setting, including, but not limited to, the presence of hazardous materials as described in the November 2011 Environmental Data Resources Reports for State Route 4 and the following STATE Reports: "Limited Site Investigation Report Highway 4 Widening Project" August 2000; "Site Investigation Report SR4 PM R31.3/R40.8" June 2001; "Supplemental Site Investigation Report SR4 Between Live Oak Lane and Big Break Road" December 2001; "Phase II Environmental Site Assessment Bethel Island Bridge Replacement Project" February 2003. Upon recordation of the CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment in the County Recorder's Office, STATE will not be responsible for any present or future remediation of said hazardous materials.
- 7. With the exception of CA, to fully defend, indemnify and save harmless STATE and all its officers and employees from all claims, suits or actions related to environmental theories or assertions of liability, including, but not limited to, claims or lawsuits related to the presence of hazardous materials in the RELINQUISHED FACILITIES as described herein in Section II, Article 6.
- 8. With the exception of CA, to accept the allocation of \$4,011,000, as shown on Attachment 5 as AUTHORITY's only financial contribution to CO, CB, and CC for RELINQUISHMENT.
- 9. With the exception of CO, to own, operate, and maintain their respective facilities, including but not limited to storm drains, sewers, and water lines within BYPASS limits, which facilities will not be owned, operated and maintained by STATE following the TRANSFER.
- 10. CB is currently the owner for the portion of Concord Avenue south of Balfour Road and west of BYPASS. Upon completion of John Muir Parkway, the portion of Concord Avenue from Balfour Road to the newly constructed John Muir Parkway as shown on Attachment 7, attached to and made an express part of this Agreement will become a part of State Highways System under Streets and Highways Code section 83, supplemented by a quitclaim deed from CB to STATE prepared by AUTHORITY at no cost to STATE and CB.
- 11. In the event that AUTHORITY sunsets before meeting all obligations identified in the Environmental Impact Report (EIR), supplemental EIR, addendum EIR, PSR, PR and cooperative agreements, LOCAL AGENCIES will jointly assume AUTHORITY's responsibility to complete AUTHORITY's remaining obligations

SECTION III

STATE AGREES:

- 1. To provide Independent Quality Assurance (IQA) of the adoption and relinquishment processes and to cooperate in timely processing of TRANSFER documents.
- 2. To accept physical control and possession of BYPASS, upon the approval of the CTC's Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location.
- 3. To accept title to the right of way for BYPASS when AUTHORITY or any of the LOCAL AGENCIES transfer said title to STATE for parcels and subject to other provisions of this Agreement.

- 4. Upon CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, STATE agrees to relinquish RELINQUISHMENT.
- 5. To submit the CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment to the County Recorder's Office for recording within fifteen (15) working days of CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location.
- 6. To provide all available records and files for RELINQUISHMENT including, but not limited to, plans (including as-builts), record drawings, survey data and documents, right of way information, as currently available.
- 7. To accept ownership of and full responsibility for BYPASS as new SR4, including those acceptable existing encumbrances, together with all rights, title, and interest in BYPASS, and potential hazardous waste and/or hazardous material sites within BYPASS, upon CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, and to thereafter operate, maintain, and be fully liable for BYPASS, and to be responsible for the administration of the accompanying easements and/or permits, except for those local facilities within BYPASS referred to in Section II, Article 9.
- 8. After CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, to issue, at no cost to AUTHORITY, CO, CB, and CC and their contractors, upon proper application, the necessary encroachment permits to modify and install directional signing within existing SR4 and new SR4.

SECTION IV

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED:

- 1. All obligations of STATE under the terms of this Agreement are subject to the appropriation of resources by the Legislature in the Annual State Budget Act and the allocation of any required funds by the CTC.
- 2. The parties to this Agreement understand and agree that STATE's IQA is to ensure AUTHORITY/LOCAL AGENCIES activities result in project being developed in accordance with standards and procedure agreed to in this Agreement. IQA does not include any work necessary to actually develop or deliver TRANSFER activities, nor any validation to verify, nor rechecking work performed by AUTHORITY/LOCAL AGENCIES, including, but not limited to periodic process assessment of Quality Assurance practices and their compliance with STATE criteria as agreed to in this Agreement. No liability will be assignable to STATE, its officers and employees by AUTHORITY/LOCAL AGENCIES under the terms of this Agreement or by third parties by reason of STATE's IQA activities.
- 3. Following CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, STATE will issue encroachment permits to AUTHORITY and its contractors at no cost immediately after TRANSFER for ongoing construction activities that received prior STATE concurrence within the new SR4. AUTHORITY's receipt of each STATE approved encroachment permit shall constitute authorization to proceed with work to be performed by AUTHORITY or AUTHORITY's representatives within the new SR4 or work which affects STATE's facilities. AUTHORITY's authorization to proceed with said work shall be contingent upon AUTHORITY's compliance with all provisions set forth within said encroachment permits.
- 4. Following CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location accepting BYPASS, any future proposed improvements to be placed on BYPASS by other than STATE forces will require an encroachment permit from STATE.

- 5. Following CTC's Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, if AUTHORITY terminates any of its construction projects within BYPASS prior to completion, STATE shall require AUTHORITY, at AUTHORITY's expense, to return the SHS right of way (formerly BYPASS right of way) to its original condition or to a safe and operable condition acceptable to STATE. If AUTHORITY fails to do so, STATE reserves the right to finish project or place project in a safe and operable condition and STATE will bill AUTHORITY for all actual expenses incurred and AUTHORITY agrees to pay said bill within thirty (30) days of receipt.
- 6. Following CTC's Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location, if unanticipated cultural, archaeological, paleontological or other protected materials are encountered during any ongoing construction activity by AUTHORITY within BYPASS, AUTHORITY shall stop work in that area until a qualified professional can evaluate the nature and significance of the find and a plan is approved for the removal or protection of that material. AUTHORITY will notify STATE within twenty-four (24) hours of any discovery. Any required removal or protection of that material shall be undertaken by AUTHORITY at its expense.
- 7. AUTHORITY shall not sunset before meeting all obligations of AUTHORITY identified in this Agreement No. 4-2152, the SR4 Bypass Environmental Impact Report (EIR), the supplemental EIR, the addenda EIR, the Project Study Report, the Project Report, and other cooperative agreements and before all real property interests owned by AUTHORITY have been transferred. In the event that AUTHORITY sunsets, LOCAL AGENCIES will jointly and severally assume AUTHORITY's responsibility to complete AUTHORITY's remaining obligations.
- 8. Following CTC's Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location encroachment permits issued by AUTHORITY on BYPASS for ongoing construction projects will be reissued by STATE at no cost with such conditions and terms that are acceptable to STATE.
- 9. AUTHORITY is responsible for providing signage on local roads to connect the new SR4 to/from SR160 until the future WB SR4 to NB SR160, SB SR160 to EB SR4 connectors are constructed. Said proposed location of signs will be reviewed and approved by STATE. AUTHORITY is the CEQA lead agency responsible for the environmental clearance for the proposed sign installation. LOCAL AGENCIES are responsible for the maintenance of the said signs to ensure good operating condition within their respective jurisdictions. LOCAL AGENCIES agree to maintain, at LOCAL AGENCIES' expense, the local access roads that connect new SR4 to/from SR160. LOCAL AGENCIES accept impacts to its facilities attributed to the absence of the said connectors and agree to not seek compensation from STATE. LOCAL AGENCIES agree not to seek compensation from STATE for the maintenance of LOCAL AGENCIES' local roads and signs.
- 10. All SR4 and SR160 maintenance agreements and freeway agreements prepared by STATE will be executed/revised between the respective LOCAL AGENCIES and STATE after CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location and recordation of CTC's Resolution of Relinquishment. These maintenance agreements shall specify long-term maintenance responsibilities delegated to each respective local agency for local and shared facilities and signals.
- 11. HM-1 is defined as hazardous material (including but not limited to hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law, whether it is disturbed or not.

HM-2 is defined as hazardous material (including but not limited to hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law, only if it is disturbed.

- 12. STATE's acquisition or acceptance of title to any property on which any HM-1 or HM-2 exists will proceed in accordance with STATE's policy on such acquisition.
- 13. Responsibility for HM-1 rests with the current owner(s) of the parcel(s) on which the HM-1 exists. AUTHORITY/LOCAL AGENCIES will not include property on which HM-1 exists as part of TRANSFER, except as provided otherwise in Section IV, Article 15.
- 14. The document conveying title of the property to the STATE will incorporate by reference the Covenant to Restrict Use of the Property/Environmental Restriction recorded on September 2, 2008 as Document No. 2008-0194541-00, Official Records of Contra Costa County.
- 15. AUTHORITY will not transfer fee but only convey a highway easement as part of TRANSFER to STATE for the contaminated parcel (PARCEL) at the BYPASS/Balfour Road intersection as shown in Attachment 6, attached to and made an express part of this Agreement. AUTHORITY agrees to hold the underlying fee title of PARCEL in perpetuity or until AUTHORITY conveys fee title to STATE. At such time when the Regional Water Quality Control Board issues a closure letter, AUTHORITY will convey fee title of PARCEL to STATE, at no cost to STATE and STATE will accept the conveyance. If AUTHORITY sunsets prior to conveyance of PARCEL, LOCAL AGENCIES jointly agree to accept title of PARCEL and to accept all of the above conditions.
- 16. AUTHORITY will reserve the property depicted as Area A in Attachment 6 for relocation of Kinder Morgan Booster Station at the BYPASS/Balfour Road intersection. AUTHORITY agrees to hold the underlying fee title of Area A in perpetuity or until it is conveyed to Kinder Morgan as part of the future Kinder Morgan Booster Station relocation. In the event AUTHORITY sunsets prior to relocation of the Kinder Morgan Booster Station, AUTHORITY will convey fee title and encumbrances of Area A to LOCAL AGENCIES at no cost to LOCAL AGENCIES. LOCAL AGENCIES, jointly agree to accept title of Area A and to accept all of the above conditions.
- 17. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CA and/or its agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CA under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that CA will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CA and/or their agents under this Agreement.
- 18. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CB and/or its agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CB under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that CB will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CB and/or their agents under this Agreement.
- 19. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CO and/or its

agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CO under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that CO will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CO and/or their agents under this Agreement.

- 20. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CC and/or its agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CC under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that CC will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CC and/or their agents under this Agreement.
- 21. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by STATE and/or its agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon STATE under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that STATE will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by STATE and/or its agents under this Agreement.
- 22. All the other parties to the Agreement are not responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by AUTHORITY and/or its agents, under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon AUTHORITY under this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that AUTHORITY will fully defend, indemnify and save harmless all the other parties to the Agreement and all their officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by AUTHORITY and/or its agents under this Agreement.
- 23. No alteration of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto and no oral understanding or agreement not incorporated herein shall be binding on any of the parties hereto.
- 24. This Agreement shall terminate upon the CTC's approval of the Resolution of Transfer of Highway Location and recordation of the Resolution of Relinquishment in the County Recorder's Office, and payment by AUTHORITY of \$4,011,000 to CO, CB and CC, except for those provisions that relate to indemnification, environmental commitment, legal challenges, ownership, property recapture, operation, maintenance, and related long term relationships, which provisions shall remain in effect until terminated or modified in writing by mutual agreement.
- 25. The Parties hereto recognize and agree that separate counterpart signature pages may be used but that all such pages constitute one and the same Agreement. If the Agreement is

executed in counterparts, the execution of the agreement will be complete upon execution of the Agreement by the last party to sign it.

SCOPE OF WORK

This Scope of Work outlines the specific areas of responsibility for various project development activities for the TRANSFER in Contra Costa County.

- 1. AUTHORITY is the CEQA Lead Agency for TRANSFER. AUTHORITY will prepare an addendum to the 1994 BYPASS EIR to evaluate TRANSFER. AUTHORITY will provide all data for and prepare drafts of the TRANSFER Project Report. STATE will review that report to determine if STATE can approve the TRANSFER. LOCAL AGENCIES will be responsible for the public hearing process.
- 2. All activities for TRANSFER, whether done by AUTHORITY or STATE, will be developed in accordance with all policies, procedures, practices, and standards that STATE would normally follow.
- 3. Detailed steps in the TRANSFER process are included as Attachments 2 and 3. These Attachments are intended as a guide to STATE's and AUTHORITY's staff.

The BYPASS is comprised of the following:



- Conventional highway along Marsh Creek Road connecting to the existing SR4 at Byron Highway.



PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT BETWEEN CONTRA COSTA COUNTY AND CONTRA COSTA WATER DISTRICT

This Agreement is entered into by and between Contra Costa County, a Political Subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter "County") and Contra Costa Water District a local agency of the State of California (hereinafter "Grantor").

RECITALS

Grantor is the owner of approximately 658 acres of real property located in Contra Costa County, California and described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The real property, including improvements thereon, if any, are collectively referred to herein as the "Property".

AGREEMENT

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the agreements herein contained and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **Effective Date.** It is understood that this Agreement is subject to approval by the County's Governing Board. This Agreement is effective on the date approved by the County's Governing Board ("Effective Date"). This Agreement will be submitted to the Grantor first for approval, and thereafter to the County.
- 2. **Purchase and Sale.** Subject to the terms and conditions in this Agreement, Grantor agrees to sell and County agrees to purchase the Property.
- 3. **Purchase Price.** The purchase price for the Property shall be One Hundred Four Thousand Two -Hundred & 00/100 Dollars (\$104,200.00) ("Purchase Price").
 - 3.1. All ad valorem real property taxes and any penalties and costs thereon, and all installments of any bond or assessment that constitutes a lien on the Property shall be cleared and paid by Grantor as of the date title shall vest in County by the recordation of the deed herein pursuant to Sections 4986, 5082, and 5086 of the Revenue and Taxation Code of the State of California, if unpaid as of the date title vests.
- 4. **Conditions to County's Performance.** The County's obligation to perform under this Agreement is subject to the following conditions:
 - 4.1. Grantor's representations and warranties in this Agreement being correct as of the date of this Agreement and as of the Close of Escrow.
 - 4.2. Grantor's performance of all obligations under this Agreement.
 - 4.3. The vesting of title to the Property in the County by grant deed in fee simple absolute, free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, leases (recorded and/or unrecorded), and taxes except the following "Approved Exceptions" as outlined in the Preliminary Report dated December 9, 2011, issued by Fidelity National Title Company:

- A. Covenants, conditions, restrictions and reservations of record, listed as exceptions: None.
- B. Easements or rights of way of record over said property, listed as exceptions: 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 10.
- C. Other Approved Exceptions: None.
- 4.4. The Fidelity National Title Company's being prepared to issue a CLTA title insurance policy in the full amount of the purchase price, subject only to the Approved Exceptions ("Title Policy").

If County determines that any of these conditions have not been met, County shall have the right to terminate this Agreement by delivering written notice to Grantor and, if applicable, the Escrow agent.

- 5. **Escrow.** By this Agreement, County and Grantor establish an escrow ("Escrow") with Fidelity National Title Company, 501 Sycamore Valley Road, West, Danville, California, their Escrow No. 11-336317-DH ("Title Company"). If, for any reason, the named Title Company is unable to handle this transaction through the Close of Escrow, the County's Real Property Agent assigned to oversee this Property acquisition will select an alternate title company to handle the transaction, and notify Grantor in writing of the identity and address of the successor title company and the new escrow number. Thereafter, the successor company will be the "Title Company" for purposes of this Agreement. Grantor hereby authorizes County to prepare escrow instructions and file escrow instructions with said Title Company, on behalf of Grantor, in accordance with this Agreement. This includes authorization of the Title Company to withhold pro rata taxes, liens, and assessments on the Property conveyed.
 - 5.1. <u>Fees and Title Insurance</u>. The County shall pay all escrow and recording fees incurred in this transaction and, if title insurance is desired by the County, the premium charged therefor.
 - 5.2 <u>Grantor's Deposit into Escrow</u>. On or before the Close of Escrow Grantor will deliver into Escrow with the Title Company the following documents:
 - A. A grant deed, in recordable form and properly executed on behalf of Grantor, in a form approved by County ("Grant Deed") conveying to County the Property in fee simple absolute, subject only to the Approved Exceptions.
 - B. Copies of any effective leases, rental agreements or any other agreements, if any, which the County has agreed in writing are to remain in effect after County takes title.
 - C. Grantor's affidavit of nonforeign status as contemplated by Section 1445 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended [26 USCA §1445] ("FIRPTA Affidavit"); and
 - D. Grantor's affidavit as contemplated by the Revenue and Taxation Code § 18662 ("Withholding Affidavit").
 - 5.3. <u>Deposit of Purchase Price Into Escrow by County</u>. Prior to the Close of Escrow, County will deposit the Purchase Price into escrow with the Title Company.

- 5.4. <u>Close of Escrow</u>. Escrow shall close upon the conveyance of the Property to the County ("Close of Escrow). On the closing date, the Title Company shall close Escrow as follows:
 - A. Record the Grant Deed, marked for return to the County care of Debra L. Baker, Supervising Real Property Agent for the County (which shall be deemed delivery to the County);
 - B. Issue the Title Policy, if requested to do so by the County;
 - C. Prorate taxes, assessments, rents and other charges as provided by this Agreement;
 - D. Disburse to the Grantor the Purchase Price, less prorated amounts and charges to be paid by or on behalf of Grantor;
 - D. Prepare and deliver to the County and to the Grantor one signed copy of the Title Company's closing statement showing all receipts and disbursements of the Escrow.

If the Title Company is unable to simultaneously perform all of the instructions set forth above, the Title Company shall notify the Grantor and the County and retain all funds and documents pending receipt of further instructions from the County.

- 6. **County's Representations and Warranties.** County warrants that, upon approval of this Agreement by the County's governing body, this Agreement shall constitute a binding obligation of the County.
- 7. **Hazardous Material.** The Grantor hereby represents and warrants that during the period of Grantor's ownership of the property, there have been no disposals, releases or threatened releases of hazardous substances or hazardous waste on, from, or under the property. Grantor further represents and warrants that Grantor has no knowledge of any disposal, release, or threatened release of hazardous substance or hazardous waste on, from, or under the property which may have occurred prior to Grantor taking title to the property.

The acquisition price of the property being acquired in this transaction reflects the fairmarket value of the property without the presence of contamination. If the property being acquired is found to be contaminated by the presence of hazardous waste which requires mitigation under Federal or State law, the County may elect to recover its clean-up costs from those who caused or contributed to the contamination, or are otherwise responsible under State and Federal Law.

- 8. **Survival.** All of the terms, provisions, representations, warranties and covenants of the parties under this Agreement shall survive the assignment, expiration or termination of this Agreement and shall not merge in the deed or other documents following the delivery and recordation of said deed or other documents.
- 9. Possession of the Property. It is agreed and confirmed by the parties hereto that notwithstanding other provisions in this contract, the right of possession and use of the subject property by the County, including the right to remove and dispose of improvements, shall commence January 15, 2012 and that the amount shown in Clause 2(A) herein includes, but is not limited to, full payment for such possession and use, including damages, if any, and interest from said date.

- 10. **Property Boundary Identification.** Upon request from Grantor, County shall identify the north and south boundary of the Property by survey and stake the location of the new property lines upon fourteen day's written notice to the County.
- 11. **Assignment and Successors.** This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the parties to this Agreement and their respective heirs, successors, and assigns.
- 12. **Notices.** All notices (including requests, demands, approvals or other communications) under this Agreement shall be in writing. The place for delivery of all notices given under this Agreement shall be as follows:

- 13. **Entire Agreement.** The parties have herein set forth the whole of their agreement. The performance of this agreement constitutes the entire consideration for said document and shall relieve the County of all further obligation or claims on this account, or on account of the location, grade or construction of the proposed public improvement. Grantor has no other right or claim to compensation arising out of or connected with the acquisition of the subject property by the County, except as specifically set forth in this Agreement, including but not limited to all claims for compensation for improvements pertaining to realty, all claims for compensation for fixtures, equipment or machinery, attorneys' fees, costs or damages of every kind and nature by reason of County's acquisition of the subject property and agrees never to assert such a claim.
- 14. **Construction.** The section headings and captions of this Agreement are, and the arrangement of this instrument is, for the sole convenience of the parties to this Agreement. The section headings, captions and arrangement of this instrument do not in any way affect, limit, amplify or modify the terms and provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement shall not be construed as if it had been prepared by one of the parties, but rather as if both parties had prepared it. The parties to this Agreement and their counsel have read and reviewed this Agreement and agree that any rule of construction to the effect that ambiguities are to be resolved against the drafting party shall not apply to the interpretation of this Agreement. The Recitals are and shall be enforceable as a part of this Agreement.
- 15. **Further Assurances.** Whenever requested to do so by the other party, each party shall execute, acknowledge and deliver all further conveyances, assignments, confirmations, satisfactions, releases, powers of attorney, instruments of further assurance, approvals, consents and all further instruments and documents as may be necessary, expedient, or proper in order to complete all conveyances, transfers, sales, and assignments under this

Old Fire Station 93 (FS93) was built in the 1950's on property under the County's ownership. Due to the population growth in Oakley in the last twenty years, FS93 is no longer adequate to service the community. The East Contra Costa Fire Protection District (ECCFPD), the City of Oakley (City), and the County worked together to find a better site to build a new facility for FS93 that will be able to service the community and meet the requirements of the fire staff.

Under the "Agreement Among The East Contra Costa Fire Protection District, The County of Contra Costa, The City of Oakley, And The Oakley Redevelopment Agency For The Oakley Fire Station Replacement Project" (Agreement), Oakley is to construct a new fire station on property it owns at 530 O'Hara Avenue and after the new Fire Station 93 is constructed and occupied by staff, Oakley is to grant this property to ECCFPD. WHEREAS, the County works to raise awareness so individuals will become more informed, and will take action to end Human Trafficking in their communities.



FISCAL IMPACT:

None. Staff time for this effort has been incorporated into the Department's budget.

BACKGROUND:

In 2001, the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) initiated preparation of their first Countywide Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan (Plan) and in 2009 the Plan was updated. At the outset of both of these efforts the Board of Supervisors made appointments to the Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan Advisory Committee (CBPAC) at the request of CCTA.

Recognizing the continuing role the CBPAC has in implementing bicycle and pedestrian policies and advising on related funding decisions, the CCTA has adopted a formal structure, procedures and bylaws for the CBPAC (See Exhibit A). With the formalization of the CBPAC, the CCTA is requesting that member agencies reappoint representatives or appoint new staff representatives (See Exhibit B).

Citizen members are included in the CBPAC, those appointments are being made by the Regional Transportation Planning Committees. The structure for the CBPAC is as follows (from the CBPAC bylaws):

- 1. One citizen and one staff person plus one alternate appointed by each of the four Regional Transportation *Planning Committees*
- 2. One staff person plus one alternate appointed by the County of Contra Costa
- 3. One representative plus one alternate appointed by the East Bay Regional Park District
- 4. One citizen representative plus one alternate appointed by the East Bay Bicycle Coalition
- 5. Two citizens appointed by the Authority, one of whom is familiar with issues of youth walking and bicycling and one of whom is familiar with issues of seniors and disabled non-motorized transportation.

Staff from the Department of Conservation and Development, the Public Works Department, and Contra Costa Health Services discussed and developed the recommendation seen above.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

If the recommended action is not taken the County will not be represented on the Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee and the County's position will not be represented during the development of recommendations on planning and funding issues related to walking and bicycling policies in Contra Costa.

CHILDREN'S IMPACT STATEMENT:

The Countywide Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee reviews policies and projects that support safe routes to schools.



By-Laws

Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee

Adopted October 19, 2011

These by-laws outline the purpose, membership, responsibilities, and operating procedures of the Contra Costa Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (herein "CBPAC") of the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (the "Authority").

1. Name and Authorization

The name of this organization shall be the Contra Costa Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (CBPAC).

2. Purpose

- 2.1. The purpose of the CBPAC is to advise the Authority on bicycle and pedestrian issues and to help the Authority carry out its responsibilities as a sales tax and congestion management agency.
- 2.2. The CBPAC shall have the responsibility to:
 - 2.2.1. Oversee updates to the CBPP and other Authority policy documents and help implement the policies established therein
 - 2.2.2. Review and provide recommendations on applications for funding for bicycle and pedestrian projects and programs
 - 2.2.3. Review and comment on "complete streets" checklists required of proposed projects
 - 2.2.4. Address other bicycle or pedestrian issues facing the Authority, Contra Costa and the region

3. Membership

- 3.1. The CBPAC shall be comprised of 13 members, plus alternates as noted, appointed from the following agencies:
 - 3.1.1. One citizen and one staff person plus one alternate appointed by each of the four Regional Transportation Planning Committees
 - 3.1.2. One staff person plus one alternate appointed by the County of Contra Costa
 - 3.1.3. One representative plus one alternate appointed by the East Bay Regional Park District
 - 3.1.4. One citizen representative plus one alternate appointed by the East Bay Bicycle Coalition
 - 3.1.5. Two citizens appointed by the Authority, one of which familiar with issues of youth walking and bicycling and one of which familiar with issues of seniors and disabled nonmotorized transportation
- 3.2. Citizen members shall be residents of Contra Costa.
- 3.3. Members shall represent the general countywide interest and not solely the interest of their appointing authorities or any specific organization.
- 3.4. At the discretion of the respective appointing body, CBPAC members are subject to recall at anytime.
- 3.5. Members shall be appointed for two year terms. There shall be no limit on the number of consecutive terms which a member may serve.
- 3.6. If a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings, whether regularly scheduled or special, the position to which that member was appointed shall be considered vacant. Attendance by an alternate for that position shall be considered attendance by the member.

> 3.7. A vacancy in a position shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the alternate assigned to that position, if any, or until the appointing agency appoints another person to fill that position.

4. Officers

- 4.1. The Officers of the CBPAC shall be a Chair and a Vice-Chair. Their duties shall be as follows:
 - 4.1.1. Chair: Presides over CBPAC meetings; reviews the meeting agenda; appoints subcommittees and subcommittee chairs; and reports the CBPAC's actions and decisions to the Authority as appropriate.
 - 4.1.2. Vice-Chair: Presides over the CBPAC meetings in the absence of the Chair; conducts the other duties of the Chair in his/her absence.
- 4.2. Election of Officers shall be made as follows:
 - 4.2.1. Chair: The Chair's term of office shall be for one calendar year. The Chair shall be elected each year at the last meeting of the calendar year by a majority of the CBPAC members present and voting, and shall serve until replaced by a newly-elected chair. If the term of appointment of the Chair expires before the year is out, and that member does not seek or accept reappointment, the Vice-Chair will serve as Chair until the following January.
 - 4.2.2. Vice-Chair: This officer shall be elected by a majority of the CBPAC members present and voting at the last meeting of the calendar year. The term of office shall be for one year. If the term of appointment of the Vice-Chair expires before the year is out and that member does not seek or accept reappointment, the Committee will hold an election for a Vice-Chair to serve out the remainder of the term.
- 4.3. In the event of a vacancy in the office of the Chair, the Vice-chair shall be elevated to the office of Chair for the remainder of the calendar year term, and the CBPAC shall nominate and elect a new Vice-chair.

5. Voting

- 5.1. Decision-making by the CBPAC shall be by consensus. The CBPAC shall use formal voting only where consensus among members, and alternates attending in place of a member, cannot be reached.
- 5.2. Each member shall have one vote. Alternates are eligible to vote when seated in place of their regular committee member.
- 5.3. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the then-appointed CBPAC members. Vacant positions shall not be considered in calculating whether a quorum has been achieved. Alternates attending instead of regularly-appointed members shall be considered as members in determining whether a quorum has been achieved.
- 5.4. Actions taken by the CBPAC must be approved by a majority of those members or alternates eligible to vote at a meeting at which a quorum has been achieved.

6. Meetings

- 6.1. All CBPAC meetings shall be posted public meetings conducted in compliance with the Brown Act.
- 6.2. The regular meetings of the CBPAC are generally scheduled for the fourth Monday of every other month beginning in January of every year at 11:00 a.m. in the Authority offices at 2999 Oak Road, Suite 100, Walnut Creek, California 94597. Additional or alternative meetings may be scheduled to address issues requiring more immediate consideration.
- 6.3. The rules contained within the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order (Newly Revised) shall govern the CBPAC in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws, the Authority's Administrative Code, the Authority's Office Procedures Guide, and any special rules of order the CBPAC may adopt.

7. Subcommittees

7.1. The Chair may establish subcommittees and ad hoc committees as necessary.

7.2. Each subcommittee shall consist of at least three (3) CBPAC members. Members shall be reappointed annually.

8. Amendment of By-Laws

Amendment of these bylaws may be initiated either by the CBPAC or the Authority directly. Amendment by the CBPAC requires a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the CBPAC members present and voting at any regular meeting of the CBPAC, and subsequent approval by the full Authority Board. Amendment by the Authority would be made consistent with the Authority's adopted procedures.

9. Communications and Reporting

- 9.1. The primary channel of communication for the CBPAC shall be through written and oral reports from the CBPAC to the Technical Coordinating Committee, and through that committee to the Planning Committee and Authority board.
- 9.2. Reports from the CBPAC should reflect the consensus of the CBPAC. If consensus has not been achieved, the Chair shall convey to the Authority that the CBPAC position reflects a majority vote, and the Chair shall acknowledge and convey minority opinions.
- 9.3. CBPAC members are encouraged to report back to their appointing Councils or boards on at least an annual basis and more frequently if warranted.

10. Conflict of Interest

- 10.1. There shall be no monetary gain by members of the CBPAC as a result of their membership and actions on the CBPAC.
- 10.2. CBPAC members shall recuse themselves from discussion and voting on issues in which they might have a personal financial interest or benefit.

Subject: Contract with the City and County of San Francisco for FY2010 Interoperable Emergen Communication Grant Program Funds

RECOMMENDATION(S):

For several years, the County's Mental Health Adult Services Program has used these Agreements as an interim financing mechanism to facilitate the residential care of mentally disabled clients and movement of clients, who are deemed eligible for SSI/SSP, from State or local inpatient facilities to community-based facilities. This Program provides residential care for 40 to 50 clients per year. Under this program, the County pays the State-established rates for the residential care of mental health clients who are not yet receiving SSI/SSP (but who are potentially eligible and have made formal application to the Social Security Administration for SSI/SSP), contingent upon the client's signing an agreement with the County to reimburse the County from the SSI/SSP money, once it is finally granted by the federal government (usually 3 to 6 months retroactively back to the month of application).

Adding a labor and delivery room will help alleviate a shortage of these facilities. The antepartum testing function was relocated to Building One on the campus in a previous project. The project scope also involves remodeling a nurse's station and upgrading the floor security system.

Plans and specifications for the project were prepared for the General Services Department by Kaplan McLaughlin Diaz, and filed with the Clerk of the Board by the General Services Deputy Director. Bids were received and opened by the General Services Department on November 17, 2011, and the bid results are as follows:

Two of the six bids received were below the architect's estimate of \$349,200. In evaluating the apparent low bid submitted by Orea Construction, it was determined that the bid did not comply with the County's Outreach Program requirements and, therefore, the bid was non-responsive. In evaluating the apparent second low bid submitted by Murray Building, it was determined that the bid did not comply with the Mandatory Subcontracting Minimum (MSM) requirement for this project and did not comply with the bidder responsibility requirements, including sufficient similar project experience. Vila's bid was also evaluated and determined to be responsive and responsible. Therefore, Vila submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid, which is \$41,270 higher than the architect's estimate. The Health Services Department has sufficient funding to cover the additional costs. Staff recommends that the Board reject as non-responsive the bids submitted by Orea Construction and Murray Building and award the construction contract for this project to Vila for a total award amount of \$390,470.

Letters were previously sent notifying Orea Construction and Murray Building of the above deficiencies with their bids and affording them an opportunity to appeal their disqualification. No appeal was submitted by either bidder.

Vila has submitted its documentation of good faith efforts to comply with the specifications and requirements of the County's Outreach Program. Staff has determined that Vila has documented an adequate good faith effort to comply with the requirements of the Outreach Program and recommends that the Board so determine.

The general prevailing wage rates, which shall be the minimum rates paid on this project, are on file with the Clerk of the Board, and copies are available to any party upon request.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Without an additional labor and delivery room, the CCRMC will be unable to meet current service demands. In addition, the space available in the antepartum room will remain under-utilized.





3. AWARD a trade contract (Base Bid plus Additive Alternates #1 and #3) in the amount of \$990,510 to Joseph J. Albanese, Inc. 4. AWARD a trade contract in the amount of \$423,280 to Golden State Carpet Service, Inc. ("Golden State"), the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for Trade Bid Package 5C, consisting of flooring for the subject project; and DIRECT the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to prepare the trade contract.

5. AWARD a trade contract in the amount of \$466,964 to Shooter and Butts, Inc. ("Shooter and Butts"), the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for Trade Bid Package 5G, consisting of landscaping and irrigation for the subject project; and DIRECT the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to prepare the trade contract.

6. AWARD a trade contract in the amount of \$149,900 to Service Metal Products, Inc. ("Service Metal Products"), the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for Trade Bid Package 5H, consisting of miscellaneous specialties for the subject project; and DIRECT the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to prepare the trade contract.

7. AWARD a trade contract (Base Bid plus Additive Alternate #13) in the amount of \$208,500 to Westco Iron Works ("Westco"), the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for Trade Bid Package 5J, consisting of miscellaneous metals phase 2 for the subject project; and DIRECT the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to prepare the trade contract.

8. DETERMINE that Turner Construction Company ("Turner"), as the Construction Manager At-Risk, has documented an adequate good faith effort to comply with the specifications and the requirements of the County's Outreach Program in connection with the above trade contracts and WAIVE any irregularities in such compliance.

11. DIRECT that Golden State shall submit two good and sufficient surety bonds (performance bond and payment bond) in the amount of \$423,280 and that Golden State and its subcontractors shall sign a Project Labor Agreement for the project.

12. DIRECT that Shooter and Butts shall submit two good and sufficient surety bonds (performance bond and payment bond) in the amount of \$466,964 and that Shooter and Butts and its subcontractors shall sign a Project Labor Agreement for the project.

13. DIRECT that Service Metal Products shall submit two good and sufficient surety bonds (performance bond and payment bond) in the amount of \$149,900 and that Service Metal Products and its subcontractors shall sign a Project Labor Agreement for the project.

14. DIRECT that Westco shall submit two good and sufficient surety bonds (performance bond and payment bond) in the amount of \$208,500 and that Westco and its subcontractors shall sign a Project Labor Agreement for the project.

15. ORDER that, after Albanese, Golden State, Shooter and Butts, Service Metal Products, and Westco have signed their respective trade contracts and returned them, together with the bonds, the signed Project Labor Agreement, evidence of insurance, and other required documents, and the Deputy General Services Director has reviewed and found them to be sufficient, the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, is authorized to sign the trade contracts for this Board.

16. AUTHORIZE the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to exonerate any bid bonds posted by the bidders after execution of the above trade contracts.

17. AUTHORIZE the Deputy General Services Director, or designee, to sign any escrow agreements prepared for this project to permit the direct payment of retentions into escrow or the substitution of securities for monies withheld by the County to ensure performance under the trade contracts, pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 22300.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The estimated total project cost is \$45 million. Funding in the amount of \$12 million is from a federal Health Resources and Services Administration ("HRSA") grant, provided under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The remaining balance of \$33 million will be provided through bond financing and dedicated revenue within the Hospital Enterprise Fund.

BACKGROUND:

The West County Health Center ("WCHC") project involves constructing a new 2-story, 53,000-square-foot health center in San Pablo. The new WCHC will serve the region by providing outpatient and ancillary services in a modern and efficient facility. In addition, a new 315-stall, 3-level parking structure will be built adjacent to the WCHC. The "Construction Manager At-Risk" ("CM At-Risk") project delivery method is being utilized on the project. Utilizing this method involves overlapping multiple design and construction phases in order to fast-track the project. With the CM At-Risk project delivery method, multiple trade bid packages (e.g., earthwork, piles, concrete, framing, mechanical, and electrical) are developed and issued for bidding. Twenty trade contracts (for earthwork phase 1, pile foundations, general requirements work, structural steel and metal decking, concrete, elevators, miscellaneous metals/stairs, curtain wall, drywall/plaster, fire protection, plumbing, mechanical, electrical, site utilities, roofing/waterproofing/architectural sheet metal, earthwork phase 2, millwork, doors/frames/hardware, acoustical ceilings, and painting) have already been awarded by the Board. Additional trade bid packages for site concrete/caulking, flooring, landscape and irrigation, miscellaneous specialties, and miscellaneous metals phase 2 were subsequently developed and issued for bidding.

Bids were received for Trade Bid Packages 5B, 5C, 5G, 5H, and 5J and opened by the General Services Department on December 1, 2011. The bid results for Trade Bid Packages 5B, 5C, 5G, 5H, and 5J are as follows:

In addition to the Base Bid scope of work, bidders for Trade Bid Packages 5B and 5J were also required to submit bids on bid alternates that affected them (Additive Alternates #1, #3, #13, and #14 as highlighted in bold below). The other bid alternates (Additive Alternates #2, 4 through 12, and 15) were previously bid and do not affect the current Trade Bid Packages, and therefore pricing for these alternates were not required. The various bid alternates are summarized below:

The Additive Alternates recommended for award include #1, #3, and #13. The total amount for those three Additive Alternates would add \$51,840 to the low Base Bid for Trade Bid Package 5B, and an additional \$58,900 to the low Base Bid for Trade Bid Package 5J. The total added amount of \$110,740 is \$28,740 more than the CM At-Risk's estimate of \$82,000. Additive Alternate #14, consisting of security screens at check-in/registration, is not recommended for award at this time.

For Trade Bid Package 5B, all Base Bids were above the CM At-Risk's Base Bid estimate of \$520,000. Albanese submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid of \$938,670 (Base Bid only), which is \$18,030 less than the next lowest bid submitted by Roebbelen Construction. The sizable variation between the cost estimate and the actual bids was evaluated by the cost estimating team and it was determined that there were some "premium" items that were not accounted for in the cost estimate, as well as an underestimate on the quantity of baserock. The project team has determined that the bids are in alignment with the scope of work in the bid documents. While the project budget can absorb the cost variation, staff will undertake a "value engineering" process to determine if feasible cost reductions can be realized at a future date. At this time, staff recommends that the trade contract for Trade Bid Package 5B, consisting of site concrete/caulking, be awarded to Albanese and that the award include the Base Bid (\$938,670) plus Additive Alternates #1 and #3 (\$51,840), for a total contract award amount of \$990,510.

For Trade Bid Package 5C, three bids were less than the CM At-Risk's estimate of \$490,000. Golden State submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid of \$423,280, which is \$17,901 less than the next lowest bid submitted by B.T. Mancini Company, Inc. Staff recommends that the trade contract for Trade Bid Package 5C, consisting of flooring, be awarded to Golden State for a total contract award amount of \$490,000.

For Trade Bid Package 5G, all bids were above the CM At-Risk's estimate of \$315,000. Shooter and Butts submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid of \$466,964, which is \$51,924 less than the next lowest bid submitted by Jensen Corporation. The January 10, 2012 Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors 369

cost estimating team has evaluated the variation between the cost estimate and the low bid and has determined that the estimate was undervalued and that the bids, in general, are in alignment with the bid scope. Staff recommends that the trade contract for Trade Bid Package 5G, consisting of landscaping and irrigation, be awarded to Shooter and Butts for a total contract award amount of \$\$466,964.

For Trade Bid Package 5H, the only bid submitted was above the CM At-Risk's estimate of \$110,000. Service Metal Products submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid of \$149,900. The cost estimating team has evaluated the variation between the cost estimate and the low bid and has determined that the estimate was undervalued due to recent additional scope items that were not included in the estimate. The project team has determined that the bid is in alignment with the bid scope and staff recommends that the trade contract for Trade Bid Package 5H, consisting of miscellaneous specialties, be awarded to Service Metal Products for a total contract award amount of \$149,900.

For Trade Bid Package 5J, one Base Bid was less than the CM At-Risk's Base Bid estimate of \$155,000. Westco submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid of \$149,600 (Base Bid only), which is \$68,780 less than the next lowest bid submitted by Concord Iron Works. Staff recommends that the trade contract for Trade Bid Package 5J, consisting of miscellaneous metals phase 2, be awarded to Westco and that the award include the Base Bid (\$149,600) plus Additive Alternate #13 (\$58,900), for a total contract award amount of \$208,500.

With the CM At-Risk project delivery method, the County contracts directly with the various trade contractors, and Turner, as CM At-Risk, manages the trade contracts with a Guaranteed Fixed Price and Guaranteed Completion Date. With award of the above five trade contracts for Trade Bid Packages 5B, 5C, 5G, 5H, and 5J, the total amount of trade contracts awarded to date is \$23,377,942. Recommendations for the award of other trade contracts will come before the Board at future dates.

The County's CM At-Risk, Turner, has submitted its documentation of good faith efforts to comply with the specifications and requirements of the County's Outreach Program for Trade Bid Packages 5B, 5C, 5G, 5H, and 5J. Staff recommends the Board determine that Turner, as the CM At-Risk, has documented an adequate good faith effort to comply with the requirements of the Outreach Program and that the Board waive any irregularities relating to the various Outreach steps and Turner's documentation.

Pursuant to the County's Project Labor Agreement (PLA) policy, a PLA is required for all trade contracts on this project. Albanese, Golden State, Shooter and Butts, Service Metal Products, and Westco have signed a PLA, which contains a local hire provision consistent with the Disposition and Development Agreement between the City of San Pablo Redevelopment Agency and the County. As a condition of trade contract award, Albanese's, Golden State's, Shooter and Butts', Service Metal Products', and Westco's subcontractors will also be required to sign the PLA.

The general prevailing rates of wages, which shall be the minimum rates paid on this project, are on file with the Clerk of the Board, and copies are available to any party upon request.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Failure to award the trade contracts for Trade Bid Packages 5B, 5C, 5G, 5H, and 5J would delay the project and could potentially result in the WCHC not being fully built and the loss of \$12 million in federal stimulus money.




Emergency medical service calls in Contra Costa County are handled by one of three emergency medical dispatch centers operated by Contra Costa County Fire Protection District, San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District, and the City of Richmond. Emergency medical service County Service Area EM-1 funds were previously used to cover the cost of installing ProQA software for emergency medical dispatch at the Contra Costa County and San Ramon Valley Fire Protection Districts, while the City of Richmond is now upgrading its CAD system with the ProQA software and has requested reimbursement from County Service Area EM-1 funds. With this upgrade, all emergency medical dispatch centers will have use of the same tools for use in prioritizing emergency medical service responses and providing pre-arrival instructions to persons call 9-1-1 with medical emergencies.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

The City of Richmond would need to bear the cost for ProQA software which was provided at CSA EM-1 cost for remaining areas of Contra Costa County.

CHILDREN'S IMPACT STATEMENT:

9-1-1 provides services for persons of all ages.





BACKGROUND: (CONT'D)

On January 1, 1987, the Board approved the County's participation in the program and authorized a three dollar increase in court filing fees. The Dispute Resolution Advisory Committee was created by the Board to consider implementation strategies and funding guidelines appropriate for Contra Costa County.

From 1989 through 1998, the Advisory Committee solicited proposals for funding under the Dispute Resolution Programs Act of 1986. The purpose of the funding is to encourage the establishment and use of local dispute resolution services as an alternative to formal Court proceedings. The program operates under the provisions of the Dispute Resolution Programs Act.

In 1998, the State updated the California Dispute Resolution Program Act and authorized counties to allocate up to \$8.00 from filing fees to generate new revenues for these local programs. Effective January 1, 1999, the dispute resolution portion of the civil filing fee in Contra Costa County increased from \$3.00 to \$8.00. The increase was approved by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to a request by the Superior Court.

The Dispute Resolution Advisory Committee received two applications in response to a Request for Proposals (RFP) issued on November 1, 2010 for two calendar years (2011 & 2012). The Committee met on December 9, 2010, to consider the funding and program composition of the County's dispute resolution programs and voted to fund both agencies at the levels described below.

The following is a brief description of each program:

Center for Human Development - \$102,500 General Dispute Resolution – Community Mediation Project will provide mediation and conciliation to landlords and tenants, consumers and merchants, neighbors, public agencies, citizen groups, families, animal disputes, family transition, and organizations. Specialty services include group facilitation, mediator training, real estate mediation, conflict resolution skills training for agencies, and business mediation and consultation. (\$55,000)

Guardianship Mediation will continue to offer mediation services with a panel of two mediators to clients referred by the Courts for resolution of child custody and visitation issues in Guardianship Matter. Mediations will be held in the Martinez Family Law Building. Services include referral, telephone conciliation, and mediation. (\$47,500)

Congress of Neutrals - \$127,500 General Dispute Resolution – Self Represented Litigants (SRL) Mediation will provide certified law student and volunteer mediators to assist the Small Claims Advisor in the community to provide information, assistance and case development for mediation and Alternative Dispute Resolution in the community, and where requested, to provide mediations for said litigants. In 2011, this program will focus on pre-day of hearing, small claims *in pro per* litigants. (\$15,000)

Victim Offender Reconciliation Project (VORP) Pilot Program - A new project providing a community based restorative justice program for juvenile offenders. The Congress will provide mediation between certain non-chronic, non-violent juvenile offenders and their victims to obtain civil restitution in proceedings under the Welfare and Institutions Code. (\$15,000)


Small Claims/Civil Harassment/Unlawful Detainer Mediation for all branches of the Superior Court; to improve court efficiency; assist court staff and reduce court caseload. Introduce disputants to the principles of conciliation and negotiated settlement; mediations will be done at the court, prior to the court hearing and/or on the day of the court hearing. The Congress will recruit and train community volunteers, certified law students and attorneys as mediators. This project will continue the Superior Court's high quality of Alternative Dispute Resolution and conflict management programs. (\$97,500)

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

The 2012 County Dispute Resolution program will not implemented resulting in a service reduction in several areas to the citizens of Contra Costa County.

INTRODUCTION

This report presents the results of the Trust Fund Closeout Audit conducted by the Department of Child Support Services (DCSS), Office of Audits and Compliance (OAC), for Contra Costa County Department of Child Support Services. The review of trust fund closeout reports prepared by the Local Child Support Agencies (LCSAs) was performed to ensure that all child support funds have been effectively transferred to the State one year after transition to the State Disbursement Unit (SDU).

BACKGROUND AND CRITERIA

The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 required all state IV-D agencies to establish a state-wide child support system, including an SDU for the collection and disbursement of payments. Once the establishment had been completed the counties were required to transition all undisbursed trust funds to the state. This closeout process commenced on the day that each county transitioned their child support funds to the SDU and ended one year later. Each county was required to submit their trust fund closeout reports within a year of transition.

The Family Code requiring this transition states, "(a) Upon the transfer of collection and disbursement activities from each county to the State Disbursement Unit, the auditor and controller of each county shall perform closeout activities as directed by the Department of Child Support Services to ensure accounting for all collections, obligations, and payments. All child support collections remaining undisbursed shall be transferred to the Department of Child Support Services for deposit in the Child Support Payment Trust Fund. The Local Child Support Agency Director and Auditor Controller shall perform these activities based on guidelines provided by the department and shall certify the results of these activities in a report submitted to the department within one year of transfer of collection and distribution functions to the state. (b) The department may contract for the audit of each county report submitted under subdivision (a). Each audit shall be completed within one year after the receipt of the report from the county."

In addition, the county was required to follow instructions provided by the State DCSS in Child Support Services Letter 05-32 and Child Support Services Informational Notice 06-08 and any criteria pertaining to these activities listed in the Plan of Cooperation (POC).

OBJECTIVE

The objective of the review was to determine that the transition reported by the county was accomplished as required and adequately reflected the transition of collection and disbursement activities of child support funds to the SDU.

SCOPE

The time period of the review commenced on the day each county transitioned its child support funds to the SDU and ends one year after transition.

METHODOLOGY

To accomplish our objectives, we:

- ensured that all required documentation has been accumulated for use in the audit;
- determined that all undistributed collections (UDC) in terms of exceptions and prepayments have been remitted to the State DCSS;
- verified that the LCSA submitted a check or warrant to DCSS Accounting Section for Welfare Distribution as per CS35 for the month prior to transition to the SDU;
- verified that the LCSA made periodic remittances to the State DCSS for amounts related primarily to the cancellation of warrants that were still outstanding as of the SDU transition date and subsequently cancelled;
- determined that the Trust Fund Closeout Report submitted by the County LCSA accurately reflected the progression of the LCSA from transition through the actual closeout of the fund and that the Financial Closeout Worksheet accurately reported the status of the trust fund upon closeout.

The OAC conducted this Trust Fund Closeout Audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Finding 1 - Non-compliance with deadline reporting requirements as stated in DCSS CSS Letter 05-32 dated November 1, 2005

The Trust Fund closeout report was signed by the Contra Costa County LCSA Director Linda Dippel on January 19, 2009 and signed by the County Auditor Controller on February 3, 2009. It was

received in the OAC on February 10, 2009, twenty-two months overdue. CSSIN Letter06-08 requires each county to submit the Child Support Trust Fund Closeout Report one year after transition to the SDU. The LCSA transitioned to the SDU on March 1, 2006 and the Closeout Report was due to the State DCSS on April 2, 2007. Since the LCSA subsequently submitted the report, there are no further recommendations.

Finding 2 – Inappropriate Write Off of Accounts Receivables with the use of Health Insurance Incentive funds

Original posted child report collection receipts were not picked up by the Informatix Imaging System and CASES interface. In an effort to solve the problem, the original receipts were backed out and a new file was submitted. Due to system procedure, both original and new receipts were run by the system resulting in duplicate child support payments. Most of the duplicate payments were recovered by the LCSA and the remaining unrecoupable amount of \$51,085 was written off using Health Insurance Incentive funds (HII). Family Code Section 17714 specifically limits the use of "excess" funds to support child support enforcement program only. Use of the HII to write off bad debts is not in accordance with Family Code Section 17714 and the Office of Budgets and Management (OMB) Circular A-87, now Title 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Subtitle A, Chapter II, Part 225.5 Bad debts, "including losses (whether actual or estimated rising from uncollectible accounts and other claims, related collection costs, and related legal costs are unallowable."

The OAC recommends the LCSA return \$51,085 to the HII fund.

Finding 3 – Remaining unreconciled/undisbursed child support funds in the Legacy Trust Fund 833700 not escheated at time of closeout

Legacy Trust Fund 833700 has a fund balance of \$81,686.18 which the LCSA claimed represents unidentifiable funds available for escheatment. The LCSA had one year from the time of transition to SDU to escheat and closeout the Trust Fund. The time to escheat for Contra Costa has long passed and the remaining funds are now due to the State DCSS consistent with instructions in CSSIN 06-08. The OAC recommends Contra Costa LCSA remit to the State DCSS \$81,686.16 and close out Trust Fund 833700.

Finding 4 - Inadequate fiscal control of child support trust funds

Child Support Trust Fund took two years to close and required assistance from an outside LCSA employee hired as a contractor to reconcile. The LCSA is responsible for maintaining and keeping

sound fiscal management. DCSS POC, Section IV, states that the county shall maintain accounting standards and systems consistent with uniform accounting procedures prescribed by federal and state requirements. We recommend the LCSA comply with the Department's POC.

CONCLUSION

Contra Costa County DCSS has completed the trust fund closeout activities including the return of unreconciled/undistributed child support funds to the state with the exception of the above finding(s).





In effort to ensure ongoing communication with the County Administrator, Board of Supervisors and Head Start Policy Council and the Economic Opportunity Council, attached is the Bureau's monthly report that contains all issues pertaining to the Head Start program, Community Action and Community Services Bureau (CSB).

Bureau Highlights

Date:

- > November Enrollment is reported at 100%
- > The Bureau submitted the Expenditure and Caseload Reports for the CalWORKS Stage 2 and Alternative Payment Childcare programs to the California Department of Education.
- > In compliance with ARRA reporting requirements, the Bureau submitted the ARRA reports for Department of Energy (DOE) Weatherization Assistance Program.
- The Bureau submitted the semi-annual financial status reports for ARRA Early Learning Mentor Coaches and Head Start Innovation and Improvement Project, Supporting Grandparents Raising Head Start Grandchildren programs in compliance with Federal regulations.
- Under the approved FY 2011-12 State Budget, if the revenue shortfall reaches \$1 billion or more below the estimated budget, "Tier 1 Trigger Cuts" will automatically occur. The Tier 1 cuts include \$23 million in reductions to the State's child development programs. The reduction, which is equivalent to 3%, will result in funding cuts to the Bureau's child development programs of approximately \$325,000 and will affect more than 70 full-time equivalent childcare slots.
- The CLOUDS database system project has been moving forward. Comprehensive Services staff and Teachers at Brookside have been trained on the CLOUDS and Wallpad systems. Additional enhancements have been made to the enrollment process in CLOUDS, and an iPhone application prototype has been developed (iForm) which is currently in the testing phase.

BACKGROUND: (CONT'D)

Attached is a letter from Goldfarb that requests that the County acknowledge and waive the potential conflicts that exist in a transaction in which Goldfarb will represent the County, as lender, and Affordable Housing Associates (AHA), as borrower. The letter sets forth the attorney-client relationships that could affect the firm's representation of the County and makes it clear that different attorneys within Goldfarb will represent the two sides. The proposed consent to Goldfarb's dual role is attached to Goldfarb's letter.

In the proposed transaction, the County will loan approximately \$1.5 million of Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) funds to AHA. Proceeds from the loan will be used by AHA to acquire and renovate a vacant bank-owned apartment complex in Concord. Once the renovation is complete, AHA will make all sixteen rental units available to the public as affordable housing. Goldfarb's role in representing the County will be to modify existing NSP loan documents - which are used by the County when making loans to developers who purchase, rehabilitate, and sell vacant bank-owned single-family homes - to be applicable to this transaction. The revised loan documents will be reviewed by the County Counsel's office and approved as to form.

Staff for the Conservation and Development Department has advised that they do not object to the potential conflict and recommend its waiver.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Goldfarb would not be able to continue to represent either the County or AHA in connection with the project. The result would likely be increased costs for the County and a delay in the completion of the transaction.

Dear Ms. Anderson and Ms. Friedland:

We are writing this letter in response to your request that Goldfarb & Lipman LLP ("Goldfarb & Lipman") jointly represent County of Contra Costa ("County) and Affordable Housing Associates ("AHA") in connection with the County's loan of NSP funds to AHA for the development of a 16 unit affordable housing project on property located at 1149 Meadow Lane and 1890 Robin Lane in Concord (the "Development").

The primary purpose of this letter is to advise you of a potential conflict of interest of Goldfarb & Lipman in the proposed representation and to request the County's and AHA's informed written consent to such potential conflict of interest and to the joint representation of the County and AHA in the Development. Although different Goldfarb & Lipman attorneys will be representing the County and AHA in the Development, such representation is still considered joint-representation.

Specifically, the County has requested our assistance in drafting documents evidencing the loan of NSP funds for the development. Isabel Brown and Polly Marshall will be the attorneys working with the County. AHA has requested our representation in the Development. Karen Tiedemann will be the attorney working with AHA.

Rules of Professional Conduct

As attorneys, we are governed by specific rules relating to joint representation of clients when we are representing more than one party in a transaction. According to the Rules 3-310(A), (B), (C), and (E) of the Rules of Professional Conduct of the State Bar of California, we must disclose certain information, and obtain the written consent of the County and AHA in order to represent both clients.

II. Joint Representation

As discussed above, the County's and AHA's consents are being requested because of the potential conflict of interest which may arise due to Goldfarb & Lipman's existing

relationships with the County and AHA, and the joint representation of each of you in the Development.

A. <u>Existing Relationships</u>

The County is an existing client. We represent the County on numerous housing loan transactions throughout the County.

AHA is also an existing client. We represent AHA in many development transactions and in various corporate activities.

The existing relationships that Goldfarb & Lipman have with each of you could create a potential conflict of interest as discussed below.

B. <u>Consequences of Joint Representation</u>

As you are aware, the interests and objectives of each of you on certain issues related to the Development/Transaction are, or may become inconsistent with one another. Therefore, it is important that you thorough understand the consequences of joint representation.

In representing both of you in this Development, Goldfarb & Lipman will strive to provide legal services which are equally beneficially to both the County and AHA. In other words, rather than vigorously asserting each of your respective interest in the Development, we will strive to reach agreements on matters that are mutually beneficially to both clients.

At this point, we feel that we can competently represent both the County and AHA. There are, however, some consequences of joint representation that the County and AHA should consider, and for which the advice of independent legal counsel should be sought.

1. <u>No Secrets</u>. First, Goldfarb & Lipman cannot maintain any secrets between the County and AHA in connection with the Development. In other words, anything disclosed by the County and AHA to Goldfarb & Lipman that is relevant to the representation must be disclosed to the other party. Therefore, if one party does not wish something relevant disclosed to the other party, then that party should not disclose it to us.

Additionally, in fulfilling our obligations to provide competent legal services, we may have to disclose to each party any information that we have obtained from any party in this transaction or any other transactions which may be relevant or material to this joint representation. Notwithstanding the foregoing, we would be required to obtain your <u>prior written consent</u> before we could make any such disclosures. At this point, we are unaware of any information that would require such disclosure.

2. <u>Adverse Interest</u>. Second, if any actual adverse interest develops between the County and AHA, then we will have to determine whether we can continue our representation. If we decide that the interests are too divergent and that we can no longer provide competent legal representation to both of the respective interests, then we will have to withdraw from representing either party in connection with the Development.

3. <u>Attorney-Client Privilege</u>. Finally, with joint representation, the County and AHA waive the attorney-client privilege between themselves in connection with this Development. This means that in the event of litigation between the County and AHA in connection with the Development, Goldfarb & Lipman could be compelled to testify against a party. Both parties would, however, maintain the attorney-client privilege against third parties who might sue them.

III. <u>Consents</u>

You should thoroughly review and consider the matters discussed in this letter, and perhaps seek independent counsel before providing your consent. If, after such review, each of you consents to Goldfarb & Lipman representing the County and AHA in the manner outlined above, please sign and return the attached consent form acknowledging that you have been advised of(i) Goldfarb & Lipman's past and continuing relationships with the County and AHA, (ii) the potential conflict of interest that Goldfarb & Lipman may have in its joint representation of the County and AHA in connection with the Development, and (iii) the consequences of such joint representation; and that you nevertheless, want to consent to our joint representation of the County and AHA in connection with the Development.







No General Funds are involved. The construction of the New Parking Lot 'E' will be provided by a combination of Federal and State funding, contained within the Contra Costa Regional Medical Enterprise 1 Capital Budget.

BACKGROUND:

Plans and specifications for the project have been prepared for the General Services Department by International Parking Design, Inc. and filed with the Clerk of the Board by the Deputy General Services Director. The construction cost estimate is \$400,000. The general prevailing wage rates are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and will be the minimum rates paid on this project.

For years, the Contra Costa Regional Medical Center campus has experienced on-going parking shortages for visitors and patients. A new surface Parking Lot 'E' is planned on the site adjacent to existing Parking Lot 'B' near the hospital building. New Parking Lot 'E' (46,760 s.f) will provide eighty new visitor parking stalls, including five ADA spaces. The site was previously occupied by two deteriorated buildings, which have been demolished. The project site and surrounding area is on County-owned property. Forty new trees will be planted as part of the landscaping throughout the parking area. Eleven existing trees will be removed, including three that were found to be in poor condition.

On May 26, 2011, the Department of Conservation and Development determined that the Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) per Section 15311, Class 11b, of the CEQA Guidelines.

Without the new parking lot, visitors and patients will continue to have difficulty finding parking at the Contra Costa Regional Medical Center.

No General Funds are involved. The new Martinez Wellness Center will be funded by a combination of Federal and State funding, contained within the Contra Costa Regional Medical Enterprise 1 Capital Budget, and a Federal Grant.

BACKGROUND:

Plans and specifications for the project have been prepared for the General Services Department by RMW Architecture and Interiors and filed with the Clerk of the Board by the Deputy General Services Director. The construction cost estimate is \$6,000,000. The general prevailing wage rates are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors and will be the minimum rates paid on this project.

A new, 10,000-square-foot, single-story, out-patient ambulatory and mental health clinic (Martinez Wellness Center) is planned to be constructed on existing Parking Lot 'A' on the Contra Costa Regional Medical Center (CCRMC) campus, in close proximity to the hospital building. The new clinic will replace a smaller, deteriorated health clinic building that was recently demolished. The new Martinez Wellness Center will provide essential ambulatory and mental health care services for County residents. Twenty-one existing parking stalls in Parking Lot 'A' will be lost due to construction of the new clinic. Five new ADA parking stalls and one drop-off parking space have been designed for the main entrance to the clinic. Visitor parking for the new clinic will be available across the street at the 20 Allen Street parking lot (45 spaces) and at the new Parking Lot 'E' (80 spaces) to be constructed on the CCRMC campus. Twenty-five new trees will be planted as part of the new landscaping around the clinic. Six existing trees will be removed, including two found to be in poor condition.



BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act, Article 15, Preservation of Local Government, the governing body of a political subdivision of the State is required to appoint three Standby Officers for each member of the governing body. Accordingly, Section 42-4.004 of the County Ordinance Code requires the Board to make such appointments.

A Standby Officer appointed by the Board is to serve in place of a regular Board member when the regular Board member is unavailable during a state of war emergency, a state of emergency, or a local emergency. (Unavailable means that the regular Board member has been killed, is missing, or is seriously injured as to be unable to attend meetings and otherwise perform his/her duties.)

Appointment of the specified Standby Officers will assure a line of succession so that in the event of the unavailability of one or more regular Board members during a state of war emergency, a state of emergency, or a local emergency, the business of the Board of Supervisors may continue to be conducted with a full complement of Board members. A Standby Officer shall serve until the regular officer becomes available or until the election or appointment of a new regular officer.

As required by County Ordinance Code, the status of these Standby Officer appointments will be reviewed annually to determine if any changes in appointees is necessary.

Government Code section 8641 sets out the duties of Standby Officers for the Board of Supervisors.

To be informed of the Supervisor's duties. 2) To be informed of the business and affairs of the County. 3) To immediately report for duty in the event of a state of war emergency, state of emergency, or state of local emergency.
 To fill the Supervisor's post when the Supervisor is unavailable (dead, missing, or seriously injured) due to a state of war emergency, state of emergency, state of emergency, or state of local emergency.

The County must provide the Standby Officers with copies of Article 15 Preservation of Local Government (Gov. Code, §§ 8635-8644.) (*See attachment.*) The County can also host meetings to keep the Standby Officers informed about County business and can require their attendance at these meetings. (Gov. Code, § 8641 (b).)

Standby Officers must take the same oath of office as the Supervisor and serve at the pleasure of the BOS. (Gov. Code, § 8640.)

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Without the appointment of the specified standby officers, there will be no line of succession in the event of the unavailability of one or more regular Board members during a state of war emergency, a state of emergency, or a local emergency. Therefore, the business of the Board of Supervisors may not continue to be conducted with a full complement of Board members.

2005 California Government Code Sections 8635-8644 Article 15. Preservation of Local Government

GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 8635-8644

8635. The Legislature recognizes that if this state or nation were attacked by an enemy of the United States, many areas in California might be subjected to the effects of an enemy attack and some or all of these areas could be severely damaged. During such attacks and in the reconstruction period following such attacks, law and order must be preserved and so far as possible government services must be continued or restored. This can best be done by civil government. To help to preserve law and order and to continue or restore local services, it is essential that the local units of government continue to function.

In enacting this article the Legislature finds and declares that the preservation of local government in the event of enemy attack or in the event of a state of emergency or a local emergency is a matter of statewide concern. The interdependence of political subdivisions requires that, for their mutual preservation and for the protection of all the citizens of the State of California, all political subdivisions have the power to take the minimum precautions set forth in this article. The purpose of this article is to furnish a means by which the continued functioning of political subdivisions will be assured. Should any part of this article be in conflict with or inconsistent with any other part of this chapter, the provisions of this article shall control.

Nothing in this article shall prevent a city or county existing under a charter from amending said charter to provide for the preservation and continuation of its government in the event of a state of war emergency.

8636. As used in this article, "unavailable" means that an officer is either killed, missing, or so seriously injured as to be unable to attend meetings and otherwise perform his duties. Any question as to whether a particular officer is unavailable shall be settled by the governing body of the political subdivision or any remaining available members of said body (including standby officers who are serving on such governing body).

8637. Each political subdivision may provide for the succession of officers who head departments having duties in the maintenance of law and order or in the furnishing of public services relating to health and safety.

8638. To provide for the continuance of the legislative and executive departments of the political subdivision during a state of war emergency or a state of emergency or a local emergency the governing body thereof shall have the power to appoint the following standby officers:

(a) Three for each member of the governing body.

(b) Three for the chief executive, if he is not a member of the governing body.

In case a standby office becomes vacant because of removal, death,

resignation, or other cause, the governing body shall have the power to appoint another person to fill said office.

Standby officers shall be designated Nos. 1, 2, and 3 as the case may be.

8639. The qualifications of each standby officer should be carefully investigated, and the governing body may request the Director of the Office of Emergency Services to aid in the investigation of any prospective appointee. No examination or investigation shall be made without the consent of the prospective appointee.

Consideration shall be given to places of residence and work, so that for each office for which standby officers are appointed there shall be the greatest probability of survivorship. Standby officers may be residents or officers of a political subdivision other than that to which they are appointed as standby officers. 8640. Each standby officer shall take the oath of office required for the officer occupying the office for which he stands by. Persons appointed as standby officers shall serve in their posts as standby officers at the pleasure of the governing body appointing them and may be removed and replaced at any time with or without cause. 8641. Each standby officer shall have the following duties:

(a) To inform himself or herself of the duties of the office for which the officer stands by. Officers and employees of the political subdivision shall assist the standby officer and each political subdivision shall provide each standby officer with a copy of this article.

(b) To keep informed of the business and affairs of the political subdivision to the extent necessary to enable the standby officer to fill his or her post competently. For this purpose the political subdivision may arrange information meetings and require attendance.

(c) To immediately report himself or herself ready for duty in the event of a state of war emergency or in the event of a state of emergency or a local emergency at the place and in the method previously designated by the political subdivision.

(d) To fill the post for which he or she has been appointed when the regular officer is unavailable during a state of war emergency, a state of emergency or a local emergency. Standby officers Nos. 2 and 3 shall substitute in succession for standby officer No. 1 in the same way that standby officer No. 1 is substituted in place of the regular officer. The standby officer shall serve until the regular officer becomes available or until the election or appointment of a new regular officer.

8642. Whenever a state of war emergency a state of emergency or a local emergency exists the governing body of the political subdivision shall meet as soon as possible. The place of meeting need not be within the political subdivision. The meeting may be called by the chief executive of the political subdivision or by a majority of the members of the governing body. Should there be only one member of the governing body, he may call and hold said meeting and perform acts necessary to reconstitute the governing body. 8643. During a state of war emergency a state of emergency or a local emergency the governing body shall:

(a) Ascertain the damage to the political subdivision and its personnel and property. For this purpose it shall have the power to issue subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of records.

(b) Proceed to reconstitute itself by filling vacancies until there are sufficient officers to form the largest quorum required by the law applicable to that political subdivision. Should only one member of the governing body or only one standby officer be available, that one shall have power to reconstitute the governing body.


(c) Proceed to reconstitute the political subdivision by appointment of qualified persons to fill vacancies.

(d) Proceed to perform its functions in the preservation of law and order and in the furnishing of local services. 8644. Should all members of the governing body, including all standby members, be unavailable, temporary officers shall be appointed to serve until a regular member or a standby member becomes available or until the election or appointment of a new regular or standby member. Temporary officers shall be appointed as follows:

(a) By the chairman of the board of supervisors of the county in which the political subdivision is located, and if he is unavailable,

(b) By the chairman of the board of supervisors of any other county within 150 miles of the political subdivision, beginning with the nearest and most populated county and going to the farthest and least populated, and if he is unavailable,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 94/153, the Knightsen Town Advisory Council (TAC) was created to advise the Board of Supervisors on specified matters relating to the community of Knightsen; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors in Resolution 2006/395 did amend the method of selection of members of the Municipal Advisory Councils (MACs) to determine that members shall be selected and appointed by the Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors on June 27, 2006 directed the County Administrator to prepare new resolutions for each MAC, amending the MAC membership selection and powers of authority to reflect changes approved in Resolution 2006/395; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors on December 16, 2008 directed the County Administrator to amend the establishing resolutions for each MAC to be consistent with the Board-adopted MAC policies and boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors on August 4, 2009, adopted Resolution 2009/349 amending the method of selection, territorial area, powers, and authority of the Knightsen TAC; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors on December 7, 2010, adopted Resolution 2010/576 amending the membership, term of office, eliminating provisions governing removal from office, quorum and vote necessary for action of the Knightsen TAC; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Knightsen Community Services District Board of Directors served as the Knightsen Town Advisory Council during the period of January 1, 2011 through June 30, 2011 as well as and July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Knightsen TAC and the Knightsen Community Services District (CSD) Board of Directors have expressed interest in having the elected Knightsen CSD Directors perform the Knightsen TAC functions for an additional year; and

WHEREAS, for ease of administration, it is preferable to have a single resolution governing the establishment and operation of the MAC;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, in its capacity as governing Board of the County of Contra Costa, that:

1. Establishment of the Knightsen Town Advisory Council Pursuant to the authority granted by Section 31010 of the California Government Code, the Knightsen Town Advisory Council ("Council") is established.

2. Territorial Area The area for which the Council will serve and discharge the following duties and powers is that area contained within the boundaries indicated on the attached map marked as Exhibit A, dated July 7, 2009 (hereafter referred to as the "Knightsen community".)

3. Membership The Council shall consist of five (5) members, each of whom shall be a current elected member of the Knightsen Community Services District Board of Directors, and who shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors, upon nomination of the District III Supervisor.

4. Term of Office The Council Members shall serve a year term from January 1, 2012, to December 31, 2012.

5. Council Duties and Powers The Council shall advise the Board of Supervisors on land-use planning matters affecting the Knightsen community and may represent the Knightsen community before the Board of Supervisors, the County Planning Commission and the Zoning Administrator on such issues as land-use, planning and zoning. The Council may also represent the Knightsen community before the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) on proposed boundary changes affecting the community.

The Council may advise the Board of Supervisors on services which are or may be provided to the Knightsen community by Contra Costa County or other local government agencies. Such services include, but are not limited to, public health, safety, welfare, public works, and planning. The Council may also provide input and reports to the Board of Supervisors, County staff or any County hearing body on issues of concern to the community.

It is understood that the Board of Supervisors is the final decision making authority with respect to issues concerning the Knightsen community and that the Council shall serve solely in an advisory capacity. Except as specified above, the Council and its individual members acting on behalf of the Council may not represent the Knightsen community to any state, other county, city, special district or school district, agency or commission, or any other organization on any matter concerning the community. In addition, the Council may not, as a body, take positions on candidates for any public office.

6. Compensation The Council Members shall serve without compensation of any kind, and the Board shall not provide funds for the payment of Council meeting stipends or reimbursement of Council members' expenses.

7. Staff and Financial Support a. Until such a time that the Board determines there is sufficient budgetary capacity, the Board shall provide no ongoing professional or clerical staff support to the Council or funds to pay for any Council's operating costs.
b. County staff will provide the Council in a timely manner with information and reports on planning matters (proposed General Plan and zoning changes, land-use permits, variance and subdivision applicants, etc.) transportation issues or projects, or any such matters which take place in, or will effect on, the Knightsen community. LAFCO staff will notify the Council of any boundary or sphere changes which may affect the Knightsen community.

8. Council Funds Any funds transferred to or received by the County for the Council shall be accepted pursuant to Resolution No. 2005/628 and only used for benefit of the Council and its area.

9. Council Establishment Not Subject to Vote The issue of establishment of the Council shall not be an election item submitted to the voters of the Knightsen community.

10. Council Operations and Procedural Rules Within the parameters of this Resolution, the Council may organize itself and operate as it determines but shall hold regular meetings at least monthly at an established time and place. The Council may develop bylaws for operation of the Council, but such bylaws must be approved by the Board of Supervisors to be effective. The Council meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the "Brown Act" (Government Code 54950 ff.) including the pre-meeting posting of meeting calendar notices. In addition, the Council shall fully comply with the Board of Supervisors' policy concerning conflict of interest and open meetings (Resolution No. 2002/376), the Board's policy governing appointments to boards, committees, and commissions (Resolution No. 2002/377), the Board's policies for Municipal Advisory Councils (approved December 16, 2008), and the Political Reform Act (Government Code sections 81000 ff.) as applicable.

11. This resolution supersedes and replaces Resolution No. 2011/288





The Health Services Department, Mental Health Division has been reporting to the Family and Human Services Committee regarding the services provided at the Children's Treatment Center located on Oak Grove Road in Concord since 1999. Due to changes in the State budget and the availability of funding, this battle was lost this year. Seneca Residential and Day Treatment Center had been providing services since 2001. Seneca, closed the Residential component of the program on March 31, 2011.

3 History of Children's Community Treatment Facility Program of Contra Costa County-Mental Health

Contra Costa Behavioral Health Mental Health Services Community Treatment Facility

<u>Overview</u>

In 1995 Contra Costa County contracted with FamiliesFirst to provide a high Level XIV group home at a county-owned facility located at 1034 Oak Grove Road, Concord, CA. It was a collaborative effort with involvement from four participating agencies—Education, Social Services, Probation, and Mental Health. It was the first residential placement facility in Contra Costa to focus on education, and day treatment for the most challenging adolescents in our County with fiscal support from partnering agencies. Its purpose was to divert youth from alternative placements, including State Hospitals, and offer treatment in a less restrictive environment near home. The concept was innovative for its time and there was great pressure, both politically and philosophically, to support its success. However the cost of providing such a program was prohibitive within the bureaucratic structure that it existed. The funding was inadequate to support such a high-level program, especially given the staffing structure required for these high-need residents and the regulatory controls that governed its existence. After four years of struggle, Families First terminated the contract with the County on June 30, 1999.

There still existed enthusiasm for developing a treatment model that would focus on the challenging population of youth described above. State Hospitals were closing and fewer and fewer beds were available for high-end troubled teens. Treatment models such as Community Treatment Facilities (CTFs) were opening up around the state. CTF's, unlike Level XIV's featured locked containment for its residents offering them and staff a safer and more secure environment. The Departments of Mental Health and Social Services were charged with the responsibility of drafting regulations to implement the CTF statute. These Regulations were completed in June 1998. Soon after, an RFP process was undertaken by County Mental Health, and a Mental Health contract was subsequently awarded to Seneca Residential and Day Treatment Center. The Board of Supervisors approved the contract on October 16, 2001 and Seneca was open for business at the 1034 Oak Grove location in Concord on November 1, 2001.

Funding Issues

FY 2001-2002

Seneca CTF Contract Year 1

The program was funded with multiple funding streams which included Aid for Dependent Children (AFDC) from Social Services; Early Periodic Screening and Diagnostic Treatment (EPSDT) from Mental Health; and Non Public School (NPS) funds from Education. In addition to state and federal funding from the three agencies, there was also a CTF State Supplement, County Realignment funds, and income from selling beds to other Counties. The first-year budget for the entire program was over \$4 million. This paper will focus on the costs associated with the Mental Health Department only.

Within three months of opening, the 18-bed facility was fully occupied by thirteen Contra Costa youth; four Solano County clients; and one Seneca discretionary bed. The Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors approved the initial Seneca CTF mental health contract in the amount of **\$1,964,416**. Supplemental costs (costs not paid for by Medi-Cal) to the County totaled \$682,000 which included start-up costs of over \$300,000.

FY 2002-2003

Seneca CTF Contract Year 2

The Contra Costa Board of Supervisors approved the second-year CTF contract in the amount of **\$2,551,900**, a \$587,484 increase. The program was gaining local and national attention and was considered a premier program in the state. A one-year anniversary event was organized by Seneca at the Oak Grove site, which was well attended by the county's elected officials, as well as staff and Department heads from the three partner agencies.

Distinguished guests, including Mark Desaulnier, Cynthia Miller and Judge Haight, spoke glowingly of the program's dedication and commitment to the County's most troubled youth. Seneca's motto of "unconditional care" was gathering the interest of local and state officials who respectively accepted invitations to visit the program's "circle time", an on site intense therapeutic session with the kids. Visiting the program and hearing the tragic stories from youth was helpful in fortifying political support for the program's continuation; however, the program was still costing the County \$469,896 in Realignment dollars, and Health Services and the CAO's office directed the department to control costs.

FY 2003-2004

Seneca CTF Contract Year 3

The Contra Costa Board of Supervisors approved the third-year CTF contract in the amount of **\$3,201,350**, a \$647,450 increase. The County's supplement was \$426,538. Program closure was being discussed due to the expense to the County.

FY 2004-2005

Seneca CTF Contract Year 4

Negotiations to change the funding structure of the program began with Seneca and the County. Over the course of the year, occupancy was reduced from thirteen to five beds, with remaining beds being sold to other Counties. The Board of Supervisors approved a contract for **\$1,438,425**; County Supplement was \$427,050.

FY 2005-2006

Seneca CTF Contract Year 5

During the 2005/2006 contract negotiations, Health Services and the CAO's office agreed to restructure the contract terms, eliminating Seneca's rent debt of \$336,000/year to the County. In return, the County would be relieved from appropriating Realignment dollars. The Board of Supervisors approved a contract for **\$795,300**, and no Realignment dollars were used in the contract.

FY 2006-2007

July 1, 2006 - December 31, 2007

Seneca CTF Contract Year 6

Five beds proved to be inadequate for the number of adolescents in need of the placement at Seneca. Our agency partner, Social Services, had not received a COLA increase in ten years and Mental Health was providing the "patch" necessary to make providers whole. The CTF contract for 06-07 was amended twice to add funds with a final contract payment limit of **\$2,345,066**. The County supplement was \$696,465. The contract was allowed to go into its six-month extension for the purpose of negotiation a program redesign. The program closed as a CTF on December 31, 2007.

FY 2008

January 1, 2008 – June 30, 2008

Seneca Level XIV Contract Year 7

In February 2007, an RFP process was undertaken by County Mental Health to overhaul the Seneca CTF program and return it to a Level XIV group home. Seneca was the sole bidder. An extraordinary program model was designed which included collaborating agencies West Coast Children's Center, Youth Homes, and Alternative Family Services. The services included extensive assessments, step-down residential placement, and family finding. Seneca was able to treat four times the number of clients than the CTF model allowed by shortening the length of stay and offering innovative program options listed above.

A six-month contract in the amount of \$1,666,820 was approved by the Board of Supervisors on January 8th. The County supplement was \$754,600. This was the first year that Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) dollars were used as a revenue budget item. SB 90, a claiming procedure for collecting Federal IDEA funds, allowed Counties to claim charges for seriously emotionally disturbed Special Education students who held an Individual Education Plan (IEP). The process of eligiblizing students for AB3632 began. The revised budget included \$200,000 in IDEA dollars, which helped to reduce County supplemental funding.

FY 2008-2009

Seneca Level XIV Contract Year 8

During this fiscal year, every child in the Seneca Level XIV program became eligible for services pursuant to AB3632, regardless of Medi-Cal status. Medi-Cal was the first payor of services, and an SB90 claim was used to collect for services that Medi-Cal did not cover. The Board of Supervisors approved a **\$4,668,922** contract payment limit for Seneca; 50% of the funding was IDEA/SB-90 Funds. On paper, there were no County dollars in the contract.

FY 2009-2010

The Board of Supervisors approved a contract in the amount of **\$4,429,440** on December 8, 2009. No county dollars were used to fund the contract. AB3632 funded \$442,000. There were no County dollars in the contract.

FY 2010-2011

On October 8, 2010 the Governor signed into law a bill that relieved Mental Health and Social Services of fiscal responsibility for AB3632 students. This action turned the responsibility for provision of mental health treatment and room and board over to Education. In Contra Costa, Education immediately fell heir to 650 students who were receiving mental health services in the Districts' Special Ed classrooms and in Residential placements in and out of state. When Education officials learned of the unit cost per child at Seneca they took immediate action and began stepping students down to lower levels of care elsewhere. While closing the program may have been eventually inevitable due to its high cost, the Governor's legislative action hastened its final demise. Seneca closed the Residential component of the program on March 31, 2011. School-based services continued until July 30.

Seneca had a closing event at the site where staff, both old and new, met to recount memories and experiences. Unlike the one-year anniversary celebration in 2002, it was a modest and somber event. The distinguished guests who spoke at *this* event were the program's committed staff whose unwavering devotion and commitment to troubled adolescents helped to make this program a premier model in the state.

Summary


In September 2011 Seneca started an intensive school-based program in Central County called Glenbrook which is devoted to high-end students stepping down from Residential placement. It is a collaborative model with Mt. Diablo School District and Mental Health with funding from Medi-Cal and Educationally Related Mental Health Services (formerly AB3632). This program offers best practices programming and provides the intense supports that these youth require.

Mental Health Services has continued to track the individuals who transitioned from Seneca's program. Some have stepped down from locked out-of-state placements; others have transitioned home and into local schools such as Glenbrook offering intensive day treatment. Two girls have entered the Juvenile Justice system and one boy is currently in Juvenile Hall.

The county facility at 1034 Oak Grove is in program development for a continuum of care for Transitional Age Youth, inclusive of residential care and early intervention to psychosis with emphasis on multi-family treatment consistent with Psychosis Intervention Early Recovery (PIERS) Model.



California Education Code section 1240(c)(2)(B) requires that schools identified in the Williams Settlement in our county be visited within the first four weeks of school, that noted areas be reviewed, and that a report be submitted to you and your governing board for inclusion at a regularly scheduled November board meeting. It is the legal obligation of the Contra Costa County Superintendent of Schools to provide this information to the Contra Costa County Board of Education.

The Williams Case was a class action lawsuit filed in San Francisco County Superior Court in 2000 against the State of California and state education agencies including the California Department of Education. The basis of the lawsuit was that the agencies failed to provide public school students with equal access to instructional materials, safe and decent school facilities, and qualified teachers.

Governor Schwarzenegger settled the suit and subsequent legislation charged the County Superintendents of Schools with conducting audits of schools with Academic Performance Index ratings in deciles 1, 2, and 3 according to data from 2009. The audit team has the responsibility of meeting with school officials and reporting information. The intention is to identify areas of need and to use the funds from the Williams Settlement to address these needs.

The enclosed report represents data from those visitations in Contra Costa County that took place in Fall 2011. Teams from the Contra Costa County Office of Education visited classrooms in order to count books and check the physical condition of the schools; in addition, the CCCOE reviewed teacher credentials. Follow-up visits will be conducted in Fall 2012.





BACKGROUND:

On December 13, 1999, the Board of Supervisors approved the Small Business Enterprise (SBE) Program for the purpose of providing small businesses a fair share of County business. The program covers construction contracts of \$25,000 or less, and purchasing and professional/personal services contracts of \$50,000 or less. For those contracts and transactions that are not exempt from the program, 50% of the dollar amount will be awarded to small businesses, as defined in the program. The Board directed the County Administrator to work with County departments to implement the program and referred the program to the Internal Operations Committee (IOC) for continuing policy oversight and development of recommendations for program changes, if warranted. For example, at the IOC's recommendation, the Board of Supervisors in 2006 exempted certain limited categories of purchases and services in which departments could not achieve SBE Program goals due to the specialized nature of the transactions and the limited number of providers of those goods and services.

The Outreach Program was adopted by the Board of Supervisors in August 1998 to promote broad outreach to all businesses, currently including MBE, WBE, DVBE, SBE, LBE, and other businesses. It currently applies to professional/personal service contracts in the amount of \$2,500 or more, purchasing contracts in the amount of \$10,000 or more.

The IOC has provided policy oversight on the programs since their inception, including surveying County departments on the implementation of the SBE and Outreach Programs and overseeing the progression to electronic web-based outreach. We find that most County departments are actively participating in the programs and meeting program goals. The Affirmative Action Officer monitors performance quarterly and updates the IOC semi-annually. The Affirmative Action Office sends letters to those departments not fully complying with the programs or meeting program objectives, and follows up through the IOC with reports of any problems or recommendations for program modification. If necessary, the IOC may request a department to submit an explanation for any lack of participation in the programs.

On December 12, 2011, the IOC accepted the attached report from the Interim Affirmative Action Officer and directed staff to forward the report to the full Board of Supervisors for review and approval.

Data has been collected from departmental "Small Business Enterprise" (SBE) Liaisons for inclusion in the attached reports.

Notwithstanding the retirement of the County's full-time Affirmative Action Officer (and SBE Program Coordinator) in March 2011, most departments continued to collect data pertaining to the County's SBE program, on their own initiative, on a regular basis. Some data remains incomplete at this time but are expected to be available and incorporated into a final report prior to December 31, 2011.

To prepare the reports, in addition to identifying contracts made to SBE businesses, departments have in the past been asked to report the total number and total dollar amount of all contracts that fall within program thresholds. For each department, this self-reported figure (for total contracts meeting the threshold) is used as the base to determine the percentage of all such contracts that are awarded to SBE businesses. The validity of the data included in the attached reports depends on the reliability of these self-reported departmental figures for all contracts meeting the SBE program thresholds.

For the first time, departmental data has been combined in a single SBE "database" in MS Office which will facilitate quantitative analysis across departments and over time. Further improvements in the design of this simple database could serve to streamline the process of data collection for departments, and it could be easily enabled to collect data on other business enterprise program goals (e.g. WBE, MBE, DVBE, and others).

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (1) ACCEPT this 2010 Semi-Annual SBE and Outreach Programs Report, reflecting departmental data for the period July 1 through December 31, 2010; and,
- (2) ACCEPT this 2011 Semi-Annual SBE and Outreach Programs Report, reflecting departmental data for the period January 1 through June 30, 2011.

I. <u>Results for the Period June to December, 2010</u>

As detailed and summarized in Table 1 below, County Departments consistently made efforts on a continuing and ongoing basis to support the County's Small Business Enterprise (SBE) goals and Outreach Program requirements. **Table 1** lists all departments and their SBE participation statistics for this period. **Table 1A** presents the same data organized by type of contract. **Table 3** details Outreach activities for those departments reporting such outreach in this period. Highlights include:

Small Business Enterprise Program (Tables 1, 1A)

- <u>Purchasing</u> Approximately \$984,000 in total purchasing transactions were awarded to SBEs, with seven departments (22%) reporting that they met or exceeded the 50% SBE contracting goal for this period;
- <u>Professional/Personal Services Contracts</u> Over \$6 million awarded to SBEs, with seven departments reporting that they met or exceeded the 50% SBE contracting goal for this period; and,
- <u>Construction Contracts</u> The Public Works department reported over \$50,000 dollars awarded to SBEs.

Outreach Program (Tables 3, 5)

- <u>Purchasing (E- Outreach)</u> <u>1526</u> MBEs, WBEs, SBEs, LBEs, and DVBEs were the total number of vendors contacted;
- <u>Purchasing (by Departments)</u> <u>More than 8800</u> Small Business Enterprises were contacted through County Departments and the Purchasing Division of the General Services Department in connection with contracting opportunities exceeding \$72.5 million (Table 3); many additional minority, women, and disabled veteran's business enterprises were also actively solicited for these opportunities.
- <u>Professional/Personal Service Contracts</u> <u>481</u> MBEs, WBEs, SBEs, LBEs, and DVBEs were the total number of consultants/service providers contacted in connection with contracting opportunities exceeding \$57.3 million for this contract type; and

 <u>Construction Contracts</u> – <u>3</u> MBEs, WBEs, SBEs, LBEs, & DVBEs contacted in connection with approximately \$11.9 million in construction contracts that were reported as falling within SBE program thresholds in this period.

II. <u>Results for the Period January to June, 2011</u>

As detailed and summarized in Table 2 below, County Departments consistently made efforts on a continuing and ongoing basis to support the County's Small Business Enterprise (SBE) goals and Outreach Program requirements. **Table 2** lists all departments and their SBE participation statistics for this period. **Table 2A** presents the same data organized by type of contract. **Table 4** details outreach activities for those departments reporting such outreach in this period. Highlights include:

Small Business Enterprise Program (Tables 2, 2A)

- <u>Purchasing</u> Approximately \$279,000 in total purchasing transactions were awarded to SBEs, with seven departments (of twelve reporting) indicating that they met or exceeded the 50% SBE contracting goal for this period;
- <u>Professional/Personal Services Contracts</u> Over \$4.4 million was awarded to SBEs, with 10 departments -- all of the departments that reported statistics for this period -- reporting that they met or exceeded the 50% SBE contracting goal; and,
- <u>Construction Contracts</u> Over \$62,000 dollars in construction fun_s was awarded to SBEs, with both departments which reported construction contract activity indicating that they met the 50 percent participation goal for SBE firms.

Outreach Program (Tables 4, 6)

- <u>Purchasing (E- Outreach)</u> –A comprehensive report from the County Purchaser is attached as Table 6, which reports the results of Purchasing's "electronic outreach" to business enterprises of various kinds in this period. The report shows almost \$12.5 million was the subject of electronic outreach activities to 3,235 vendors, with the distribution among MBEs, WBEs, SBEs, LBEs, and DVBEs as shown in Table 6.
- <u>Purchasing (by Departments)</u> –Table 4 reports Outreach Program activity by reporting departments. Although not arranged by contract type, Table 4 reveals that the total number of departmental contacts with different business enterprises, in connection with purchasing of commodities, was <u>144 contacts</u>, made by three departments involving approximately \$213,000 in purchases.
- <u>Professional/Personal Service Contracts</u> Data in Table 4 also reflects that the total number of departmental contacts with different business enterprises, in connection with Professional and Personal Service Contracts, was <u>848 contacts</u>. These

contacts included outreach to 495 Small Business Enterprises, involving \$76.6 million in Health Services Department contracts as well as \$2.7 million in other contract awards.

• <u>Construction Contracts</u> – Table 4 reflects that <u>**317**</u> MBEs, WBEs, SBEs, LBEs, & DVBEs were contacted by County departments for outreach in connection with more than \$837,000 in construction opportunities.

Amended and Renewed Contracts

The County continues to monitor the number of amended and renewed contracts in each SBE and Outreach Program reporting period. The emphasis is on reducing the large number of amended and renewed contracts within the SBE and Outreach Programs and to require departments to outreach every three years for all contracts.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. **APPROVE** staff recommendation to allocate \$73,797 in additional funds from the Emergency Solutions Grant for FY 2011/12 to Shelter, Inc. to provide Rapid Rehousing services to Urban County clients and \$11,366 to the Department of Conservation and Development for administrative costs.
- 2. **DIRECT** staff to prepare a report on the Committee's actions to be considered by the Board of Supervisors at its meeting on January 10, 2012.

BACKGROUND

The Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH Act), enacted into law on May 20, 2009, consolidates three of the separate homeless assistance programs administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act into a single grant program, and revises the Emergency Shelter Grants program and renames it as the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. The HEARTH Act also codifies into law the Continuum of Care planning process, a longstanding part of HUD's application process to assist homeless persons by providing greater coordination in responding to their needs.

This ruling revises the regulations for the Emergency Shelter Grants program by establishing the regulations for the Emergency Solutions Grants program, which replaces the Emergency Shelter

Grants program. The change in the program's name, from Emergency Shelter Grants to **Emergency Solutions Grants**, reflects the change in the program's focus from addressing the needs of homeless people in emergency or transitional shelters to assisting people to quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis and/or homelessness. Consequently, the intent of the new ESG program is to build upon those services developed through the Homeless Prevention/Rapid Rehousing (HPRP) program that was funded as part of the 2009 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The County received \$1,421,551 in funding for the HPRP program and contracted with Shelter, Inc. as the lead agency. Shelter, Inc. in turn contracted with several partner agencies countywide to ensure that services were provided throughout the Urban County. Under their direction the program has far exceeded the original goals for number of households served and it is anticipated that all funds will be expended well before the August, 2012, deadline. HUD has notified the County it is eligible to receive an additional **\$85,163** in ESG funding for the current fiscal year.

Proposed Allocation of Additional ESG Funds: The new ESG regulations limit the amount to be allocated to street outreach and emergency shelter activities to 60 percent of the grant amount or the amount allocated in FY 2010/11, whichever is greater. Because the County allocated its entire ESG grant this year for emergency shelter activities (see Exhibit 1), the additional ESG funding must be used for the new services outlined in the regulations - specifically homeless prevention and rapid rehousing activities.

Therefore, staff recommends \$73,797 be allocated to Shelter, Inc. to provide additional rapid rehousing services to **assist approximately 21 homeless households move into permanent housing.** In addition, staff recommends allocating \$11,366 to the Department of Conservation and Development to cover administrative costs.

In response to the new requirement for greater coordination among homeless assistance providers, staff recommendations were presented to the Contra Costa Interjurisdictional Council on Homelessness ("CCICH") on December 9, 2011. CCICH is charged with providing a forum for communication and coordination about the overall implementation of the Ten Year Plan to End Homelessness and providing advice and input on the operations of homeless services. Staff will provide an oral update on the action taken by CCICH.

Needle Exchange Update

November 2011 Prepared for the Contra Costa Board of Supervisors by Contra Costa Health Department

NEEDLE EXCHANGE

In 1999, the Contra Costa Board of Supervisors endorsed a State of Emergency with respect to HIV and AIDS to allow for the provision of needle exchange services. A major interest was to reduce transmission in women and to their unborn children.

Since 2006, a State of Emergency declaration is not needed.


New 2012 Legislation

- **AB 604 Skinner**. State Office of AIDS may authorize syringe exchange services in any location where conditions exist for the spread of infections through the sharing of used hypodermic needles and syringes.
- SB 41 Yee. Individuals 18 years of age and up may purchase and possess up to 30 syringes for personal use when acquired from an authorized source. Specifies that pharmacists, physicians and syringe exchange programs are authorized sources of nonprescription syringes. Requires pharmacies which offer NPSS to provide options for safe syringe disposal.

HIV/AIDS in Contra Costa County

- As of December 31 2010, **1,875** individuals were reported living with AIDS or HIV in Contra Costa.
- Approximately 80% are male and 19% are female. African Americans are 30% of those living with HIV or AIDS, Whites 47% and Hispanics nearly 19%.
- Predominant transmission among those living with HIV or AIDS remains men who have sex with other men (MSM). Injection Drug Use is about 17% of the caseload

HIV/AIDS Attributed to Injection Drug Use (IDU)





Reported Chronic Hepatitis C Cases Over Time




Law Enforcement and First Responder Exposures




Needle Exchange and CHE 🗼

- Approximately 3% accept referrals.


Reported Contacts (Individuals) at Needle Exchange Sites Over Time




Number of Syringes Distributed **X** By CHE Over Time




Secondary Exchanges Reported By CHE Over Time





CONCLUSIONS

1. Access to clean needles through needle exchange and pharmacy syringe services is making a difference in Contra Costa and remains a critical component of the overall strategy to reduce transmission of blood borne diseases. Overall infections attributed to injection drug use have declined over time and the availability of needle exchange and pharmacy syringe sales has played a role in this trend.

2. Reported local law enforcement exposure to potential blood borne pathogens via needle stick injury has not increased since needle exchange and pharmacy sales have been implemented. Materials for Law Enforcement to document potential exposure and request assistance remain available on the website.

3. New legislation removes the requirement for the Health Department to certify pharmacies to dispense syringes and replaces the requirement for an annual report on Syringe Exchange to a biennial report. No major impact is anticipated in Contra Costa at this time.

BACKGROUND:

The Bay Area Regional Interoperable Communications System (BayRICS) Joint Powers Authority (JPA) is engaged with Motorola Solutions, Inc. in a project to build the Bay Area Wide Enhanced Broadband (BayWEB) high speed data service system for use by various public safety agencies within the San Francisco Bay Area. This new system will utilize the frequency band allocated by the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) for public safety (700MHZ) and will be based on the new "Long Term Evolution" (LTE) wireless data standard. Contra Costa County coverage will be provided by utilizing many of the County's current radio sites such as Kregor Peak, Highland Peak, Cummings Skyway, and Nichol Knob.

The Site Access and Use Agreement specifies terms and conditions that allow Motorola Solutions, Inc. to access County owned or leased radio sites and facilities to build and maintain the BayWEB system. The Board of Supervisors first approved this agreement on November 8, 2011 (Agenda Item No. C.49), subject to approval as to form by County Counsel, but was never executed by the parties, and the terms of the proposed agreement have substantively changed in two areas:

1. <u>Land Use/Building Permit Terms</u>: The first version of this agreement did not directly address land use and building permits. This version of the agreement specifies that the County will facilitate the processing of land use permits, building permits, and environmental review items based on plans submitted by Motorola at the expense of the County.

2. <u>Descoping the Project to Remove the Public Access System</u>: Due to lack of interest by other jurisdictions within the greater San Francisco Bay Area, Motorola will be submitting to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) a request to "de-scope" the BayWEB project to remove the Public Access System component of the BayWEB system. For this reason, legal counsel for both parties have removed all references to the Public Access System from the Agreement.

It is important to note that although the Public Access System was a major component of the larger project, it was secondary to the primary goal of deploying an interoperable public safety broadband system to the region. Contra Costa County has remained on record as being supportive of the original BayWEB concept, including both the Public Safety and Public Access systems; however, due to lack of interest, Motorola has determined that it is necessary to abandon the Public Access System concept to avoid jeopardizing the Public Safety system.

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Motorola Solutions, Inc. will not be able to legally access certain Contra Costa County radio sites to construct the BayWEB system.

CHILDREN'S IMPACT STATEMENT:
