<u>AGENDA ITEMS:</u>

1. Introductions

Supervisor Burgis convened the meeting and invited attendees to introduce themselves.

2. Public comment on any item under the jurisdiction of the Committee and not on this agenda (speakers may be limited to three minutes)

None at this time.

3. Update regarding funding allocated to implement illegal dumping strategies approved on June 11, 2019.

Staff gave an update regarding funding allocation for the 6 approved illegal dumping strategies that cannot be implemented with existing budgets. The State will allocate \$375,000 to fund the strategy to hire 4 per diem deputies to investigate illegal dumping crimes for 2.5 years. On September 17, the County Board of Supervisors will consider authorizing expenditure of \$228,000 to fund the 5 other illegal dumping strategies that require funding for implementation.

4. Status update regarding the illegal dumping strategies approved on June 11, 2019.

Staff summarized the information contained in the "Status Updates" column for each of the yellow highlighted strategies contained in Table 1 – Strategies to Combat Illegal Dumping attached to the staff report for this item.

<u>Correction</u>: Regarding the status update for strategy #40, the total number of RVs abated and their locations within the county reported out during this meeting were inaccurate. The accurate number of RVs abated with their respective locations are noted in the Status Updates column of the Strategy Table.

Supervisor Burgis Comments:

- a. Reach out to cities about the County's Hauler Ordinance (Strategy # 41)
- b. Vacant lots with overgrown vegetation can pose challenges for both fire prevention and illegal dumping
- c. Alert people through public outreach campaign that county will be expanding enforcement of the County's mandatory subscription ordinance (Strategy # 12)
- d. Work with legislators

 Requested that staff provide a list of talking points to advocate for increased penalties for illegal dumping in support of the County's 2020 Legislative Platform (Strategy # 51)

Supervisor Glover Comments:

- Suggested that staff look into how the County can make the property owner fully responsible for maintaining garbage service when amending the Mandatory Subscription ordinance (Strategy # 19)
- b. Requested to be kept updated on implementation of the surveillance camera pilot and suggested that an RFP may help identify the types of camera systems that best meet the County's particular needs (Strategy #46)
- Suggested that Ad Hoc Committee members speak with legislators face to face individually to advocate for increased penalties for illegal dumping in support of the County's 2020 Legislative Platform (Strategy # 51)

Committee members directed staff to:

- a. Present a copy of this Strategy Update to the full Board of Supervisors as a consent item in October 2019
- b. Present more comprehensive status update to the full Board of Supervisors as a discussion item in September 2020

5. Overview of the recommended Public Outreach Campaign approved for funding (illegal dumping strategy # 5).

Staff gave an overview of the messaging, target audience, and tools proposed to implement Strategy #5 Create Public Outreach Campaign(s). The public outreach campaign will promote 2 complimentary messages:

(1) How to Do the Right Thing by disposing of waste properly and (2) How to Report Illegal Dumping in progress.

Supervisor Burgis noted that outreach campaign should also emphasize safety when informing the public on how to report illegal dumping, key message being "do not engage with dumpers."

Referral History:

On June 11, 2019, the County Board of Supervisors received a presentation from the interdepartmental Illegal Dumping Think Tank team and approved all staff recommendations. The Board of Supervisors approved a total of fifty-six (56) illegal dumping strategies recommended by the interdepartmental Illegal Dumping Think Tank. Fourteen (14) are existing strategies that were being implemented prior to Board approval in June. The remaining 42 strategies approved by the Board are either new or expanded. The Board referred implementation of the recommendations to this newly formed Ad Hoc Committee. The Board also directed staff to report back to the full Board for authorization to expend funding allocated to implement specified illegal dumping strategies and to provide a status update regarding the County's mandatory subscription ordinance and the other recommended illegal dumping strategies.

On September 16, 2019, this Illegal Dumping Ad Hoc Committee received a status update regarding allocaiton of funding and the implementation of the illegal dumping strategies approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 11, 2019.

Referral Update:

This report and the attached Table 1 provide updates related to the implementation of the fifty-six (56) Board approved illegal dumping strategies recommended by the interdepartmental Illegal Dumping Think Tank. Additionally, this report provides clarification regarding how this first year is being funded and recommends additional funding be allocated to sustain implementation of the selected strategies.

UPCOMING EVENT: Alameda County Supervisor Nate Miley in cooperation with Alameda County's Illegal Dumping Taskforce are actively planning the first inaugural Statewide Illegal Dumping Conference that is scheduled to be held in San Jose on April 22-23, 2020 https://www.strideevents.com/statewide-conference-on-illegal-dumping/event-information

STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION UPDATES: At the March 18, 2020 Committee meeting, staff members from the Illegal Dumping Think Tank team will make brief verbal presentations about the following strategy implementation highlights.

- Negotiations to amend the County's East County Franchise Strategies # 9, 17 & 34
- Deputies for illegal dumping investigations Strategy # 45
- Cameras Strategy # 46
- Legislation Strategy # 51

Since the last Committee meeting, the funding approved to implement the six selected illegal dumping strategies has been transferred to the applicable implementing Departments. In addition to the six (6) strategies approved for funding in June, there are another 13 strategies that will only be implemented once the dedicated per-diem Deputies are hired following receipt of the approved funding for Strategy # 45.

There has been some progress made on numerous other illegal dumping strategies, most of which did not require allocation of additional funding. In preparation for this upcoming Illegal Dumping Ad Hoc Committee meeting, staff has prepared an updated version of Table 1 which is attached to reflect progress applicable to the individual strategies.

FUNDING ALLOCATIONS: On June 11, 2019 the Board approved recommended funding allocation in the amount of \$378,00 for the six illegal dumping strategies itemized below which could not be implemented with existing budgets. The remaining 50 illegal dumping strategies were either proposed to be implemented within existing budgets in the initial phase or as part of a future phase.

Approved funding allocations in FY 2019/20 (Year 1)

AB 1216 was a County-sponsored bill that would have authorized the counties of Alameda and Contra Costa to establish a pilot program to employ 2 law enforcement officers, one from each county, solely for the purpose of enforcing dumping laws in those counties. Although AB 1216 failed to move forward, the California Budget Act of 2019 (AB 74) approved by the Governor included the following funding allocation provision:\$375,000 shall be provided to each of the following counties: Alameda and Contra Costa for an Illegal Dumping Pilot Project to enforce dumping laws.

At the prior Committee meeting held on September 16, 2019, DCD staff indicated that the \$375,000 was expected to be dedicated to implementing Strategy # 45. Since only \$150,00 was needed to implement that strategy for one year, staff reported that the remaining amount of \$225,000 would be sufficient to cover proposed per-diem deputies for an additional 1.5 years. Subsequently, DCD staff learned that the \$375,000 allocated by the State would be used to fund all of the strategies the Board approved for funding. As a result of the reallocation of the funding approved in the State Budget for illegal dumping enforcement, the amount of funding the County had to dedicate towards illegal dumping strategies for the first year decreased from \$228,000 to \$3,000.

Recommended funding allocations in FY 2020/21 (Year 2)

In order to ensure County departments are able to continue implementing Strategies # 5, 12, 26, 27, 45 & 46 without interruption once funding allocated for Year 1 has been expended, the Illegal Dumping Think Tank team recommends that the Committee formally make the following

recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors:

Approve dedicated funding in the amount of \$378,000 in FY 2020/21 to help continue combating illegal dumping and allocate said funding as follows to allow continued implementation of these six approved strategies.

Strategy # 5 – Public outreach campaign(s): \$10,000

Strategy # 12 – Mandatory Subscription Ordinance: \$58,000

Strategy # 26 – Street Signs (Phase 2: 50 signs): \$10,000

Strategy # 27 – Street Lights (Phase 2: 10 lights): \$100,000

Strategy # 45 – Dedicated Law Enforcement Officers (four per diem deputies for total of 3,600

hours per year): \$150,000

Strategy # 46 – Surveillance Cameras (Phase 2: 5 cameras): \$50,000
