RECOMMENDATION(S):

ADOPT Resolution No. 2021/160 to approve and authorize the Employment and Human Services Director, or designee, to execute contract Amendment 1 with the California Department of Community Services and Development to increase the contract limit by \$1,089,391 from a contract amount of \$3,342,935 to a new total contract amount of \$4,432,326, for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) for the period of November 1, 2020 through June 30, 2022.

FISCAL IMPACT:



BACKGROUND: (CONT'D)

and weatherization services to county residents who are income eligible through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and the Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP). Energy saving measures may provide homes with hot water heaters, furnaces, refrigerators, microwaves, doors, windows, energy-saving light bulbs, weather stripping, ceiling fans, and attic insulation. Homes with gas appliances receive a combustion appliance safety test that checks for carbon monoxide gas leakage and are provided with a carbon monoxide alarm. Residents can also qualify for the Home Energy Assistance Program, which provides a credit on their energy bills. The board approved the 2021-2022 revenue contract on December 8, 2020 (C.60).

CONSEQUENCE OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

If not approved, County may not receive funding to operate LIHEAP.

CHILDREN'S IMPACT STATEMENT:

The LIHEAP funding supports one of the community outcomes established in the Children's Report Card, #4 "Families that are Safe, Stable and Nurturing" by the provision of home energy assistance to keep households warm in winter and to increase household energy efficiency.
