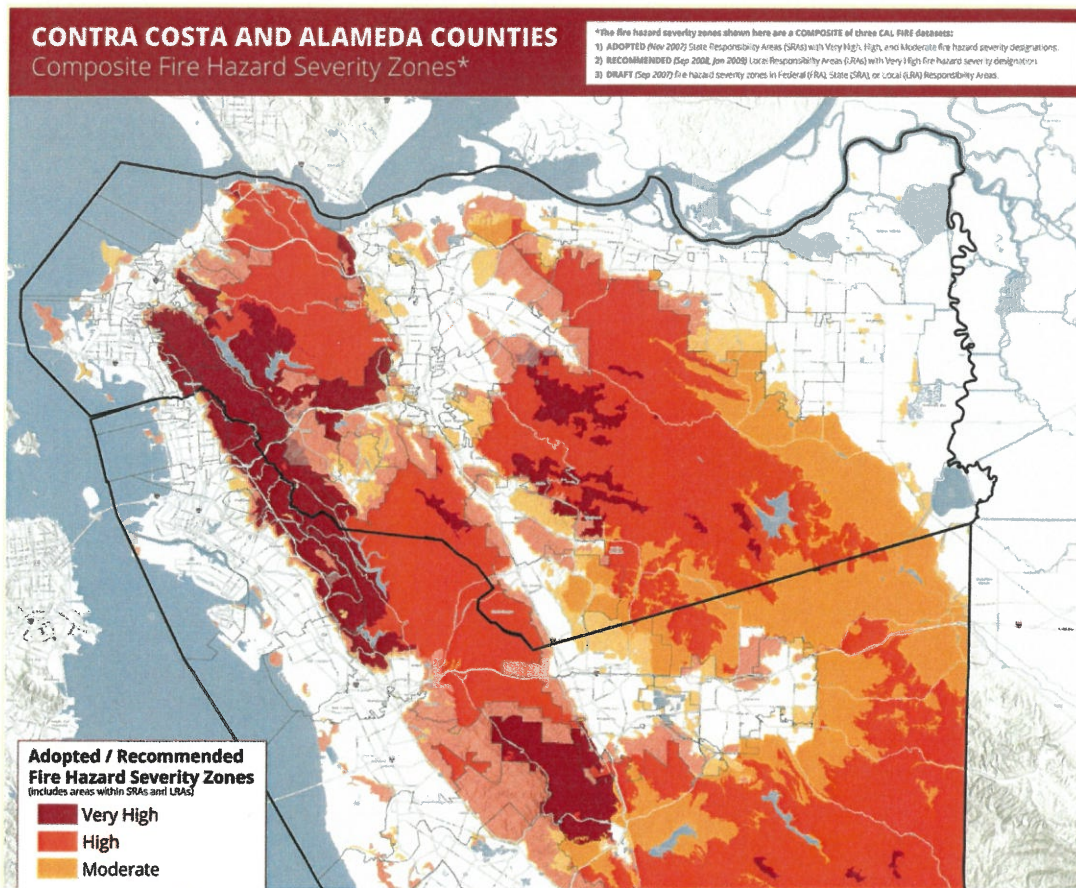

Dear Supervisor Burgis,

During the Board of Supervisors meeting on October 11th, you stated that your decisions regarding Measure X funding proposals would be directed by the extent to which a proposal leveraged other resources to maximize the value of Measure X dollars.

The foundation of getVOCAL for Victims is the leveraging of volunteer lawyers to provide legal representation to victims of crime. Measure X funding will provide getVOCAL for Victims the structure to coordinate volunteer legal representation throughout the criminal justice process for the hundreds, if not thousands, of crime victims in Contra Costa County.

To give perspective to the potential monetary value of this volunteer legal representation, in Fiscal Year 2021-2022 the County provided funding to the Public Defender's Office of nearly \$31,000,000.00. In contrast, getVOCAL's \$1,000,000.00 proposal for funding will be the County's only expenditure to enforce the constitutional rights of victims of crime yet by utilizing volunteer resources, getVOCAL will provide legal representation to those who became crime victims at the hands of the defendants that the Public Defender represents at a fraction of the cost to the County.

In addition to utilizing the services of volunteer attorneys, getVOCAL for Victims will partner with law enforcement and community organizations to distribute getVOCAL contact information to crime victims eliminating the need to pay for advertising. In the development of getVOCAL for Victims' AAPI Initiative to provide culturally appropriate legal representation to AAPI victims, getVOCAL is working with the Asian Police Officers Association and community based organizations in Oakland and San Francisco Chinatowns to recruit volunteer certified language interpreters and culturally appropriate attorneys to effectively communicate with victims. getVOCAL for Victims will replicate this collaborative model of identifying and utilizing volunteer resources to address the needs of crime victims from diverse backgrounds.

Finally, getVOCAL for Victims' request for Measure X funding will provide currently non-existent services for every demographic identified as a priority by the Measure X Advisory Board and specifically identified for funding in the Measure X ballot language. Unquestionably, crime victims are among the most vulnerable of Contra Costa's population.

Dear Chair Burgis and Supervisors,

I am writing on behalf of 350 Contra Costa regarding the Measure X funding recommendations and your declared climate emergency. We join with many other community groups and individuals in our county who support the Measure X Board and its recommendations for first-year funds.

The decision of the Board of Supervisors to authorize and appoint an Advisory Board and equip it with staff resources to design and conduct a truly community wide hearing on needs, is commendable.

Under the able leadership of Chair Mariana Moore and Vice Chair BK Williams, an ambitious process was set in motion, asking a lot in time and thought from the Board members. I attended many of the sessions and was struck by the tone



of respect, authentic inquiry, and openness to different viewpoints. I saw a willingness to acknowledge that this process was new, emergent and that it required holding the belief that the method for finding consensus would unfold. And it did, with a final document that is goal-centered as well as deep and broad in its efforts to prioritize and yet focus on specifics.

**Not all needs were addressed.** We in 350 Contra Costa, along with many other groups in the community – as well as the County staff – advocated for funds to address the climate emergency in our county with a focus on reducing its causes and adapting to the climate impacts we see today.

We attempted to communicate the overarching reality coming at us. The climate emergency is a threat-multiplier to so many social justice, human, and environmental concerns in our county:

- It affects physical and mental health deeply.
- It affects public safety.
- It affects the physical environment, negatively impacting flora, fauna, and humans.
- It is a risk to our local economy as our government, businesses, and residents face costs from climate impacts.
- It disproportionately affects low income, BIPOC and front-line communities in our county.

On the solution side, addressing the climate emergency locally can:

- Improve health,
- Improve air quality,
- Address sea level rise and water security issues,
- Be a jobs engine for local living-wage jobs and therefore reducing car travel elsewhere for work,
- Help us create more affordable homes and make sure they are healthier and more energy-efficient, including cooling for all.

All of this can be done in ways that ensure we prioritize the delivery of benefits to the most vulnerable.

We hope you will honor the Measure X recommendations. And, we hope you will acknowledge that we are woefully underfunded to execute necessary steps in our interim, and upcoming updated Climate Action Plan. Remember that Measure X is a small portion of the overall County budget.

We need you to find funds this year to enable action on our Interim Climate Action Plan and set the foundation for fast execution of the forthcoming 2022 Climate Action Plan. We need you to focus on longer term funding to ensure adequate staffing for climate action. We risk losing out on Federal dollars if we have not laid a foundation in (“shovel ready” type plans) and demonstrated readiness for action.

As you may know, other Bay Area counties are finding additional ways to raise and allocate funds to address the climate emergency. You cannot address an emergency without funding. We hope you find funds this year and in the coming years to support climate action and resilience to assure the well-being of our county.

Our San Pablo City Council **fully supports** the recommendation to develop a County-wide comprehensive crisis response system that is available to anyone, anywhere, anytime. Further, it is imperative that a Miles Hall Crisis Call Center and additional Mobile Crisis Teams, along with a designated Crisis Services location be established County-wide, with expanded services to address and prevent mental health crisis, within a County-wide integrated mental health crisis response service to serve the entire County, and local cities in partnership.

Recently, the City of San Pablo obtained \$2M in State of CA Funding towards supporting community policing and mental health crisis programs in our community. Our City envisions the application of these funds, and future potential ARPA allocation, to supplement the future development of the County-wide Community Crisis Initiative and deployment of future Mental Health Crisis Teams, within a newly proposed \$30M San Pablo Police Department and Regional Law Enforcement Training Project to be completed in 2024 in San Pablo.

Therefore, San Pablo supports the efforts of the Contra Costa County Health Services and all local cities, in partnership, to support County-wide integrated mental health crisis response services. We applaud all efforts and collaborative work to date in developing and supporting this Initiative, and urge the CCC BOS to support this ongoing regional partnership as well.

Dear Supervisors Burgis, Andersen, Gioia, Glover and Mitchoff,

As a resident of Danville and a member of the Multi-Faith ACTION Coalition and Budget Justice Coalition, I call on you to honor the work of the Measure X Community Advisory Board (MXCAB). I call on you not to adopt the Chief Administrator's Office's proposed allocation plan, as presented in the attachments to agenda item D.5, at your November 16 meeting.

- I fully support the positions detailed in the Budget Justice Coalition's November 14 letter to you on this topic (letter attached for reference).
- The Board should **not** make any Measure X funding decisions on November 16 on anything that was not included in the MXCAB recommendations, because it did not provide clear criteria to the CAO's office for selecting recommendations for Measure X funding.
- The Board should give serious and due consideration to all of MXCAB's proposed funding priorities..
- The Board should explain its decision-making methodology moving forward, including how it will incorporate and honor MXCAB's operating principles of equity and prioritizing funding for the needs of low-income people and those most in need. The coalition that supported Measure X did so despite concerns among many about the regressive nature of a sales tax, and clearly intended Measure X funds to be directed to the most needy.
- The General Fund already has a 20.5% reserve balance. Quarterly fluctuations in sales tax revenue rarely exceed 10% - the Board should set a policy of a 15% reserve, not 25% and use the money to support community needs.
- Prioritize people over parking lots. **Fund Contra Costa CARES** to provide needed health care to undocumented immigrants! Do not provide \$75 million for hospital facilities, including \$30 million for structures not even requested by Health Services in their proposal to MXCAB.
- No NOT fund 19 FTE's for the Sheriff's Office. **This request was explicitly rejected by MXCAB.** Funding it with Measure X dollars would be a direct repudiation of the MXCAB recommendations.
- Do not fund body cameras – **this was rejected by MXCAB** and can be paid for out of the Sheriff's existing budget.
- Funding for public safety should go to items recommended by MXCAB, including: Public Defender front-end advocacy teams, community-based reentry support and employment services, abuse prevention and support, the Reimagine Public Safety countywide initiative, eviction defense, Stand Together Contra Costa, and the Alliance to End Abuse.

Dear Supervisors, County Administrator, Director, and Advisory Board members:

The Contra Costa Budget Justice Coalition (BJC) is writing to comment on the Chief Administrator Office's recommendations on Measure X expenditures, which will be taken up by the Board of Supervisors on November 16<sup>th</sup>. Following is a summary of our concerns about the process and proposals to date, and suggested solutions:

#### **TRANSPARENT AND ACCOUNTABLE DECISION-MAKING PROCESS**

BJC believes that a clear, thoughtful, and transparent decision-making process for Measure X funds is imperative. After reviewing the agenda materials for the November 16 Board meeting, we would like to reiterate and expand upon several points we raised in our letter of November 10<sup>th</sup>:

1. The Board should **not** make any Measure X funding decisions on the 16<sup>th</sup>, given that the Board, at its discussion on October 12:

- Did not establish (nor even discuss) **shared criteria** for determining Measure X funding priorities;
- Did not establish, nor explain to the public, a **rationale and clear process** for staff to follow in selecting and researching which funding priorities to bring back to the Board of Supervisors for further consideration;
- Did not direct staff to include a **public analysis of all** of the Measure X Community Advisory Board's recommended funding priorities.

For all of the above reasons, BJC strongly believes that the Board – and the public -- does not yet have sufficient information to properly and publicly evaluate, discuss and debate all options before making final funding decisions.

2. The Board should give serious and due consideration to all of MXCAB's proposed funding priorities, and conduct and review – in public -- all appropriate financial analyses, before making final decisions on Measure X funding allocations for this fiscal year.
3. The Board should **explain how its decision-making methodology will incorporate and honor MXCAB's operating principles of equity and prioritizing funding for the needs of low-income people and community members who are most vulnerable. The coalition of community organizations, residents, philanthropy, and labor that supported Measure X did so despite concerns about the regressive nature of a sales tax. The stated goal and intention of this coalition, which worked incredibly hard to get the tax measure passed, was to ensure that Measure X funds would**

be directed to the most needy. This intent was unequivocally stated to members of the Board of Supervisors during the campaign.

4. The Board should clearly spell out the **decision-making criteria and process** moving forward, including timing of decisions and fund disbursement, and how items that have not been researched prior to the 16<sup>th</sup> will receive due consideration for funding.
5. After all relevant information is publicly presented, the Board should **engage in a robust public discussion and debate** about the relative merits of the proposed funding priorities, prior to making final funding allocations.

## RESERVE FUND POLICY

The County's current General Fund reserve fund policy states: "Contra Costa County will strive to achieve a minimum unassigned General Fund balance of 5% of budgeted General Fund revenues and a minimum total General Fund balance of 10% of budgeted General Fund revenues." The General Fund reserve as of April 2021 was 20.5%, well above the required 5%/10% minimums.<sup>1</sup>

We recognize that sales tax revenues fluctuate seasonally. However, from 2016 through Q2 2021, the quarterly variation from a given year's average quarterly taxable transactions in Contra Costa exceeded 10% only five times in 20 quarters, three of them in 2020 due to extraordinary Covid situation<sup>2</sup>. In light of these moderate fluctuations, a 25% reserve for Measure X, on top of an existing 20.5% General Fund reserve, is excessive. The quarterly fluctuation from an annual quarterly average typically range between 0% - 10%, and exceeded 15% only once in 5 years (a 16% *increase* in Q4 2020); we recommend that the reserve should not exceed 15%.

## FUNDING CYCLE OF 3-5 YEARS

The recommendation to establish an ongoing Measure X funding cycle of 3-5 years circumvents the spirit and intent for the Measure X Community Advisory Board to conduct an annual review and updated needs assessment, upon which the subsequent year's Measure X funding should be based.

It also stands in direct contrast to the county's current and long-standing practice of following a one-year budget cycle. Why should Measure X funds follow a radically different funding cycle, unless the county budget as a whole is shifting to a 3-5 year budget cycle?

Once programs are established, the presumption is that they generally will receive ongoing funding, but the Board should still solicit, review, and take seriously the Community Advisory Board's annual needs assessment findings and funding priority recommendations, and should determine how to best incorporate this community-driven input into future Measure X funding allocation decisions.

## PROPOSED FUNDING PRIORITIES

### Health Services: Facilities and Contra Costa CARES

1. Medical Facilities:

We note that the recommendations for medical facilities (medical clinic and office complex, public health lab, CCRM parking structure and CCRM radiology) exceeds what was requested by Health Services Department (HSD) by \$30 million:

- HSD request for facilities \$45,000,000
- CAO recommendations for facilities \$75,000,000

This represents 58% of all one-time allocations. In addition, the amount recommended for hospital staffing support exceeds HSD's request by \$5 million:

- Hospital staffing request \$35,000,000
- CAO recommendation \$40,000,000

Why is the CAO recommending funding in excess of HSD requests? Hospital facilities + hospital staffing support total \$115 million, or 56% of total allocations through 6/30/23. Overall, Health Services is recommended to receive 65% of total allocations (\$133.45 million). There is, in our view, an excessive focus on (and proposed allocation of Measure X funds for) capital expenses, such as a \$14 million parking lot that was never brought before the Measure X Community Advisory Board for consideration. Many of these capital expenses do not clearly align with the stated intent of Measure X to address the needs of our county's most vulnerable residents, particularly during an ongoing pandemic.

2. At the same time, the report recommends no funding to expand Contra Costa CARES for the next year and a half and proposes an allocation of only \$750,000 in 2023-24. This lack of support for badly needed program expansion is entirely inconsistent with the needs of the community and with MXCAB's operating principles, values and recommendations. This prioritizing of parking lots over people fails to "prioritize strategies that address systemic racism, recognize and respond to trauma, leverage community-based strengths and services, and focus on bold and transformational responses to community needs", as expressed in the MXCAB report.

#### **Unincorporated Patrol - Additional Sheriff's Deputies**

The staff report recommends that a total of \$6.36 million be allocated for unincorporated patrol, with an ongoing \$6 million annual allocation, despite the explicit rejection of this request by MXCAB.

To put this in context, we point out that:

- In August 2020, the Sheriff-Coroner office was allocated funding for an additional 25 deputies.
- In the 2021-22 budget, the Sheriff-Coroner's office received a \$12.4 million funding increase (4.9%), including an additional 10 Deputy Sheriff FTE's.
- Meanwhile, violent crimes, property crimes, and larceny/theft have decreased by 47% from 2011 to 2020, and by 39% from 2015-2020.<sup>3</sup> (Not surprisingly, this drop-off corresponds to similar decreases in the number of people incarcerated in Contra Costa detention facilities.)
- For Measure X, the Office of the Sheriff requested an additional 34 sworn staff FTE (\$10.36 million annually) to reduce response times, citing response-time averages of 12-14 minutes for Priority 1 calls in unincorporated areas. The CAO staff report is recommending that Measure X funds be allocated to hire an additional 19 sworn FTE's.
  - According to data from the Sheriff's department, as of May 2021, the average of *median* response times in unincorporated areas for Priority 1 calls from 2015-2021 is 6 minutes and 25 seconds. Of course, median differs from average (mean), but such a dramatic divergence is highly unusual, and warrants further explanation.
- Lastly, according to data from the Sheriff's Office, as of May 2021, the department's Field

Operations, Patrol Division had 174 authorized FTE's, and 37 FTE vacancies (21%), and 109 Deputies, and 27 Deputy vacancies (25%). Given the high number of existing unfilled vacancies, what is the rationale for Measure X funding an additional 19 FTE's, particularly given that the Community Advisory Board consistently ranked Sheriff patrols dead last out of 117 funding priorities they considered?

The Sheriff Office's request for unneeded FTEs is not justified, especially in light of the omission of any funding of MXCAB recommendations to fund Public Defender front-end advocacy teams, community-based reentry support and employment services, abuse prevention and support, the Reimagine Public Safety countrywide initiative, eviction defense, Stand Together Contra Costa, and the Alliance to End Abuse.


#### **Body Worn and In-Car Cameras - Sworn Staff**

Given the significant increases in the budget of the Office of the Sheriff, the recommendation for \$2.56 million for body worn cameras and \$1.84 million per year, which was explicitly rejected by MXCAB, should also be directed. Funding for these can be found in the Sheriff's Office current budget.

The members of the Budget Justice Coalition strongly urge the Board of Supervisors to consider and respond to the above concerns, and to incorporate our proposed solutions going forward. As you know, there is intense public scrutiny of the Measure X decision-making process and outcomes. We encourage you to revisit your decision-making process to demonstrate that it is fair and transparent, honors the rigorous work of the Measure X Community Advisory Board, and congruent with the spirit and intent of the Measure X campaign.

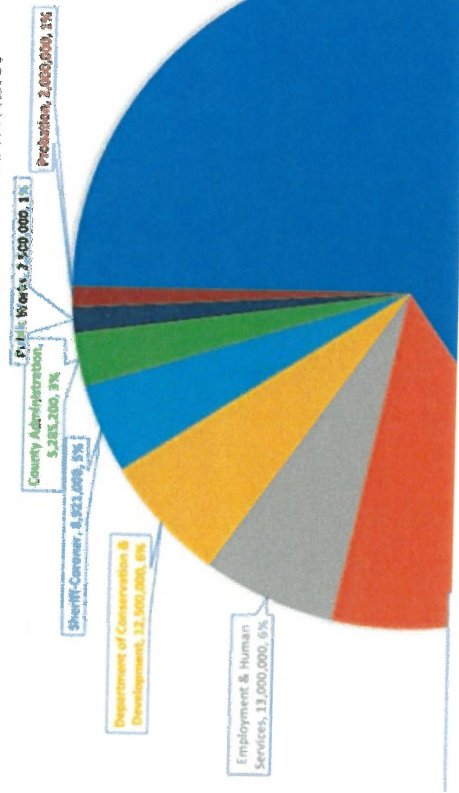

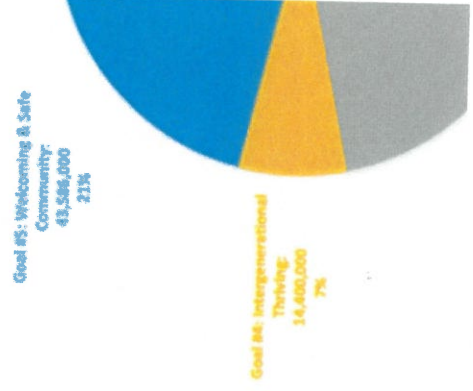

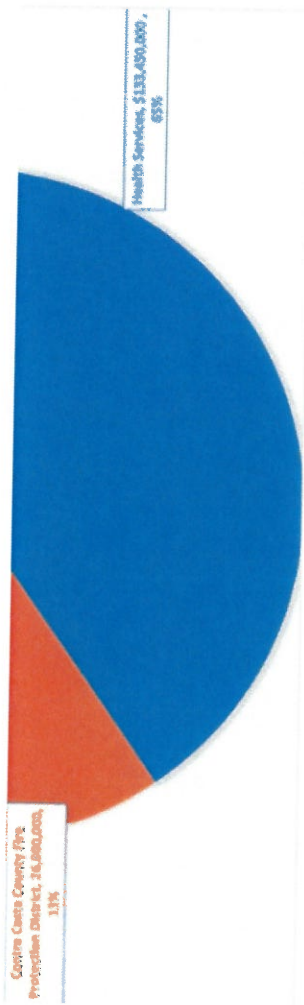

#### TOTAL ALLOCATIONS BY DEPARTMENT

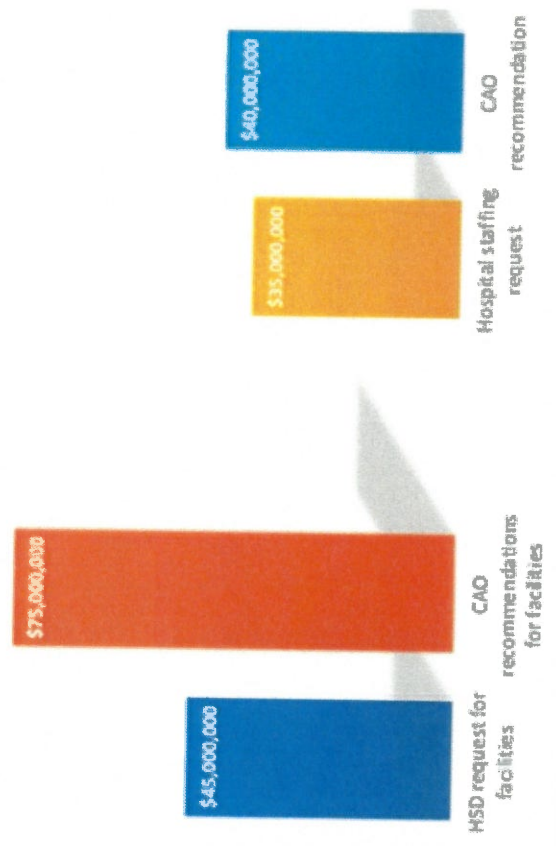

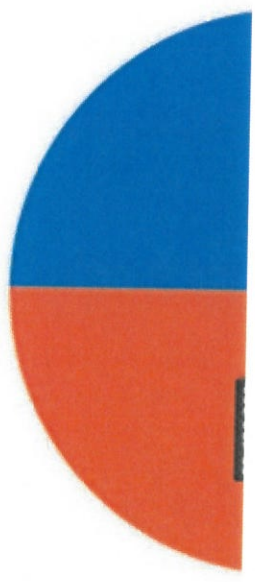


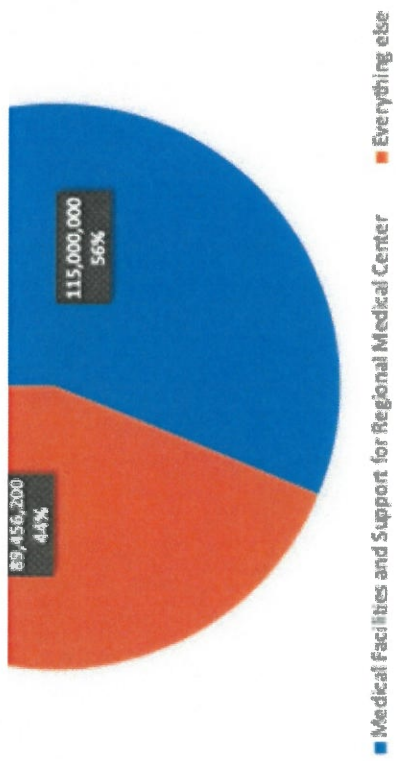


### Health Services Facilities and Hospital Staffing HSD Requests vs CAO Recommendations

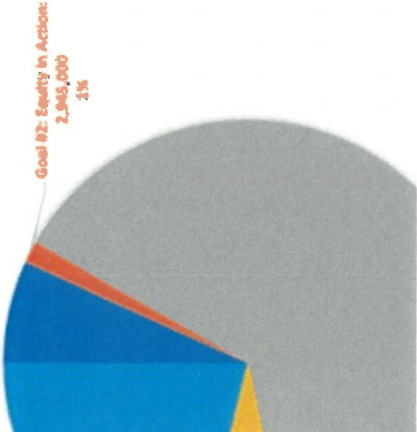

- The Board should give serious and due consideration to all of MXCAB's proposed funding priorities, and conduct and review all appropriate financial analyses before making funding decisions.
- The Board should explain its decision-making methodology moving forward, including how it will incorporate and honor MXCAB's operating principles of equity and prioritizing funding for the needs of low-income people and those most in need. The coalition that supported Measure X did so despite concerns among many about the regressive nature of a sales tax, and clearly intended Measure X funds to be directed to the most needy.
- The General Fund already has a 20.5% reserve balance. Quarterly fluctuations in sales tax revenue rarely exceed 10% - the Board should set a policy of a 15% reserve, not 25% and use the money to support community needs.
- Do not commit to a 3-5 year funding cycle. MXCAB should have opportunities for input every year.
- Prioritize people over parking lots. **Fund Contra Costa CARES** to provide needed health care to undocumented immigrants! Do not provide \$75 million for hospital facilities, including \$30 million for structures not even requested by Health Services.



- No NOT fund 19 FTE's for the Sheriff's Office. This request was explicitly rejected by MXCAB. The Sheriff's Office already has 27 Deputy vacancies and does not need these funds to increase response times.
- Do not fund body cameras – this was rejected by MXCAB and can be paid for out the Sheriff's existing budget.
- Funding for public safety should go to items recommended by MXCAB like: Public Defender front-end advocacy teams, community-based reentry support and employment services, abuse prevention and support, the Reimagine Public Safety countrywide initiative, eviction defense, Stand Together Contra Costa, and the Alliance to End Abuse Public.

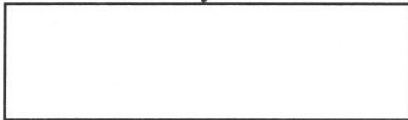

We are writing to support the allocation of \$500,000 from Measure X Funds to establish a Neighborhood Transformation Initiative in each of the 5 Supervisorial Districts (\$100,000 per District) as is being recommended by Supervisors Gioia and Mitchoff in regards to the November 16, 2021 Board Meeting Agenda Item D.5, Measure X Oversight Committee (MXOC) Recommended Funding Allocations. We enthusiastically urge you to seize this moment in time to expand the long-standing Integrated Services Teams Pilot Projects in Bay Point and North Richmond which have shown tangible results in improving the lives of children and families. This action is not only consistent with the MXOC Principles and strategies, but it also builds upon previous leadership and existing experience by Contra Costa County.

Neighborhood Transformation aligns existing public resources to achieve better futures for residents in low-income neighborhoods with accountability for results in 5 Big Outcomes: Education, Employment, Crime, Poverty, and Health. Effective Neighborhood Transformation requires collaboration among the County, Cities, and School Districts to coordinate actions that must be: people-focused, place-based, and linked to the regional economy. A key element of Neighborhood Transformation is establishing Integrated Services Teams coordinated by a Family Navigator and comprised of existing personnel with the following expertise: social services, public health, mental health, alcohol and other drug abuse prevention, probation, law enforcement, and workforce training services from the County; law enforcement, recreation services, and workforce training services from the City; and education support services from the School District. Further, the focus on people with accountability produces better outcomes for children and their families to move out of poverty and generates a higher "return on investment" for taxpayers, which saves money in the long run.

Neighborhood Transformation is win-win for both people and the government.

Contra Costa County 4 years ago became the first County in the state to sign an historic Neighborhood Transformation Partnership Agreement. Now, Measure X provides the funding for Contra Costa County to provide the essential catalyst to move forward on expanding the proven concept of Family Navigators to effectively coordinate and integrate human services to improve outcomes for children and their families, which has been demonstrated for decades by the Integrate Services Teams Pilot Projects in North Richmond and Bay Point.



A MXOC key Principle states “needs and issues are intersectional and interconnected, and it is critical to think about needs and services from the point of view of residents.” The Family Navigator will be critical to actualizing this Principle by supporting families to develop their own goals, organizing the system around the needs of the family, and creating an integrated services team that includes the family, county, city, and non-profit service providers, and school staff where all team members share accountability for results.

The proposal to allocate \$500,000 in Measure X Funds includes the following core components:

- Authorize 5 Neighborhood Transformation Initiatives, 1 in each Supervisorial District for geographic diversity in comparing results, and direct the establishment of Integrated Services Teams for each target neighborhood per the original Pilot Projects.
- Allocate \$500,000 in Measure X Funds (\$100,000 per Supervisorial District) to support a Family Navigator to coordinate each Integrated Services Team.
- Acknowledge the need to integrate Digital Inclusion into the Neighborhood Transformation Initiatives and integrated into implementation since the Digital Divide is just another manifestation of the Economic Divide.

The California Emerging Technology Fund (CETF) will dedicate personnel and resources to incorporate Digital Inclusion into each Neighborhood Transformation Initiative. CETF also will work with County Administration to identify additional opportunities to secure funding to ensure access to high-speed Internet in each of the 5 neighborhoods and help connect all residents through affordable home Internet service with digital literacy training. CETF is committed to supporting Contra Costa County to succeed in implementing Neighborhood Transformation to help residents overcome the “wall of poverty” and achieve Digital Equity in each of the 5 neighborhoods.
