IN THE MATTER OF ADOPTING A POLICY MAKING FAMILY MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS INELIGIBLE FOR APPOINTMENT TO BOARDS, COMMITTEES OR COMMISSIONS FOR WHICH THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IS THE APPOINTING AUTHORITY

WHEREAS the Board of Supervisors wishes to avoid the reality or appearance of improper influence or favoritism; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the following policy is hereby adopted:

- I. SCOPE: This policy applies to appointments to any seats on boards, committees or commissions for which the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors is the appointing authority.
- II. POLICY: A person will not be eligible for appointment if he/she is related to a Board of Supervisors' Member in any of the following relationships:
- 1. Mother, father, son, and daughter;
- 2. Brother, sister, grandmother, grandfather, grandson, and granddaughter;
- 3. Great-grandfather, great-grandmother, aunt, uncle, nephew, niece, great-grandson, and great-granddaughter;
- 4. First cousin;
- 5. Husband, wife, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, stepson, and stepdaughter;
- 6. Sister-in-law (brother's spouse or spouse's sister), brother-in-law (sister's spouse or spouse's brother), spouse's granddaughter, and spouse's grandson;
- 7. Registered domestic partner, pursuant to California Family Code section 297.
- 8. The relatives, as defined in 5 and 6 above, for a registered domestic partner.
- 9. Any person with whom a Board Member shares a financial interest as defined in the Political Reform Act (Gov't Code §87103, Financial Interest), such as a business partner or business associate.

This letter is sent to express my interest in the Seat 1 vacancy on the Fish and Wildlife Committee, which I learned of yesterday through an email from the Nextdoor May Valley Daily Digest. I read about the Committee's functions, reviewed agendas of recent meetings and spoke briefly with Maureen Parkes of the Department of Conservation and Development, and James Lyons from Supervisor Gioia's office. I would be available to participate in the regularly scheduled monthly meetings.

I have an interest in fish and wildlife issues in Contra Costa County from both a personal and professional level. I have an abiding love of the out-of-doors, which I practice as an avid hiker and backpacker, birdwatcher and observer of our natural world in wildlands as well as urban settings. I spend as much of my time outside as possible and enjoy learning from others and sharing my own observations. My professional career aligns with my personal interests. I have worked as a natural resources professional in a variety of positions, from professional forester, community organizer, policy analyst to biological resources consultant. I am the sole owner of Mosaic Associates, which has been providing biological resources consulting services to public and private sector clients since 2000.

I have resided in Contra Costa County for the past 28 years. During that time, I have had a chance to observe enormous changes in the scale and connectedness of the natural communities that provide habitat for native fish and wildlife in our county. I have also observed a change in the regard that county residents have for protecting and learning about our non-human neighbors and the habitats that they depend upon. The Fish and Wildlife Committee provides an opportunity to offer service to the Board of Supervisors and the people of the county on fish and wildlife issues. I believe that my interests and background would be a useful complement to the ongoing efforts of the Committee.

In the interest of full disclosure, I do want to note that my company has an on-call environmental services contract with the Department of Conservation and Development through June 30, 2017. My company also provides services to a number of clients whose projects are reviewed by the

Department. I do not view these ongoing professional relationships as a conflict of interest with the roles and responsibilities of the Fish and Wildlife Committee. Instead, I believe that these activities give me a useful perspective on many of the real issues that present opportunities and challenges for the conservation of fish and wildlife in the county and beyond.
