Staff provided instruction for access to English live transcription (automated closed captioning), and live simultaneous Spanish and American Sign Language interpretation and then conducted roll call. For voting purposes District IV Alternate Pello Walker replaced absent member Sharon Quesada Jenkins. All other voting members were present. There were approximately 66 participants.

Chair Moore began by discussing the process for the evening's discussion. Continuing with the use of the Presentation Summary (revised 8/6/21) and beginning with the "Immigration/Racial Equity" category, the MXCAB were asked to ask clarifying questions and or make comments on categories. At the conclusion of the category discussions, the Chair announced that the MXCAB

would repeat the same poll that had been originally taken on August 25th. MXCAB participants were reminded that the tool was a poll to work towards consensus and not a vote. Fifteen minutes were provided for the poll (poll results are attached). At approximately 6:20 PM, the MXCAB took at ten-minute break. At the conclusion of the break the MXCAB discussed next steps. Many suggestions were made.

At the conclusion of the MXCAB members' comments, Chair Moore asked for public comment to conclude the meeting at approximately 8:00 PM. Public comments were received from nine individuals. The meeting ended with the MXCAB recognizing that additional meetings were necessary. Subsequent to the meeting ending, the next meeting is scheduled for Friday, September 17 at 3:30 PM.

Good morning, Lisa; and good morning, Supervisors--

I am writing to you regarding adequate allocation of Measure X funding for the arts in Contra Costa County. It has long been a shameful reality that our county has drastically underfunded the arts here.

You all know that the arts are, and have always been, important to me personally in this county. In fact, my first job within the county was as assistant director of AC5, back when the county provided more funding than has been available since around 2001. The per capita spending on the arts in Contra Costa County is embarrassingly low--especially since I know that each of you actually appreciates the arts in your own way (and you all likely support arts organizations in your own district individually).

Measure X finally provides an opportunity for you to rectify that historical lack of support. AC5 has been working hard to make the case for substantially raising the county's allocation for the arts to something equal to other counties in the Bay Area. Raising the funding from \$31,000 to \$625,000 annually will help the Arts and Culture Commission of Contra Costa County to demonstrate support for the arts and compete for national and state grants. Having watched AC5 struggle for many years, I know for a fact that many grant proposals have been turned down due to inadequate County matching funds.

Measure X funds could help provide public art programs in each district, a Community Art Fund, a youth advisor in each district, an Artist-In-Residency in the School pilot program, the Arts Connection and Build Structures initiative and other great programs. You already know that strong arts programs help youth learn and help people connect with each other.

You have an opportunity (I would dare say an obligation) to stabilize arts funding and allow your arts commission to plan equitably for a future where the arts can help strengthen and improve the quality of life throughout Contra Costa County. I do hope you will find a clear pathway to doing that with the Measure X funds.

We appreciate the public hearing this evening and all of the work on best uses for our Measure X funds:

"Measure X, Contra Costa's new countywide, half-cent sales tax, is expected to raise \$112 million for the new fiscal year that began July 1. The Measure X Community Advisory Board was formed to identify unmet community needs and recommend spending priorities to the county Board of Supervisors".

We are in a crisis, and we ask that Measure X prioritize funding towards abating that crisis: The Climate Crisis.

The recent international IPCC report has confirmed <u>code red for humanity</u>. If we are to survive, we need to rise up to save ourselves. This is not some superhero comment. We have a real call to action. The United Nations has made a clear announcement that we are in a situation that is no longer livable. Our very survival--- and the survival of our next generations--- is in question.

We concur that Public Safety and Protection of Human Health is the highest priority. And to address those, we must address the fact that we are in a clear and imminent danger. The County Board of Supervisors has declared a state of Emergency. The full resolution can be found Here.

The future of our youth and all generations to come—is at stake. Every item on your list of funding priorities are impacted by the Climate Crisis.

Therefore, please ensure a hefty line item is targeted for reducing fossil fuels, adapting to the climate impacts, and ensures emergency planning to make sure our cities are resilient and prepared for the known emergencies to come; and the extreme weather impacts we will continue to experience.

Further, we would like to see that those monies are set up in a way that ensures they trickle down to the cities who are the ones who can write and implement Climate Action Plan(CAPs) and policies at the local level. Three reports (plus appendices) will be prepared and submitted to the Board of Supervisors, including:

- Overview of MXCAB's work: Background Measure X ballot measure; purpose, charge, structure and membership of MXCAB; process and timeline to date; etc.
- 2. **Updated community needs assessment**: A simple summary version will be shared with the Board, along with a request to invest a small amount of Measure X funds to contract with a professional writer to work with MXCAB leadership to write the full report.
- 3. **Investment goals and strategy recommendations** for Measure X funds in the current fiscal year (FY 21-22).

Following is an outline of the content envisioned for each of the above three reports (subject to further refinement).

1. OVERVIEW OF MXCAB'S WORK

BALLOT LANGUAGE (regarding intent):

"To keep Contra Costa's regional hospital open and staffed; fund community health centers, emergency response; support crucial safety-net services; invest in early childhood services; protect vulnerable populations; and for other essential county services."

MXCAB BYLAWS:

Article I – Purpose A.

The Measure X Community Advisory Board (the "Advisory Board") was established by the Board of Supervisors on February 2, 2021 to advise the Board of Supervisors on the use of Measure X funds. The main responsibilities of the Advisory Board are as follows:

1. Overseeing an annual assessment of community needs, focusing primarily on the priority areas identified in the Needs Assessment, including emergency response.

- 2. Creating detailed priority lists of the top ten service gaps (county- and community-provided) based on the results from the needs assessment.
- 3. Using the assessment to make general funding priority recommendations to the Board of Supervisors on 95% of the revenue generated by Measure X.
- 4. Providing an annual report on the outcomes and impact of allocated funds.
- 5. The Advisory Board committee shall initially meet as needed and thereafter shall meet quarterly.

TIMELINE

The first meeting of the Advisory Board was held April 13, 2021. Over the first few meetings, the Advisory Board worked through logistics, took action to support language equity, and decided to meet every Wednesday at 5:00 pm. We also developed and adopted a formal Vision Statement and Operating Principles, as summarized below.

VISION STATEMENT (Adopted April 2021)

Contra Costa County will have the necessary funds to invest in and sustain a robust system of care and the social and public services necessary to support a vibrant community and ensure that all county residents have equitable opportunities to thrive.

OPERATING PRINCIPLES (Adopted April 2021)

The Advisory Board adopted formal Operating Principles, including the following assumptions and commitments that inform our work together:

- 1. Shared responsibility to practice the values of equity, justice, inclusion and compassion.
- 2. Sustaining a strong social safety net is important for the health and prosperity of all.
- 3. Investments will prioritize prevention as well as addressing current system gaps.
- 4. Investments will help leverage other funding sources when feasible.
- Needs and issues are intersectional and interconnected. Think about needs and services from the point of view of residents.
- 6. Name inequities and disparities, and be specific in naming and recognizing those who are most harmed by them, especially Black and

Latinx residents. Additional areas of focus include residents with mental health needs, indigenous people, Asian American/Pacific Islander American residents, seniors, disabled people, children and youth (prenatal to adult), immigrants, unsheltered and homeless residents, rural communities, LGBTQ+ residents, and poor people.

- 7. Economic opportunity and equity are at the heart of our purpose.
- 8. Seek transformative solutions, in addition to filling current service gaps.
- 9. Fostering a culture of inclusion, welcoming, and belonging demonstrates our commitment to equity and will improve our work process and outcomes.

How we conduct ourselves in Advisory Board meetings (adopted April 2021)

- 1. Consider not repeating a point someone else has already made (or briefly agree).
- 2. Treat each other and all participants with mutual respect.
- 3. Be curious; practice active listening; seek to understand.
- 4. To fully embody our principle of inclusion: Support the accessibility needs of all participants to the extent feasible, including language access (interpretation and translation), technical support, and visual/audio support.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT PROCESS:

The Advisory Board decided to take a deeper dive into the community needs and potential strategies to address those needs, for which we would be recommending funding. After developing an initial list of community needs, issues, and topics, the following schedule of issues was developed, with each presentation featuring a panel of county service providers, community-based service providers, and residents who are being directly impacted by the issues being discussed.

- May 12, 2021 Seniors and Persons with Disabilities and Veterans
- May 19, 2021 Community Safety: Fire Protection
- May 26, 2021 Early Childhood
- June 9, 2021 Youth and Young Adults

- June 23, 2021 Mental & Behavioral Health/Disabled
- June 30, 2021 Housing & Homelessness
- July 7, 2021 Community Safety: Justice Systems
- July 14, 2021 Safety Net Services
- July 21, 2021 Immigration/Racial Equity Across Systems
- July 28, 2021 Library, Arts & Culture, Agriculture
- August 4, 2021 Environment & Transportation

Following the final presentation in early August, the Advisory Board collected additional information from different presenters and received additional input from members of the public. The Advisory Board also developed a variety of tools and processes, including three straw polls, to aid in identifying service gaps and developing funding priorities.

- 1. **Prioritize community-based strengths, wisdom, and services**: Whenever possible, funding is to be prioritized to culturally trusted, community-based programs and services. This should include innovation grants that can be given to community programs that may not have 501 (3)(c) status, but are deeply trusted by local community members.
- 2. **Affirmatively address structural racism**: Racism is the cause of many of the problems our community is facing. All services must prioritize addressing the structural and systemic racism.
- 3. **Address trauma**: Racism and other inequities are a major cause of trauma. Trauma is a public health issue. All programs receiving Measure X funding should be trauma-informed.
- 4. **Prioritize additional housing investments**: Please see appendix 2 for the explicit housing trust recommendations submitted by a group of community-based housing policy experts and service providers.
- 5. **Focus on bold and transformational investments**: The Advisory Board encourages the Board of Supervisors to prioritize Measure X funds for programs that are bold, innovative, and transformational. There are many gaps to fill in our county but there are also strategies that have the potential to be life changing for members of our community. As a part of this philosophy, we encourage the county to prioritize programs that have staff who have lived experience.
- 6. Consider Measure X funds in the context of the overall County budget. The Advisory Board spent five months receiving and reviewing information about unmet community needs, and spent countless hours discussing processes to develop funding recommendations. The winnowing process was very challenging, given the depth of need in our community and the limited amount of Measure X funding available. The Advisory Board received more than \$350 million in total funding requests, and there are numerous other community needs that were not formally brought to the Advisory Board's attention. Measure X revenues represent just 2% of the County's overall annual budget; the Advisory Board encourages the Board of Supervisors and County staff to identify other local, state, and federal revenue sources to fund these additional worthwhile programs.

RE: Comment and clarification on your discussion on climate and climate justice 9-8-21

Dear Members of the Measure X Advisory Board:

I was able to be in attendance for most of yesterday's session but could not stay for public comment due to another meeting. I am writing to provide some additional comments related to your discussion on how climate action and climate justice fit into your considerations.

Member Honig made the point that this was an important area for action and also commented that money needed to go to the community to address solutions. 350 Contra Costa requested funds to go to the County because, as in most policy and structural issues, the local government needs to act. We do need the community, of which we are part, to advocate strongly for action and climate justice action in addressing climate solutions—to hold the County to right action.

And, we advocate for authentic engagement. In the spirit of Member Honig's remarks, we think your advocacy of climate action that is centered in equity or climate justice and includes resources for ensuring resident voice and influence as solutions roll out—including compensation for community groups to help ensure resident engagement—would be important.

Our request was made because we need to elevate this issue in the County politically and structurally in ways that ensure those most affected and vulnerable are heard and helped as a priority of public policy. All will suffer and do suffer now due to our climate emergency, but marginalized communities and BIPOC communities suffer more and this needs to be corrected in the way solutions are executed.

Having an Office of Sustainability and Environmental Justice under the CAO elevates this work structurally. More funds would be needed to make this move possible and to resource the effort in ways that can ensure co-benefits go to the communities most in need.

There was concern raised at the meeting that it seemed plans were discussed and not action. We are an action group and that is our measure of what needs to happen.

There are solutions the County can take that can benefit us and some foundational plans are necessary, but action that can positively affect:

- healthy, affordable housing,
- opportunities for workforce development and more local jobs,
- cleaner air and water,
- less pollution in front-line communities,
- more transit options for low income and marginalized communities,
- more protection from heat and other climate impacts

The above illustrate co-benefits of climate action for climate justice. The climate emergency is an overarching intersectional issue. We need to stop creating the problem (stop polluting) and we must protect communities from the effects of the changing climate already in play.

Thank you all for your work. You have had so much to digest and contemplate. We have sent two other letters and below is a summary of the presentation made.

SLIDE ONE: Good evening and thank you for this opportunity to address the measure X commission. My name is Marti Roach. I am on the leadership team of 350 Contra Costa

We are a county wide grass roots nonprofit organization that joins with many other groups to mobilize action to address the climate emergency and ensure equity and justice as we solve this challenge.

SLIDE TWO:

It's Real

We pay either way!



Our county like thousands of places around the world, has declared we are in a climate emergency that is backed by science and, now by our own lived experience. We now see that we must reduce fossil fuel pollution emissions on a much tighter timeline as not enough has been done and climate disruption is moving faster. We have the next 9-10 years to get emissions under control and begin to stabilize our atmosphere.

We all live with this now whether we choose to face it or not Stunning stores abound now. A farmworker lost his life in the heat dome that covered the northwest. People drown in floods. We live under wildfire sieges that break yearly records in lives lost and acreage burned. We now have new language like fire sieges, gigafires, fires that make their own weather. Rising tolls from climate impacts affect our lives and our wallet.


This is not just a climate emergency; over 29 medical societies including the AMA name it the top public health emergency we face. We measure this crisis in lives lost, work days missed, property gone forever.

There is good news here: It is solvable.

We know the solutions and many of them happen at the local level, tied to changes in transportation, buildings, and land use, things that can be fixed in ways that can help us solve other problems at the same time.

SLIDE THREE: This is called multi-solving and recognizes the intersection of solving many problems at once.

We multi-solve so many problems when we tackle climate



We know improved air quality, for example, saves people from premature death and keeps more people from getting asthma and other illnesses. So we save lives, improve the quality of our lives and save health dollars as we reduce carbon pollution. This flower shows that there are benefits with climate protection that cut across many other community needs.

It is important that these benefits prioritize equity and environmental justice. Low-income families, BIPOC community members, residents who live near toxic and industrial polluting industries need to be at the front of the line on the benefits that come as we act to transform our communities for the better as we fix the climate emergency. They are the most vulnerable to the impacts. And funding needs to prioritize this.

SLIDE FOUR: We totally support the County's ask for resources addressing environmental pollution and other needs, but we need to go bigger, more intersectional and see this opportunity to better organize our County government and better resource it. We have wonderful models around us of sister counties who point the way. San Mateo County has created a dedicated Office of Sustainability, with authority directly under the County Manager, to work on reducing emissions and protecting the community from climate impacts Their total budget is \$135M, of which about \$5M is dedicated to reducing emissions. They have many teams that each focus on areas like resilience, regional coordination, housing and transportation, community engagement and partnership. Santa Clara, SF, Marin and Sonoma County all have budgets to address climate and resilience in the multi millions and have programs and staff levels closer to San Mateo County. Sonoma County, for example, since 2009 has had a Regional Climate Protection Authority, that coordinates the County and its nine cities and multiple agencies, helping them

streamline work and position for grants and leveraging outside resources like bulk purchase of EVs.

We have one dedicated coordinator, an intern and other staff assigned on a part time, limited basis for projects.

Contra Costa needs to elevate its response to this crisis. We, too, need an Office of Sustainability, placed under the Chief Adm officer staffed and resourced to move fast, creatively and with resources to build partnerships with cities, the private sector and the community. We can invest in healthful solutions that reduce the problem rather than spend the same or more dealing with the impacts of climate change.

Let's build the infrastructure that can prioritizes justice, attract more money, unite our communities, and builds private and public partnerships. More staff will get our Electric Vehicle and other transportation and land use opportunities moving, our JT planning underway, our clean energy initiatives escalated. Done with justice in mind, this can lift up and help many in our County who need healthy housing, weatherized buildings, or help getting an EV. SLIDE FIVE We ask you recommend \$2.5 Million annually for ten years to the County to enable bolder, swifter action on climate solutions that reduce emissions and bring multi-intersectional benefits that cut across all our concerns for health, equity and quality of life here in Contra Cosa.

If this funding starts going into our climate emergency response now, our upcoming 2022 climate action plan can be built with this knowledge so we can be bold on paper and in execution of plans. Let's match our resolve to act with the scale of the problem. Let's get a foundation can attract more resources and help lead our whole County.

All of you—a broad representation of our County- taking this message to our BOS can be the game changer we desperately need.

Resources for Community Development (RCD) urges the Measure X Committee to fund affordable housing through Measure X via the Housing Trust Fund proposal made by County staff at the June 30th Committee meeting. The Trust Fund proposal would allow for the broadest array of housing programs to be funded. It would allow for the flexibility to fund the highest priority needs to create needed affordable homes and prevent and end homelessness.

RCD is a non-profit development company that has built and operates hundreds of affordable apartments throughout Contra Costa. We house a wide range of families and individuals in those homes, including people coming from homelessness, frail elders, households living with disabilities, and working individuals and families. We work closely with community agencies such as the County Department of Conservation and Development, the Housing Authority of Contra Costa, and cities throughout the County. RCD is also an active member of the County's Continuum of Care.

The County and local cities have been incredibly resourceful in advancing affordable housing development in Contra Costa. However, since the end of California Redevelopment in 2011, the County's affordable housing resources have been largely limited to Federal funding through the HOME and Community Development Block Grant programs. This is not nearly enough local funding to leverage the state and federal funding required to build the affordable housing the County needs, and in fact the lack of affordable homes has become more pronounced during the recent expansion of the housing and homelessness crisis in the County. The use of up to \$12 million of Measure X funds could more than double the local resources for affordable housing in the County, which would be a huge win for the County and its residents.

As mentioned above, we hope you will support the Housing Trust Fund concept presented by County staff. This would allow for the most flexibility to fund the widest range of housing programs, and the County could decide its priorities for spending the funds based on future opportunities and needs. The funds generated by Measure X would be a huge boost to efforts to reduce homelessness and create more needed affordable units in Contra Costa County.

Thank you for all you do and for your consideration of our recommendation.
