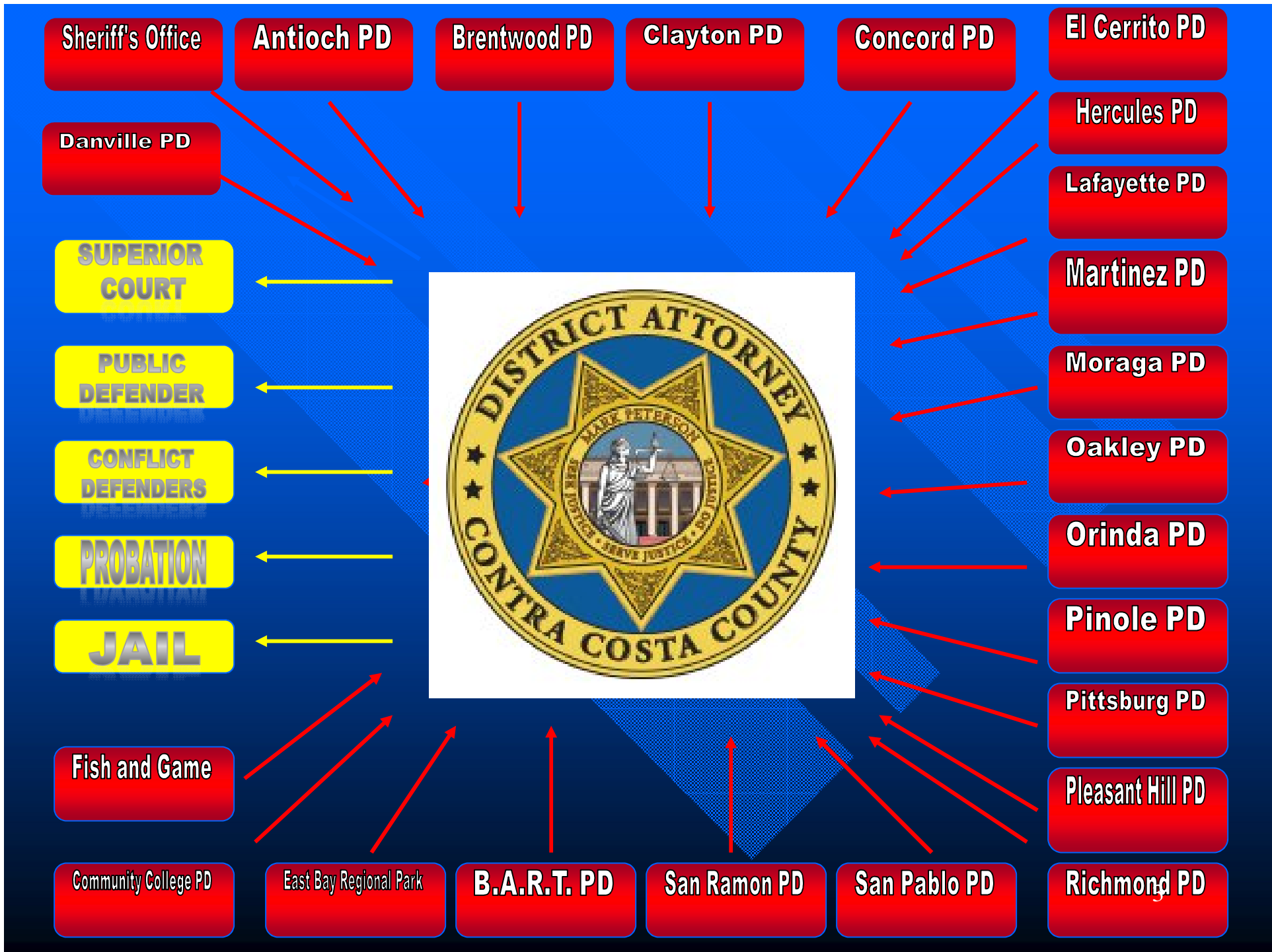

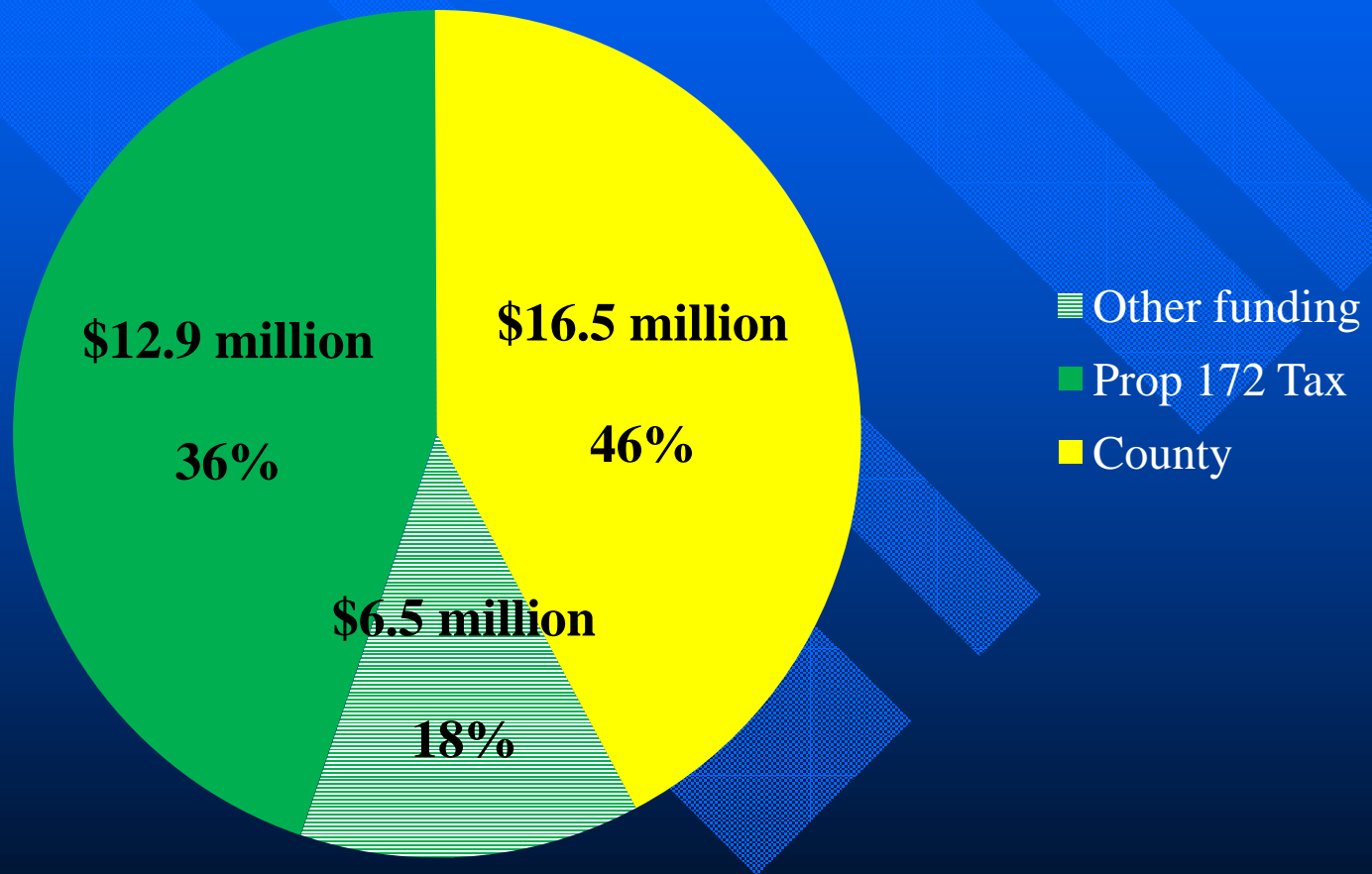

Parents face charges over kids' truancy

Two parents of students attending Rodeo Hills Elementary School must appear in criminal court next month because their children were absent from too many classes this year.

The Contra Costa County District Attorney's Office made a public statement announcing the case, the first time in county history parents are facing charges for not ensuring their children attend school.

The two parents each have at least one student at the school, District Attorney Mark Peterson said. Both face a misdemeanor charge for "failing to encourage their truant children's attendance

in school," referencing a new law dealing with child neglect.

One student, a fifth-grader, missed more than half of the current school year with unexcused absences. The other, a third-grader, missed more than one-third of the school year unexcused.

"Our goal is to get these kids back in school and to get parents to take responsibility for making that happen," Peterson said.

Peterson works closely with school districts around Contra Costa County regarding truancy. Prosecutors filed these two cases Friday be-

cause they were particularly egregious and because the John Swett Unified School District devoted a lot of time and effort to resolving the problem with the parents, without success. Bay Area News Group is not identifying the defendants to protect the identity of their children.

The new law took effect in January 2011. It applies to parents of truant children in kindergarten through eighth grade.

Each parent will receive mailed notices instructing them to appear in court next month, Peterson said.

If convicted, they could face as much as a year in county jail and a \$2,000 fine.

The superintendent of the John Swett district could not be reached for comment.

On duty at the courthouse

Facility dogs relax victims, witnesses

Law enforcement finds canines put people at ease enough to give testimony

MARTINEZ — A recent hire by the Contra Costa County District Attorney's Office doesn't know much about the law. She has a limited vocabulary, sleeps

on the floor for much of the workday and drinks water from a bowl.

But what Joann III, a 2-year-old yellow Lab, lacks in higher education, she makes up for in soothing companionship. Joann III — her friends call her Jojo, and most everyone is her friend — is a courthouse facility dog. Her job is to provide emotional support to victims and witnesses for whom interact-

San Pablo man charged

DNA evidence links suspect to two cold case slayings

Newly upgraded technology helps find match in archives

MARTINEZ — Authorities say that with DNA evidence — and by putting their heads together — they have solved the mystery of two decades-old murder cases and charged the same man for both.

William Lee Huff, 51, of San Pablo, has been charged with murder with special circumstances in the deaths of Deanna Butterfield, 21, in 1987, and Mueylin Saechao, a Laotian immigrant in her mid-50s, in 1993.

Huff was in custody in Solano County but was transferred to the Martinez jail Tuesday, according to Contra Costa District Attorney Chief of Forensics Investigator Paul Holes.

The key was DNA testing, which emerged as a reliable forensic tool in 1985, just two years before the first killing.

According to Holes, Huff's DNA has been in a law enforcement databank since 2006. While San Pablo police had DNA from the two murder investigations, they only recently upgraded their technology to be able to search the databank in which Huff's DNA has been archived. Shortly after the upgrade, the match was discovered.

Both cases were reopened in a collaborative effort by the Contra Costa District Attorney's Cold Case Unit, the East Bay Regional Park District and San Pablo police, Contra Costa District Attorney Mark Peterson said.

Huff was originally a suspect in the killing of Butterfield, who was raised in Livermore and had a 4-year-old daughter. Butterfield's partially clothed body was found in Tilden Park near Orinda on Dec. 5, 1987. She had

been sexually assaulted and suffocated.

In a 2000 story in the Contra Costa Times, Butterfield's daughter, Melissa Silva, said her mother was struggling with drug addiction just before her death. Silva also vowed to find her mother's killer.

"It would be great knowing the person who did this isn't out there and able to

do that to somebody else," Silva said.

Authorities believe Huff killed Saechao in a similar manner six years later. Saechao's partially clothed body was found in the backyard of her boyfriend's San Pablo residence the morning of June 11, 1993. She had been sexually assaulted and strangled with a sock.

DNA evidence collected at the crime scenes linked Huff to the killings.

"We are very pleased with the success of our recently formed Cold Case Unit," Peterson said. "Solving cold case murders and rapes is a priority for our office in order to bring those responsible to justice, and provide closure for victims and their families."

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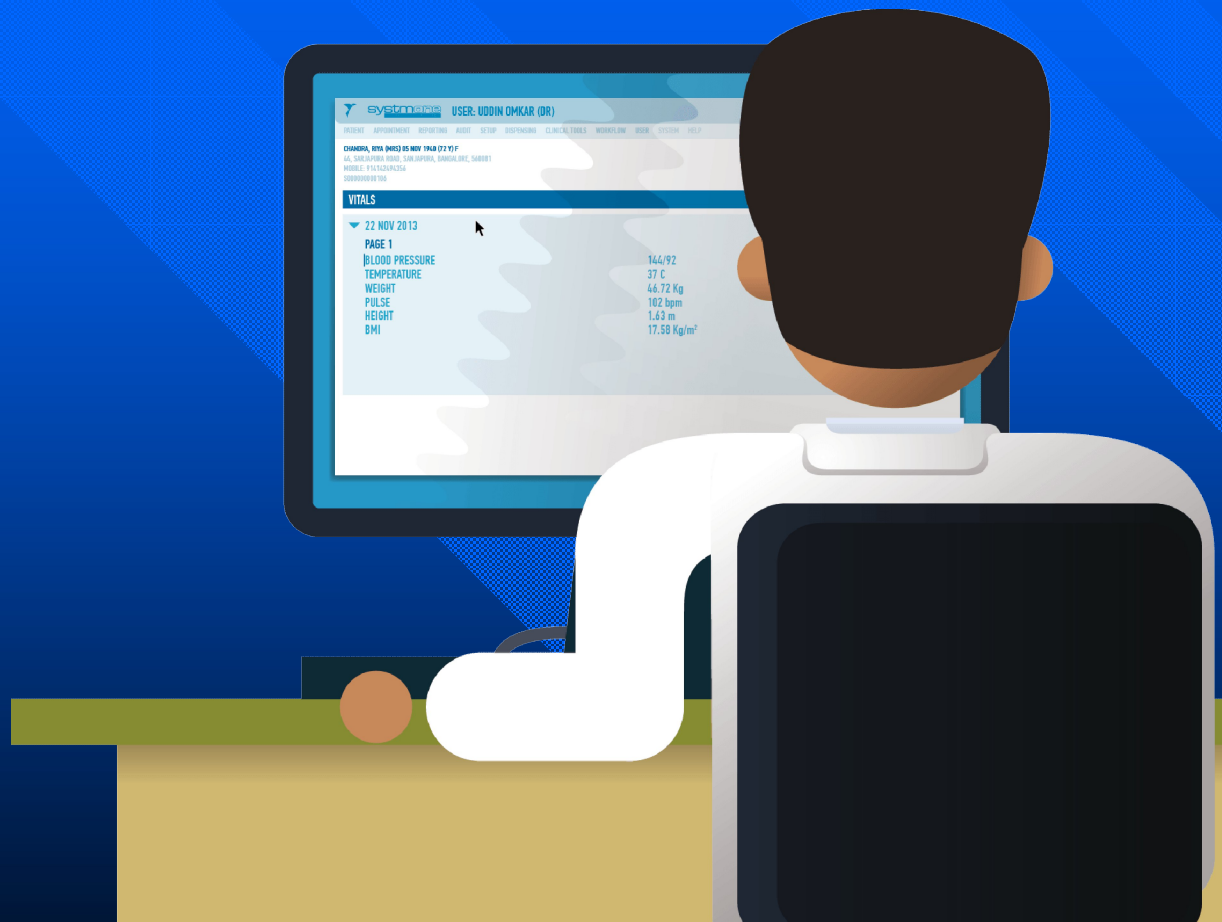

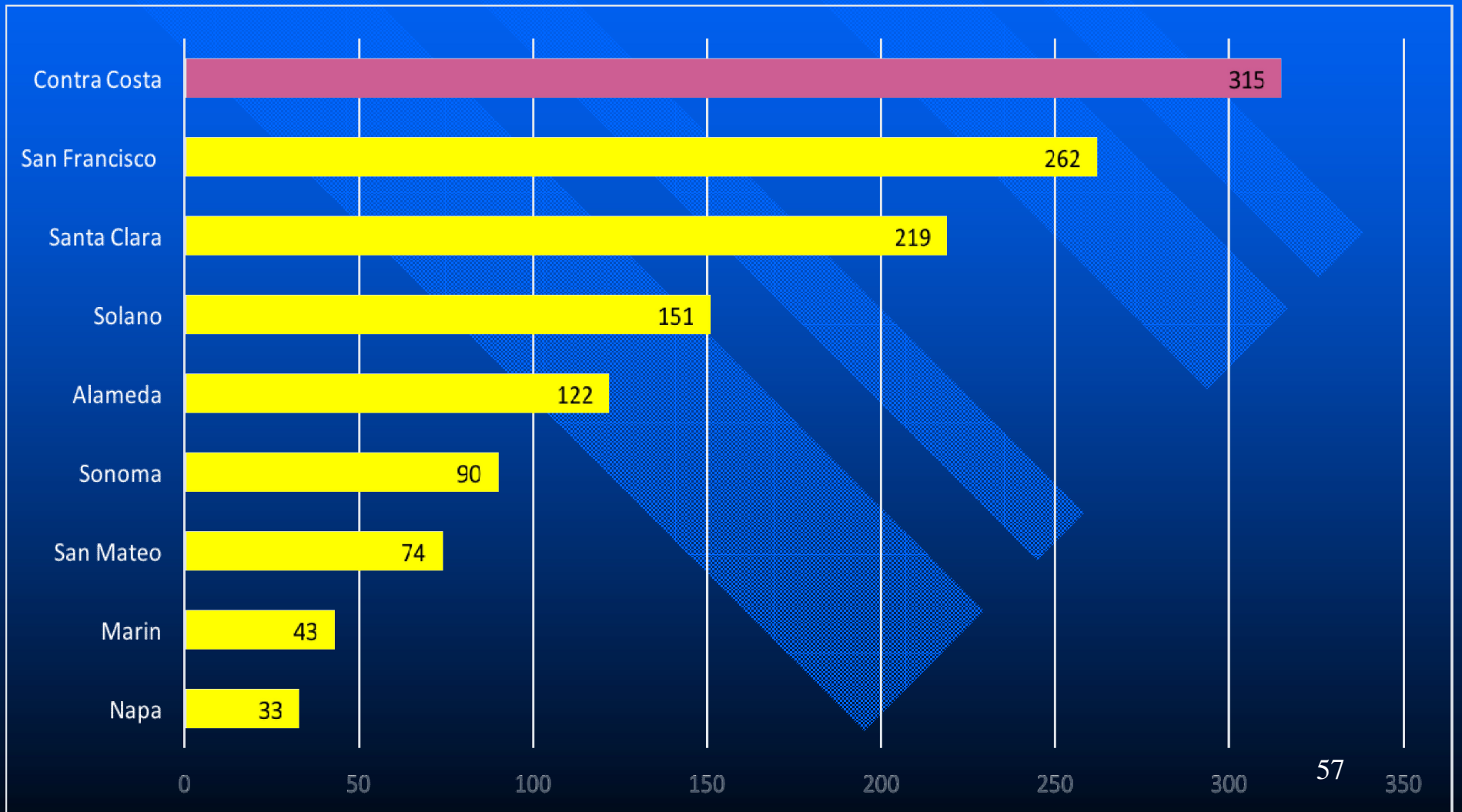

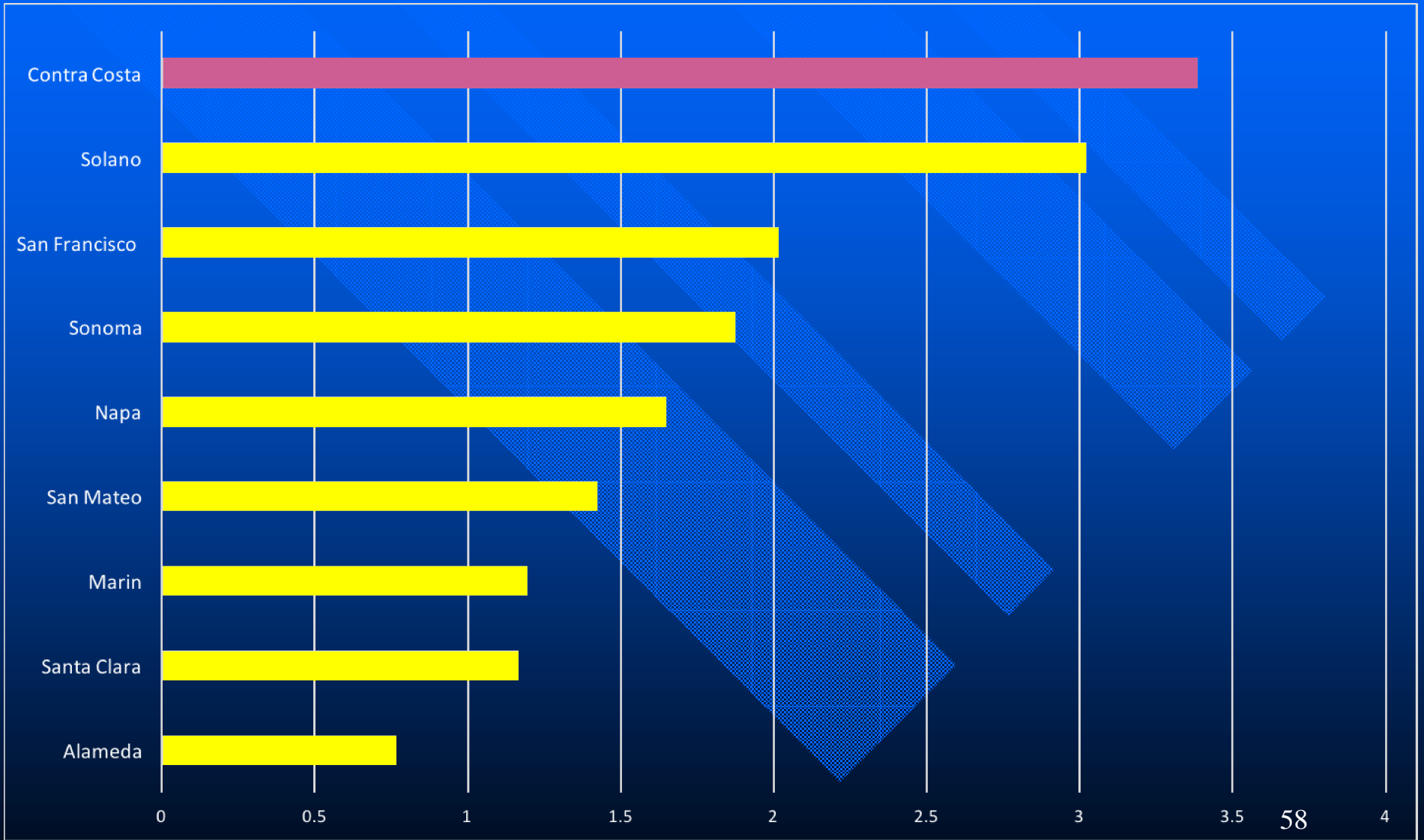

Total Criminal Jury Trials 2014-2015



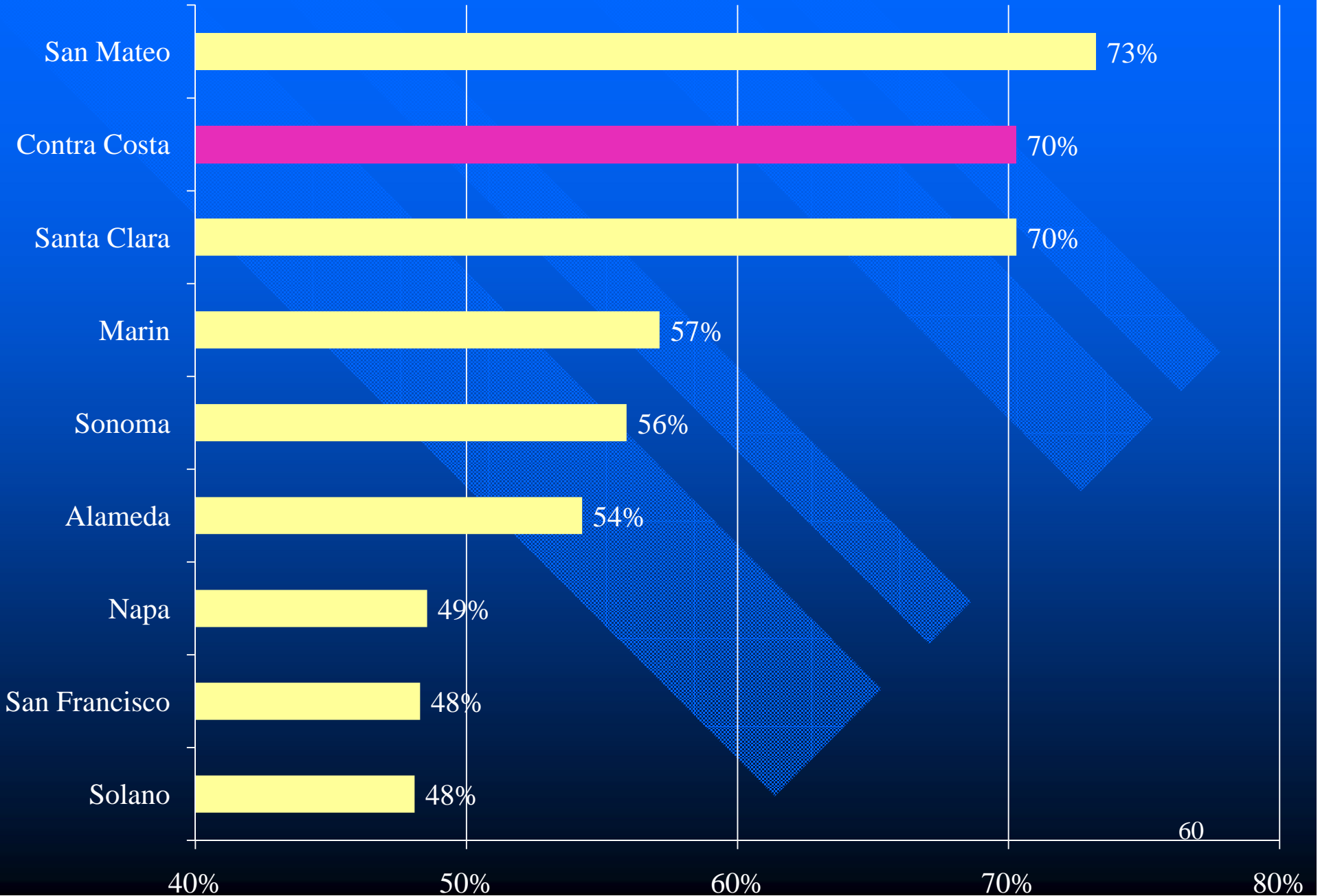
Trials Per Deputy District Attorney



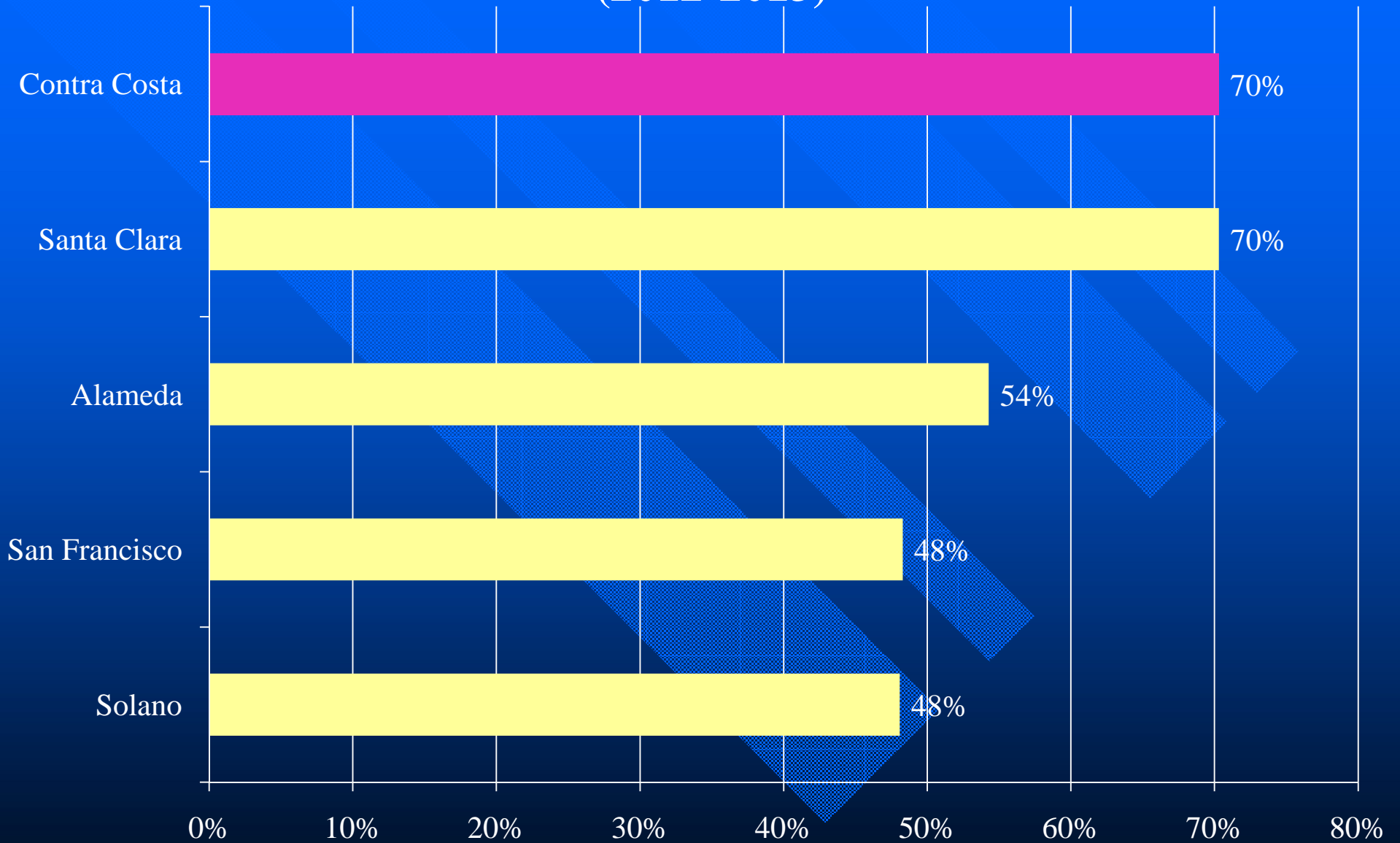
Number of Citizens Served Per DDA

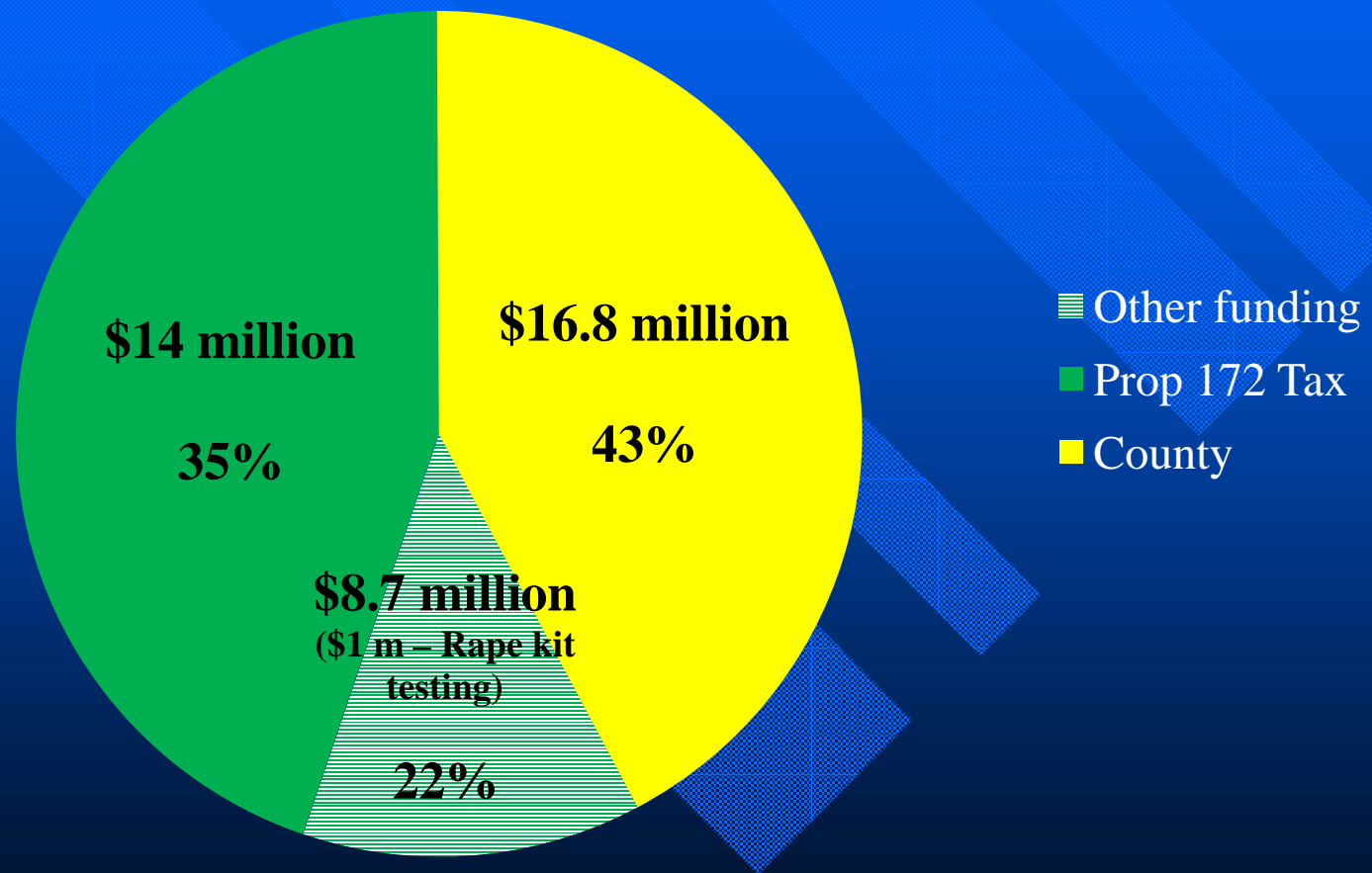
